This month we celebrate Easter, the day that, over 2000 years ago, Jesus Christ arose from the dead after being nailed to a cross and suffering and dying for the sins of mankind. Jesus said, "Before long, the world will not see me anymore, but you will see me. Because I live, you also will live." (John 14:19). Because Jesus rose, we too, will rise.

Easter is so much more than a day to remember; it is a day to celebrate our belief that anything is possible with God. Because of the resurrection of Jesus, we are never the same. The Bible shows us the transformation of those first followers who witnessed the risen Lord. They couldn't go back to the way things were. They spent their lives spreading the message of Christ. Because Jesus defeated death and gives us eternal life in heaven, we have true hope. Because we have found a new life in Christ, we can rejoice through all things.

This Easter season, let us be people whose words and actions demonstrate our belief that Jesus is alive. And through our faith, we'll experience the eternal blessings of God's love for us.
