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KAIR WEATHERED THE STORM!

Hurricane Irma ar-

rived on Sept. 10<sup>th</sup> and destroyed or heavily damaged many, many homes. Local residents lost their jobs, tourists stayed away, and we wondered if we would be able to pick up the pieces, recover and go on. Although there is still much to be done, we are happy to report what an overwhelming helping hand we received from both local organizations and individuals as well as total strangers from far away.

Small and large trucks arrived with food, water, and practical goods. Our partner United Way of the Florida Keys stepped in and provided significant additional grants to help local residents with housing and other basic needs. The Community Foundation of the Florida Keys also provided significant grant money to help residents recover from this devastating storm. The Miami Diaper Bank sent truckloads of diapers. Individuals were raising money on Facebook and through their workplaces. Total strangers were reaching out with donations as well as volunteering to be "boots on the ground".

All of this help means that KAIR was able to dedicate over one million dollars to helping residents recover from the storm in 2017. Money for utilities and rent; money for start-up costs in new housing; and practical goods such as food and clothing all made life more bearable after such a terrible loss. Yes, we have a ways to go before we can say we are back to "normal" and yes, we are a bit wiser and less naïve but six months after Irma blew through town, we can see the resilience of the human spirit all around us and are optimistic that we are "getting it done!"

# INDEPENDENCE CAY BOUNCES BACK

Let's talk about Independence Cay. It sits quietly behind the old furniture store in lower Marathon. It houses the soup kitchen for the homeless as well as day services that include showers and laundry for the homeless. Just as importantly, it houses the transitional housing program for men.

Hurricane Irma took what was a serious housing problem in Marathon and turned it into a full-blown crisis. Our economy and our city depend on having competent and skilled workers yet there is currently nowhere for these workers to live. After the storm, Independence Cay took the opportunity to refurbish the transitional housing space and to prioritize working residents.

Currently, there are 13 men living at Independence Cay and each one is working fulltime. There are construction workers, an electrician, a restaurant worker, a hotel clerk, etc. Each man is given an opportunity to live there for an affordable charge, save their money and develop a path to more independent housing. The men are tested at admission and randomly thereafter for drugs and alcohol and they must abide by a curfew. They have a code of conduct that they must follow and it is very important that they work together as a family to keep the building clean and peaceful.

Each man who lives there is homeless when they arrive but with a job and more independent housing when they leave. Independence Cay serves an important purpose for Marathon and the Keys. If you have questions, or would like further information, please call Marj Roberts.
