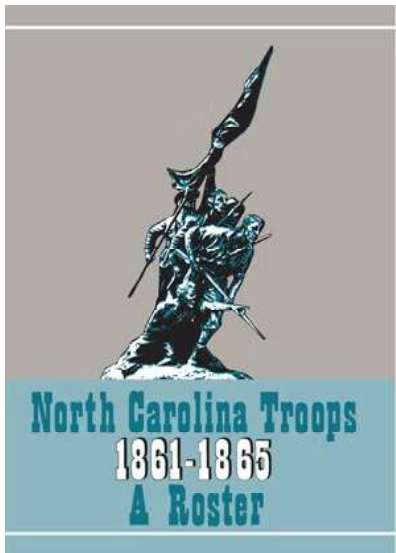

Ashby. Avirett was Chaplain of Ashby's Cavalry. "This collection of personal reminiscences is the best source of material on the daring Confederate chief whose death in 1862 was a severe blow to the South." – *Civil War Books*. First edition, interior clean and tight, a few blank margins slightly chipped, expertly rebound with original cloth preserved, upper and lower spine cloth lacking, boards speckled, front board soiled, seldom found in good condition, above average. Howes B206. 65, 58, 62, x, (2), 252 (i.e. 262) pages. Issued with and without varying numbers of tipped in albumen photographs; this is the without version. This is the more complete work of two editions published that year, containing **The Military Record of Louisiana** as well as a copy of Bartlett's 1874 work entitled **A Soldier's Story of the War**. This work contains much information about Louisiana units, as well as anecdotes, rolls, & statistical summaries. This copy has no plates, but Howes notes that both works were issued without plates. First edition, interior clean and tight, perforation stamp on title page, title page cleanly trimmed at outer blank margin, another corner neatly trimmed, handsomely rebound in full gray morocco, gold stamping, stamped in gold on front board "Military Annals of Louisiana," marbled endpapers, handsome, uncommon, **our 4th copy in 53 years.** Protected by a clear acid-free mylar dust jacket. \$750.00

Illustrations, plates, roster. Union Bookshelf 166. The Lincoln Cavalry Association. "An exceptionally fine study by the regimental adjutant; all the basic information is here." – Nevins. First edition, interior clean and tight, lacks blank front fly, as is often the case with this volume – interesting, gold stamping bright, slightly scuffed, above average. Full page frontis of Borcke in Confederate uniform (on coated paper – a plus), folding map of the war theatre in Virginia. Prussian officer Borcke fought on the side of the Confederate troops. He became known after his breakthrough of the blockade of Charleston. After the losses of the war, he returned to the Prussian army. Interior tight and clean, hinges professionally repaired, gold tooling. **Our second copy in 53 years.** Protected by clear acid-free mylar dust jacket. \$600.00



6. Boykin, Richard Manning **CAPTAIN ALEXANDER HAMILTON BOYKIN. One of South Carolina's Distinguished Citizens.** New York 1942. 263 pages. A limited edition of 1000 numbered copies. Contains muster roll of Captain Boykin's Company of Rangers in mid-1861 and another mid-1864. The members listed as absent for sickness, or captured indicate the terrible attrition suffered by this unit. First edition, a fine copy, #86 of the limited edition. 7. Britton, Wiley **THE UNION INDIAN BRIGADE IN THE CIVIL WAR.** Kansas City, Missouri 1922. 474 pages, frontis and full page plates on coated stock. "A popularly written history of Indian soldiers and military events during the 1861-1864 campaigns in Missouri and Arkansas." – Nevins. First edition, interior clean and tight, boards toned, two printed pages of related material laid in, dated presentation from author, above average. 8. Capers, Walter B. **THE SOLDIER-BISHOP, ELLISON CAPERS.** New York and Washington 1912. Neale Publishing Co. 367 pages. **Krick #70.** Dornbusch IV, 7378, 27th South Carolina Infantry. Frontis of Capers and the Capers' coat of arms following the half title, 7 additional full page illustrations on coated stock. In addition to being a fine soldier, Capers was Chancellor of the University of the South. The battle of Franklin is graphically described. With the advantage of his father's carefully kept journal the author has brought many new facts to light concerning the Tennessee Campaign under Gen. Hood, and infuses new interest into this part of the record of the war. "Less than one hundred pages of this biography cover Capers' Confederate military career, the heaviest emphasis being on the 1863 and 1864 campaigns." – *Krick*. First edition, interior tight, library stamps, about half of the pages faintly stained at lower blank margin, cover and spine stains, gold stamping bright. The frontispiece is a photo of the monument marking the position of the Ninth NY cavalry at the opening of the Gettysburg battle. 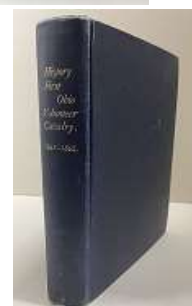


