MAY 13, 2019 - SHOW BENCH

Title: "Lunar Phases" – Curved designs

Standard Crescent, Inverted Crescent or Hogarth Curve

Class 1: Crescent design, standard size, with backdrop, 2'wide/3' tall

Class 2: Crescent design, Petite size. Not to exceed 10" in height, width and depth. Use a backdrop for photographing, OR

Class 3: Crescent design, Miniature size. Not to exceed 5" in height, width and depth; Again, please provide a backdrop for photographing.

Note: Scale and proportion of great importance for the container, plant material and other components for Petite and Miniature!

Curved Designs

Crescent – a traditional design – Not more than 2/3 of a circle in any directon, tapering to each end, similar in shape to a crescent moon. Usually asymmetrical with the focal area off-center and one end higher than the other. **Inverted Crescent** – a traditional design – As in the crescent design, only the tapering ends point downwards instead of upwards. Usually symmetrical with the lower ends approximately even and the focal area centered at the top.

Hogarth Curve – another traditional design – A curve (or reversed curve) like the letter "S" named after William Hogarth who called the "S" shaped curve "the line of beauty". The line may be angled in any direction, from vertical to horizontal. Curved plant material is necessary for the outline. For good proportion the top curve is longer than the lower one. Floral foam is the best mechanic but too much, when covered could case the central area to be too massed and dominate the line.

JUNE 10, 2019 - SHOW BENCH

Title: "Phenonmenal Phlora"

Class 1 - Phoenix (traditional design)

Phoenix Design – Traditional – This style received its name from the fabled bird that lives for 500 years or more and then destroys itself by fire, rising from the ashes to begin life anew. The Phoenix design is the regeneration of a round symmetrical form with a burst of material from its centre. The base design is a traditional, compact, radial design with very little space between the flowers. It is fresh and eye-catching: the rebirth of a traditional form.

Class 2 – Spatial Thrust (contemporary design)

Spatial Thrust Design – This is a Creative design that uses two parallel lines of "like materials" to define a vacant space and create a sense of thrust. Plant materials may be placed on either or both sides of the thrust, but not between the parallel lines. The thrusting lines may originate at different elevations but they must remain parallel for the entire line.

JULY 8, 2019 - WORK BENCH

Title: "Delicate Summertime"

You will create a Niche as in Group 19 of WAFA Jaipur show schedule.

Materials and construction instructions provided if you have signed up and paid. Bring in some foliage, small blooms and container to place a petite design inside. If you are not creating the niche, please still participate in creating a petite design on site. Remember: Petite means <10", H, W, D https://wafaindia.com/show-schedule/

Niche Design - This design may be traditional, Modern, European or contemporary in concept. A number of designs, together with staging and accessories arranged in a niche or allocated space. The placement and combination of all components within the niche should be well balanced and create good rhythm, unity and harmony. The whole exhibit is judged according to the elements and Principles of design prior to the individual pieces being assessed. The schedule should state the dimensions (height, width, depth) of the niche or allocated space, background colour, details of any staging provided and if a specific number of designs are required. For good proportion, approximate two thirds of the allocated space should be filled.

Petite Design - This design may be traditional, modern, European or contemporary in concept. Scale of all components is important. The design should appear as a petite version of a larger exhibit. Exhibits may not exceed 10" (25 cm) in height, width and depsth. The design principles of scale and proportion are very important for the container, plant material and components.
