The First Lesson

2 Samuel 11:1-15

In the spring of the year, the time when kings go out to battle, David sent Joab with his officers and all Israel with him; they ravaged the Ammonites, and besieged Rabbah. But David remained at Jerusalem.

It happened, late one afternoon, when David rose from his couch and was walking about on the roof of the king's house, that he saw from the roof a woman bathing; the woman was very beautiful. David sent someone to inquire about the woman. It was reported, "This is Bathsheba daughter of Eliam, the wife of Uriah the Hittite." So David sent messengers to get her, and she came to him, and he lay with her. (Now she was purifying herself after her period.) Then she returned to her house. The woman conceived; and she sent and told David, "I am pregnant."

So David sent word to Joab, "Send me Uriah the Hittite." And Joab sent Uriah to David. When Uriah came to him, David asked how Joab and the people fared, and how the war was going. Then David said to Uriah, "Go down to your house, and wash your feet." Uriah went out of the king's house, and there followed him a present from the king. But Uriah slept at the entrance of the king's house with all the servants of his lord, and did not go down to his house. When they told David, "Uriah did not go down to his house," David said to Uriah, "You have just come from a journey. Why did you not go down to your house?" Uriah said to David, "The ark and Israel and Judah remain in booths; and my lord Joab and the servants of my lord are camping in the open field; shall I then go to my house, to eat and to drink, and to lie with my wife? As you live, and as your soul lives, I will not do such a thing." Then David said to Uriah, "Remain here today also, and tomorrow I will send you back." So Uriah remained in Jerusalem that day. On the next day, David invited him to eat and drink in his presence and made him drunk; and in the evening he went out to lie on his couch with the servants of his lord, but he did not go down to his house.

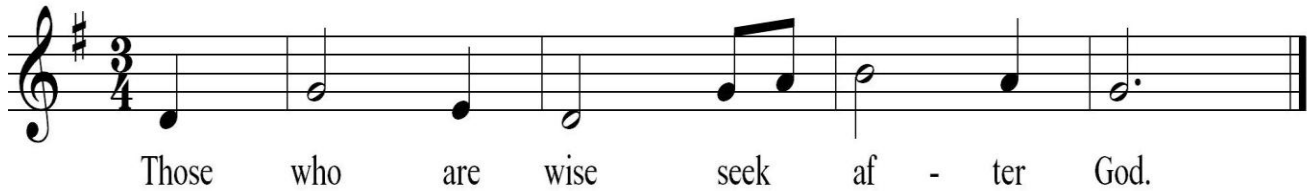
In the morning David wrote a letter to Joab, and sent it by the hand of Uriah. In the letter he wrote, "Set Uriah in the forefront of the hardest fighting, and then draw back from him, so that he may be struck down and die."

The Gospel

John 6:1-21

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.
People **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

The Nicene Creed

The Invitation to Holy Communion

The people are seated.

Please move at the direction of the ushers. You may receive the bread in open and outstretched hands. Gluten-free wafers are available; please make your need known to the priest. Wine is also available. Intinction (dipping of wafer into the cup of wine) by the congregation is not allowed. If you prefer not to drink from the cup, the priest can dip the wafer for you; simply indicate this desire by placing your palms together.

Receiving the bread only is full participation in the Eucharist. If you prefer to receive a blessing instead, please indicate your choice by crossing your hands across your chest. Those who wish to have Holy Communion brought to them at their seat should notify an usher. All who seek God and a deeper life in Christ are welcome to receive Holy Communion. While we believe that it is most meaningful when done as a baptized Christian, no one will ever be turned away from God's table.

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In celebrating the gifts of women in the church, all of the hymns and two responses sung today were written by women. Following is information concerning each of the represented hymns.

Morning has broken

Eleanor Farjeon

This hymn was written by Eleanor Farjeon (1881 - 1965) who was an award-winning English author of primarily children's literature. Born into a literary family, she started writing when she was a child. She was friends with many leading authors of her time, including D.H. Lawrence and Robert Frost. Though Eleanor produced a tremendous amount of work, perhaps her best known creation is the poem, "Morning Has Broken."

Snodgrass and Mitchell

This hymn was written for *Voices Found* by Kay G. Snodgrass and Bobbylin Mitchell. *Voices Found* is a new alternative hymnal written to highlight women's contributions to sacred song and serve as a role model in spiritual, liturgical, and musical leadership for women. This hymnal was published by the Episcopal Church in 2003.

Break thou the bread of life

Mary A. Lathbury

Mary A. Lathbury was born on August 10, 1841, in [Manchester, New York](#). As a child, she enjoyed reading, writing, and illustrating poems that she wrote herself. She was known for her writings in various religious publications. This hymn was written in 1880 for Chautauqua, New York. Chautauqua began as a program for the training of Sunday-school teachers and church workers. It developed into an adult education and social movement in the United States that peaked in popularity in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. This hymn was written as a prayer that all the students would be fed by the Word of God, as the multitudes were fed by the five loaves Christ had blessed.

To God be the glory

Fanny Crosby

Fanny Crosby was born in New York in 1820 and became blind in the first year of her life. By age 10, she had committed to memory the first four books of the Old Testament and the four Gospels. At age fifteen, she entered the New York School for the Blind and upon graduation she taught at the school. She became a prolific poet having written over 2000 poems, many becoming revivalist hymns. She had the honor of being the first woman whose voice was heard publicly in the Senate Chamber in Washington when she read one of her poems. Other Fanny Crosby hymns which may be familiar to many are *Blessed assurance Jesus is mine*, and *All the way my Savior leads me*.

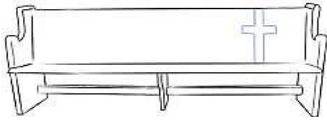
I love to tell the story

Arabella K Hankey

Arabella Katherine Hankey (1834-1911) grew up in the family of an English banker associated with the evangelical wing of the Anglican Church. As a teenager she taught a girls' Sunday school class. Later she traveled to South Africa to serve as a nurse and to assist her invalid brother. While recovering from a lengthy illness of her own at age 30, she wrote a poem on the life of Christ. This poem had two sections, the first published in January 1866 and entitled *The Story Wanted*, the second published later that year in November under the title *The Story Told*. This hymn is drawn from stanzas in the second section of Hankey's poem.
