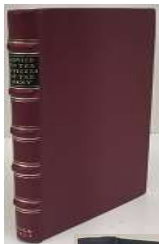

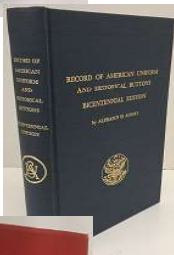

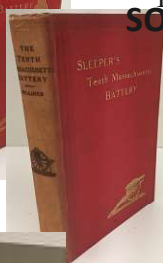

His record of visits to the battlefields of Second Manassas, Sharpsburg, Gettysburg and Fredericksburg provides a valuable insight into the care of wounded in each case. He faithfully recorded impressions of all that he experienced. Stops on his travels included the Shenandoah Valley, Louisville, St. Louis, Nashville, Cairo, Mound City, Forts Henry and Donelson and the Battle of Belmont. The sum total is one of the very best memoirs written by a Federal officer. First edition, outer upper page edges soiled otherwise, a tight bright copy. "Undocumented letters that reveal a great deal about Union naval operations during the war." – *Civil War Books*. A most attractive set of books with a white vellum spines and gray boards stamped in gold. 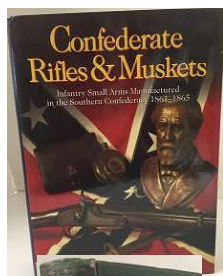
SEARCH WITHIN THIS NEWSLETTER – Here's how

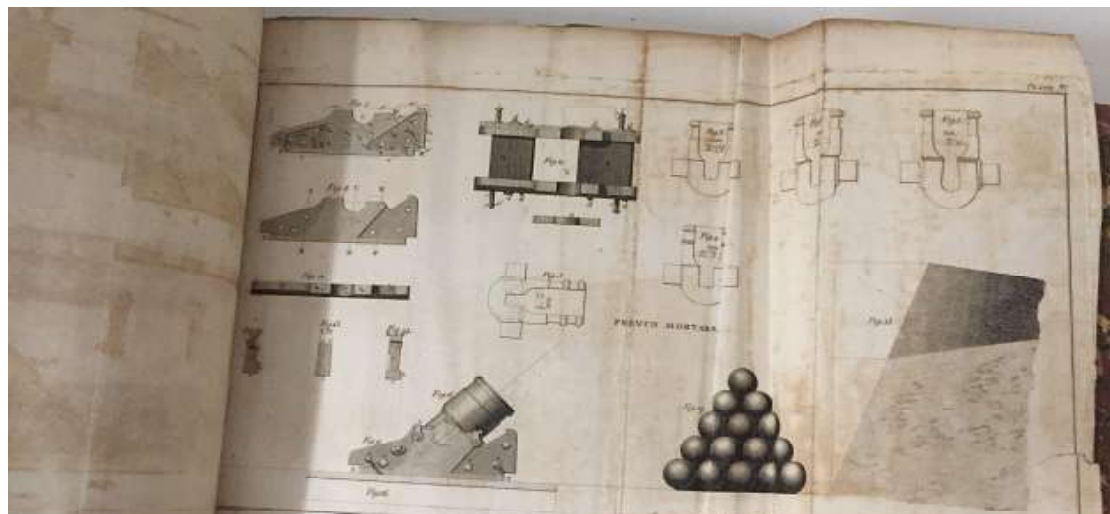


Louis de Tousard, a French artillerist, served in the American Continental Army under La Fayette. Later was given a US commission. Tousard authored two very influential books on artillery: the first, a proposal for a school for officers which later became the guide for West Point artillery instruction; the second was a manual for artillery officers that became the standard in the Continental Army. Tousard promoted Jean Baptists Vaquette de Gribeauval's revolutionary idea of interchangeable parts for guns, which influenced the US War Department to establish armories at Springfield and Harpers Ferry modeled on this thesis. As historian David A. Hounshell noted, "The importance of Tousard's book [on artillery], as well as his informal teaching of officers in the Corps of Artillerists and Engineers, cannot be overemphasized... musket parts and the influence on the American military of the rationalism of General Gribeauval and his followers firmly established the intellectual and institutional basis for the rise of the American system of arms production....The United States War Department soon found the idea of interchangeability irresistible....Soon the War Department demanded interchangeability. Ordnance officers elevated the idea of interchangeability to an ideal and helped transform it into a reality." Tousard's book on artillery introduced the mass manufacture of interchangeability parts to American arms production, creating the basis for American dominance in weapons manufacture by the end of the 19th century. Only a few university and institutional libraries have copies, complete sets of the 1809 edition have not been offered on the market for years.
