
The Maple Ridge Community Foundation has announced its Citizen of the Year Award winners for 2020.

QUICK TIP: TWIG GRIDS



While using foam (oasis) is great in floral art, using twig grids is a more environmentally good way to go. These grids can be sprayed different colours and can be used over again. A little trick I learned along the way is to tape the twigs right on to the table (in the pattern you want) before wiring. Use a neutral tone bind wire or use bullion wire to secure each intersection of the twigs. Of course, one can also use clear scotch tape in a grid pattern over a container. If you have some spare time and have some foraged sticks, make one for use in the coming month.

SHOWBENCH – February 8, 2021

This will be a *Zoom meeting*. Please have your designs done, photographed and sent to Heather Bee <u>hdbeemobile@gmail.com</u> by Thursday, February 4th.

Two classes: Creative Valentine or Creative Chinese New Year

Class 1 - Creative Valentine design

Design your own floral Valentine's present! Ready for our Zoom meeting on February 8^{th} and in plenty of time before the 14^{th} .

Design of your choice. Fresh plant material should predominate; please keep accessories to a minimum if you do use at all.. Size of the design doesn't matter, but state the dimensions in your notes. Your notes are a self-critique (type of design, materials used, description of mechanics, what worked? what didn't? What you like about your design? What might have been done differently? Comment about the principles and elements of design in mind. Try to photograph with a backdrop for best effect.

Do you even have to use traditional red? Try pink, purple, or orange. Try another flower besides roses; I've seen some lovely tulips already. Here are some ideas gleaned from the 'Net using the search words: *Creative floral Valentine* and *Contemporary Valentine Floral Art*.



Class 2 - Creative Chinese New Year design

Chinese New Year's (Spring Festival; Lunar New Year) is Friday, February 12 this year and it will be the Year of the Ox. The colours associated with Chinese New Year are notably red and gold. Whilst the giving of cut flowers as a gift (to a Chinese family) is considered unlucky, decorating with plants such as orchids, narcissus, lucky Bamboo, jade plant, money plant, kumquat tree, pitcher plant, adenium, azalea, red cymbidium, kalanchoe and anthurium is considered lucky. Marigolds and peonies are favored but not easily available right now. Branches of blossoms (apricot, peach, plum – fake ones are used here this time of year here in BC) and pussy willows are used in decorating. Dried and fresh fruit are often served ... so why not consider some for your design: The 13 are: oranges (with leaf on better), pomelo, grapes, peaches, cow's udder fruit, pomegranate, apples, pineapples, sugar cane, lychee, bananas, lemon and watermelon).

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MARCH 8, 2021 - SHOW BENCH - UNDERWATER DESIGN

Taken from the 2017 BC Council of Garden Clubs Floral Design Judging and Exhibiting Standards, p. 147

- This design may be traditional, modern, European or contemporary
- Some parts are placed under water to create interest by magnification or distortion.
- Materials placed under water should be chosen for their long lasting qualities firm, hard surfaced plant material such as tropical flowers and foliage, evergreens, seed pods, some fruits and vegetables
- Be anchored so they do not float
- Transparent container(s) are necessary
- As water magnifies everything seen through it, the size of the underwater components needs careful selection ... also the mechanics
- Avoid debris in the water
- The water line can become a distraction if unsuitably sited
- Water may be coloured

Discover several enchanting creatures at Robert Burnaby Park

Robert Burnaby Park is a large public park in East Burnaby, just south of Burnaby Lake, located off Edmonds and 4th Street. It has an extensive trail system. The Land Art installation has been reported on by the Burnaby Now, the Vancouver Sun and even made it into the Globe and Mail.

Ewoks, a dragon, and Chewbacca await you!

If you venture into the woods, you might be in for a surprise ... or several of them.

Local Artist Nickie Lewis has erected multiple natural sculptures in Robert Burnaby Park that she created out of twigs and twine. The mythical beasts include everything from a friendly-looking dragon to a beautiful mermaid to a snoozing fairy.

The collection also features a couple of notable Star Wars characters, including a pair of adorable Ewoks and a hairy Chewbacca (minus the iconic roar).

Lewis mentions on Instagram that she also spent over 30 hours creating one of the sculptures--a soaring, 20foot troll. Upon completing the behemoth, she remarks that she found herself "a little sad. He is amazing and I love him."

APRIL 12 - SHOW BENCH - REDUCE, RE-USE, RECYCLE PROJECT

Design of your choice but must incorporate one or more recycled items. This month, we want you to check your recycling box(es) to see what you can use in your design ... what's in there? Newspapers and magazines, glass, tin, plastics, cardboard, egg cartons, take out food trays etc. etc.

- Can you make a papier mache vase using a balloon?
- Can you make a handheld bouquet ring out of cardboard?
- Can you make an interesting vase out of your tin cans?
- Can you use paper quilling techniques with paper or cardboard to create support mechanics?
- What about paper towel rolls or toilet paper cardboard rolls, paper or Styrofoam coffee cups glued together, sprayed an interesting colour and used as a support mechanic?
- How about taking an old book and folding it into a vase? Or using the pages of a book, cutting them up in leaf shapes and stringing them together?
- How about dip-dying a glass jar?
- Can you use those onion string bags for anything?
- Can you transform those interesting wine or alcohol bottles into an interesting container? We did transform plain florists' vases as a challenge a few years ago.
- What about the packing materials from all your Amazon deliveries?
- Clothing can now be recycled? Old t-shirts, jeans etc.
