There is a chapter on Gause’s experiences at Cedar Creek, and another concerning the Wilson-Kautz raid of June 1864. There is no evidence that the largest part of the memoir is based on a diary or other contemporary records; 1908 was a long while after 1865.” Krick #159. 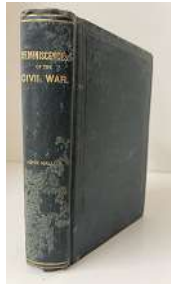

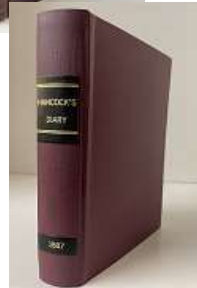

Although this sounds like memoirs by Hallum, it actually contains an array of Confederate memoirs by soldiers, collected by Hallum. The contents include narratives from the 2nd Georgia and 47th Virginia, and descriptions of many officers and battles. Unreconstructed civilian narratives relate abuse of civilian women by Yankees. Hallum himself was an interesting character, who in 1896 shot a Baptist preacher who had seduced Mrs. Hallum; Hallum then persuaded a Texas jury that he'd done the right thing to the Baptist. 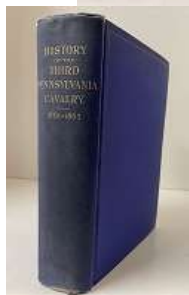

Hancock fought creditably in the campaigns of the Army of the Potomac as a brigade and division commander, and won great acclaim at Gettysburg.