11. Cooke, John Esten **A LIFE OF GEN. ROBERT E. LEE.** New York, NY 1871. 577 pages. Dornbusch II, 2919. Steel engraved frontis of Lee in uniform, illustrated with steel engravings and folding maps. A classical contemporaneous account of Lee's service during the Civil War, written by a soldier who was on Jeb Stuart's staff, and knew Lee. First edition, interior clean and tight excepting faint marginal water stain to frontis and title page, folding map fine, simulated green morocco, gold stamping bright, seldom found in good condition. *The best copy we've offered in 53 years.* Protected by a clear acid-free mylar dust jacket. \$250.00

12. Cooke, John Esten **THE LIFE OF STONEWALL JACKSON...BY A VIRGINIAN.** New York 1863. 305 pages plus 6 pages of advertisements for books including *Les Miserables*. Spine erroneously attributes authorship to John M. Daniels. *Nevins* II, p. 47." Dornbusch II, 2821. "The appeal of Stonewall Jackson is evident in the number of good biographies of him, and equally as many poor ones. The earliest of any importance was John Esten Cooke's, published in Richmond in 1863..." – *In Tall Cotton*. Cooke wrote on May 12, 1863, only a few days after Jackson's death: "I have been incessantly engaged on the 'Life of Stonewall Jackson' having in about a week or ten days, got him through the Battle of Cedar Run. Rarely have I worked so hard." His book was published in Richmond, VA, August 1863 and its publishers sold 3,000 copies on its first day. It was pirated almost immediately in New York (thus this New York imprint) and London and banned by a Federal army order for the Department of Ohio. 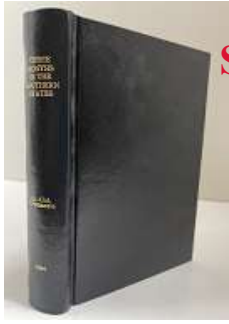

Sherman, was composed of the 64th and 65th Ohio Veteran Volunteer Infantry, the 6th battery of Ohio Veteran Volunteer Artillery and McLaughlin’s Squadron, Ohio Veteran Volunteer Cavalry. The brigade saw action for four years in every major battle in the western theater. Hinman was Lieutenant-colonel of the 65th Ohio Regiment. His exemplary story of the brigade is a basic source for the western theater of operations and contains many perceptive observations.” – UB. References: CWB I, 104. Copiously illustrated with portraits of officers and men of the 64th. “In scope alone, this volume must rank as one of the top ten narratives by a Federal soldier; a necessity for any study of the Western theater.” – *Civil War Books*. 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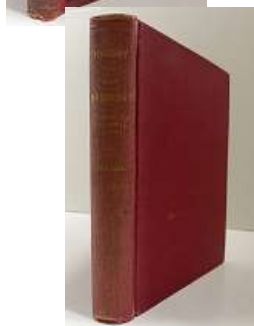

Organized at Harrisburg in August 1862, the 125th Pennsylvania fought in the Maryland Campaign, Antietam, Maryland Heights, Burnside's Mud March, and Chancellorsville. First edition, interior clean and tight, scuffed, well above average. 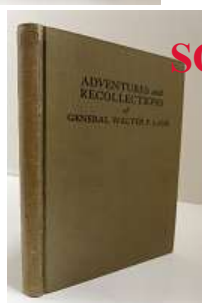

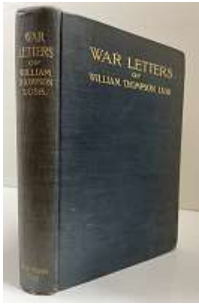

"One of the better collections of Federal soldiers' letters; especially good for operations around Beaufort, S.C." – *Civil War Books*. Privately printed. First edition, presentation from Lusk's children, interior clean and tight, bookplate removed, boards slightly faded and scuffed. Protected by a clear acid-free mylar dust jacket.

28. Malone, Thomas H. **MEMOIR OF THOMAS H. MALONE.** Nashville 1928. Privately printed. 2 leaves, vii, 227 pages. Coated paper, frontis of Malone, limited to 100 copies. Dornbusch V-2332. Thomas Henry Malone (1834-1906) served in the 1st Tennessee Infantry, CSA, in Virginia and later in the 9th Alabama Cavalry. His account of the Romney Campaign is important, and virtually unknown. He then went to the western theater and spent most of the war on the staff of Gen. Maney. Malone's extensive narrative about Maney surely must be among the best—perhaps the best—primary sources on that general. A chapter about prewar life at the University of Virginia also has much of interest and value. First edition, interior tight, title page toned, two tape repairs to front fly, boards toned, spine lettering faded, per usual. **Our third copy in 53 years.** Protected by clear acid-free mylar dust jacket.

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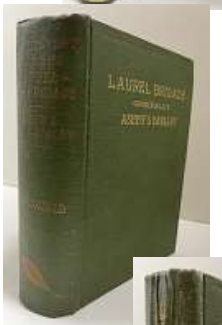
