1. Adams, Francis Colburn THE STORY OF A TROOPER, WITH MUCH INTEREST CONCERNING THE CAMPAIGN ON THE PENINSULA. New York, NY 1865. 616 pages. Dornbusch I, NY-68, 1st New York Cavalry. Second edition, four times the content of the first edition published in 1864, largely on the campaign on the Peninsula, interior clean, a few signatures pulled, notations by a Pennsylvania soldier? who disagreed with Adam's disdain for Pennsylvania soldiers. Interior clean, some signatures starting, presentation copy from author, usually found in poor condition. *The best copy we've offered in 51 years*. Protected by a clear acid-free mylar dust jacket.



- Addey, Markinfield STONEWALL JACKSON, THE LIFE AND MILITARY CAREER SOLDF THOMAS JONATHAN JACKSON. New York, NY 1863. 240 pages. Dornbusch II, 2815. Wraps. Steel engraved frontis of Jackson in uniform. One of the first book-length biographies of Jackson, completed just a few months after his death. First edition, interior clean and tight excepting minor foxing, tips of spine chipped, becoming uncommon. Protected by a clear acid-free mylar dust jacket.

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



The doctor was on friendly, almost intimate, terms with Grant and was also well acquainted with Sheridan, Rosecrans, McPherson and Halleck. He had occasion to see Lincoln while he was in Washington. Brinton's narrative of his experiences is generally very carefully accurate. His record of visits to the battle-fields of Second Manassas, Sharpsburg, Gettysburg and Fredericksburg provides a valuable insight into the care of wounded in each case. He faithfully recorded impressions of all that he experienced. Stops on his travels included the Shenandoah Valley, Louisville, St. Louis, Nashville, Cairo, Mound City, Forts Henry and Donelson and the Battle of Belmont. The sum total is one of the very best memoirs written by a Federal officer. First edition, outer upper page edges soiled otherwise, a tight bright copy. New York Ltd. Boxed 1918-19. Frontis of Fox Volume I, Frontis of Farragut Volume II with a full page portrait of Admiral Porter. A limited numbered edition of 1200 copies. Fox was assistant Secretary of the Navy during entire war. His correspondence begins with the attempted relief of Fort Sumter. Much material on the South Atlantic and west Gulf blockading squadron. Included are letters of L.M. Goldsborough concerning the expedition against Roanoke Island, NC and the campaign in the sounds of NC. "Undocumented letters that reveal a great deal about Union naval operations during the war." - Civil War Books. A most attractive set of books with a white vellum spines and gray boards stamped in gold. First edition, interiors clean and tight, white vellum, spines slightly darkened as with all sets, the limitation numbers don't match, per usual, in original shipping boxes, which have tape repairs – no big deal – "shipping boxes" are meant to be discarded – versus slip cases. The Naval History Society which published this set jumbled the volumes together and never were able to match up limitation numbers. One time I purchased 100 plus sets and didn't find a single pair of matching volumes. \$100.00

Second edition revised and enlarged, a fine copy, rebound by hand in simulated brown leather, gold spine stamping, marbled endpapers, in custom box with marbles sides, interior clean and tight, plates fine, most handsome, uncommon. Protected by a clear acid-free mylar dust jacket. \$350.00
