## A Few Thoughts from Pastor Holle

Beloved, although I was very eager to write to you about our common salvation, I found it necessary to write appealing to you to contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints.

Jude 1:3

Every couple of years I try to make it a point to re-read some of the books I first read at the seminary. One of those is "*The Hammer of God*" by Bo Giertz. I don't know if it's still "required reading," but it should be. This month I wanted to share with you a couple of "scenes" from this classic.

The book actually consists of three short stories about three young Swedish pastors and their struggles with worldly notions in the face of God's truth. Though written a number of years ago and set in Europe some 100 years ago or so, I am always struck by how timeless God's truth remains. The years come and



go, cultures come and go (& change), and the world "evolves" or supposedly becomes more "enlightened" with each successive generation of human thought and endeavor. And yet, God's Word remains constant even as the Christian's struggle continues as it has since the Fall and as it will until our Lord returns in glory on the Last Day.

Near the beginning of the second story, a confident, young, eager, supposedly filled-with-the-Spirit, new pastor meets his elderly supervisor for the first time. The exchange goes something like this (the following, excepting *notes*, is from "*The Hammer of God*"):

Fridfeldt (the new pastor) declares to his supervisor, "I just want you to know from the beginning, sir, that I am a 'believer'." (Fridfeldt was a supporter of a "new" and more revivalistic or popular style of Christianity, and he had sensed that his new supervisor might be mired in the tired and old practices and teachings of the church.) He noticed a gleam in the old man's eyes which he could not quite interpret. Was approval indicated, or did he have something up his sleeve?

The rector (supervisor) puffed at his pipe and looked at the young man a moment before he spoke. "So you are a believer, I'm glad to hear that. What do you believe in?"

Fridfeldt stared dumfounded at his superior. Was he jesting with him? "But, sir, I am simply saying that I am a 'believer'."

Fridfeldt was almost speechless. "But don't you know, sir, what is means to be a 'believer'?"

"That is a word which can stand for things that differ greatly, my boy. I ask only what it is that **you** believe in."

"In Jesus, of course," answered Fridfeldt, raising his voice. "I mean – I mean that I have given Him my heart."

The older man's face became suddenly as solemn as the grave. "Do you consider **that** something to give Him?"

By this time, Fridfeldt was almost in tears. "But sir, if you do not give your heart to Jesus, you cannot be saved."

"You are right, my boy. And it is just as true that, if you think you are saved because you give Jesus your heart, you will not be saved. You see, my boy, ... it is one thing to choose Jesus as one's Lord and Savior, to give Him one's heart and commit oneself to Him, and that He now accepts one into His little flock; it is a very different thing to believe on Him as a Redeemer of sinners, of whom one is chief. One does not choose a Redeemer for oneself, you understand, nor give one's heart to Him. The heart is a rusty old can on a junk heap. A fine gift, indeed! But a wonderful Lord passes by, and has mercy on the wretched tin can, sticks His walking cane through it and rescues it from the junk pile and takes it home with Him. That is how it is."

The story continues and young Fridfeldt "experiences" Christian faith in the real world, and he sees how quickly man's wisdom fades. And then, near the end of the book and the third story, young Pastor Torvik preaches on the words above from the book of Jude (again, from "*The Hammer of God*"):

"Today it has become clear to me that the Christian faith is a sacred heritage, which must be faithfully preserved, if it is not to be dissipated. There is only one Savior. He has lived once here on earth; He has spoken certain definite words which can never be changed or recalled, and He has accomplished saving works, whose validity endures to the end of time.

"As long as the world lasts, all Christianity is bound to this Jesus Christ. Just as no one could be a disciple of Jesus during His lifetime only by agreeing with this or that word which He spoke, or by acknowledging the principle of love or something else which one selected from His teaching, so it is no more possible for anyone to be a Christian today by holding to an abbreviated, reinterpreted, or modernized gospel. In those days a man was a disciple by following just this Jesus of Nazareth, hearing Him, obeying, believing, and accepting Him. Today one becomes a disciple by being united with this same Jesus of Nazareth, being baptized to Him, nurtured by Him in His Church, and receiving His gifts. These gifts are the same today as then. The same words reach us through the Bible, the same feast is celebrated in the Lord's Supper, the same forgiveness is pronounced in the absolution. The conditions of discipleship are the same, salvation is the same. Once and for all, He suffered and died and rose again. Once and for all, the faith that embraces all this has been delivered to the church. And this is the holy and unchangeable faith for which the Word here bids us contend."

A rusty old tin can, full of filth and crud (my sin, self-righteousness, selfishness, pride, etc.), ... yes, that's me ... but by God's grace He has plucked me out of the junk pile, cleaned me up, emptied me out, filled me with His goodness, and claimed me as one of His own. I may want to be a sheep, but I'm also quite happy being a rescued and restored tin can in His house, and may God grant that our teaching, preaching, and worship here at St. Paul and Zion always be faithful to the faith as we have received it from the Apostles and His Church. God's Word, His gifts, His Son ... may they always be good enough for us!

# "We Are Beggars ..."

In the early morning hours of Feb. 18, 1546, Martin Luther fell asleep in the Lord. Before that happened, the hand that hammered the 95 Theses onto the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg (Oct. 31, 1517) penned its final words: "We are all beggars. This is true." And this is the truth that our Lord says makes you free.



Ironic, isn't it? In order to be free, you must be a beggar. You must be utterly dependent and reliant upon God. This makes us uncomfortable – the way we're uncomfortable when someone gets us a Christmas present when we haven't gotten them one. We feel we owe them. And we don't like being in someone's debt like that.

But what Luther would remind us is that we are all indeed beggars. And we're not just anyone's beggars. We're God's beggars. Christ came for sinners. He came to seek and save the lost. He came to heal the sick and raise the dead. He came for sinners, and He dwells only with sinners.

If we are to be where He is, we must be willing to be counted among the lost, the sick, and the dead. We must be willing to be beggars. We must cry out for mercy, for grace, and for His undeserved love and kindness. We must be dependent solely on Him and what He gives.

And here's the beauty: He gives us everything. Everything. Forgiveness of sins, salvation from death and the devil, and eternal life. This isn't because of any worthiness or merit in us. It is because of His divine goodness, mercy, and grace. On account of Christ's death and resurrection, the Father forgives you, saves you, and is pleased with you. You receive His love, His righteousness, His holiness, His acceptance, and His inheritance. We are all beggars. This is true.

This is the heart and soul of Christianity and the lifeblood of the Christian Church. God justifies us and declares us innocent and righteous by His grace received through faith for the sake of Christ. This isn't because of our works but because of His work on the cross. We, who once were enemies of God, are reconciled to Him and made to be His children.

This is what Luther pointed us to when He took up his pen for the last time and scribbled "We are all beggars. This is true." We are beggars, but we are beggars of the God who does not ignore us and who doesn't pass by us on the other side. We are beggars of the One who descended from heaven to make His dwelling with sinners.

We are beggars of Him who deigns to dwell with us, among us, and – yes – still in us by grace for Christ's sake. For in the bread and cup that we bless we share together with Christ and each other the riches of God's grace. The riches of this grace – the Gospel in sermon and absolution, in Baptism, and in Holy Communion – are so inexhaustible that our cups overflow. We, who are God's beggars, are inexhaustibly satisfied, and we have something to give back in thanksgiving and praise.
