A Few Thoughts from Pastor

GOD IS LOVE ... it's short, to the point, and it makes a "nice" bumper sticker. It is true, God says so in 1 John 4, and it is good news for all of His creation, but it doesn't tell us everything we need to know about God (& about us).



Sometimes, people like to latch-on to such simple statements of truth in a way that effectively excludes (or renders irrelevant) other clear teachings of Scripture. They seem to hope that maybe, just maybe, we can all just agree that "God is Love" (after all, who wants a God who is not loving?) and then each go out and do or believe whatever seems right to them? It's a sort of minimalist goodnews approach that can be twisted into an almost-anything-goes way of viewing God and mankind.

Now don't get me wrong, God IS love. I teach our confirmands that Love is one of the attributes of God, but the Bible also reveals other important things about God. He is eternal, unchanging, all-powerful, present everywhere, all-knowing, holy, just, faithful, merciful, and gracious as well. I suppose a couple of these might also make "nice" bumper stickers, but some might also make us squirm a bit.

GOD KNOWS EVERYTHING! When we're in trouble or needing God's help, this is great. But aren't there things that we wish God didn't know? Adam and Eve wished He didn't know everything; Cain would have preferred if God didn't know about Abel; and even king David tried hard to keep everyone (including God) from knowing about his sin with Bathsheba.

GOD IS HOLY! We say it; we sing it; and few would necessarily argue the point. But God's holiness also has serious implications for those who are not holy. Moses and Elijah and others in Scripture realized this oh so well. Holiness and sin don't/can't peacefully coexist. In His presence there is only holiness, and this is a problem for sinners who lack such holiness.



And how about a "GOD IS JUST" bumper sticker? At first blush it might sound "okay," but are any of us really interested in getting what we justly deserve, especially given what we just said about God's holiness?

"GOD IS LOVE" and "GOD IS JUST" ... they are both true, but they just don't seem to give us the same amount of hope (or "freedom"), do they? But to focus or "settle" for only the first statement while we ignore or neglect the second is not the way to know (or teach about) God properly.

In Mark 16:16 we are promised that "Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved." These are glorious, good-news (Gospel) words ... "God is love" type words. But God doesn't stop there, He continues, "... but whoever does not believe will be condemned." Ouch, words of Law and judgment ... "God is just" type words.

But both, properly distinguished and taught and applied, are critical for God's people. The Law shows us our sin, God's wrath and righteous response to our sin, and our desperate need for a Savior and for a righteousness that comes from outside ourselves. The Gospel shows us God's great love for us, it reveals our Savior and all He has done for us, and it invites us to repent and believe. Without the truth revealed by the Law, the Gospel means little or nothing; and without the Gospel, the Law, and God's holiness, would leave us hopeless, helpless, or foolishly self-righteous.

But the Law is so "offensive" some complain. Yes, it is. Can't we just focus on the "good" and find some generic middle-ground on which we can all agree? No, such an approach is foolish, at best, and dangerous/deadly at worst, and it ignores Jesus' clear command in Matthew 28:20 to teach "... ALL that I have commanded you."

So what about those other, non-denominational or independent type churches that claim not to get hung up on the details of Biblical teaching and interpretation? Well, consider these well-written words by Kurt Marquart:

"The fact is that there simply is no neutral, undogmatic, generic Gospel, which may then be flavored to taste with denominational additives, say a dash of delicate Anglican mint sauce here, and hearty Lutheran sauerkraut or Baptist okra there. Every confession of the Gospel is at once and inevitably dogmatic or 'denominational.' For no honest presentation of the Gospel can escape the necessity of saying yes or no to basic evangelical ingredients like the power of Baptism, grace alone, universal grace, the Gospel as means of grace, or the real presence of Christ's body and blood in the Holy Supper for our salvation."

I suspect that most non-denominational churches (or methabapticostal churches) are really just sort of hiding what they actually teach or stand for. If they deny the Real Presence in the Holy Supper, or infant Baptism, or if they discount water Baptism in favor of a tongue-unleashing Spirit baptism, then it's not that tough to guess what teaching they might actually offer. I know some people say they don't want (or need) "organized" church, but does that mean they want un-organized church? Hey, I guess it's timely and in vogue to be independent or moderate or somewhere in the middle where nobody can pin you down, but such an approach is no service to God's people.

I'm thankful to be a Lutheran Christian in the very best sense of the term, and I will not apologize or be ashamed of speaking God's Word just the way He gave it to us. Jesus' teachings, His Father's instruction delivered to us via the Church and the Spirit, are still good enough for me. My Old Adam (sinful self) won't "like" it, and it will drive the world, the political correctness zealots, and our modern culture absolutely crazy, but in His Word and teachings there is life ... full, abundant, eternal life in Him who laid down His life for me (& for you). To Him alone be all the glory forever and ever. Amen.

Stewardship



Stewards, Called to Forgiveness

Human beings were created and redeemed to be stewards. Bearing the image of God (Gen. 1:26–28), the steward was created to reflect the Creator within creation. In a way, stewards are simply mirrors. Mirrors cannot do anything to the image that is placed in front of them.



A mirror was the first item in creation that embodied the computer term GIGO (Garbage In, Garbage Out." In a computer, if you enter good data, you get a good result. You enter bad data; you will get a garbage result.

In photography, you can run an image through a filter, which can remove imperfections. Myriad apps allow for the option to cut people out, add people in, and change backgrounds all in an attempt to make the perfect image. Mirrors cannot do that. They do not provide anything new. Mirrors are created to reflect, not process, an image. They simply reflect the person standing in front of them.


Stewards are like this. Created to reflect, a steward will reflect the God in front of them. The steward will either reflect a godly stewardship that holds that God is the owner of all things (Ps. 24:1) and is the One to whom they are accountable, or they will reflect the god of self and see the created order as something to be possessed, used, and in far too many cases, abused. It is not a question of IF the steward reflects, it is really a question of WHO is being reflected.



For this reason, the Lutheran Service Book includes a hymn worthy of meditation: "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788). Its first verse reads:

Forgive us, Lord, for shallow thankfulness, For dull content with warmth and sheltered care, For songs of praise for food and harvest press, While of Your richer gifts we're unaware.

This is a fitting call to repentance for every steward. Our thankfulness is so often shallow. We get comfortable with the overflowing blessings we have entrusted to us by the Lord. These trusts are so many that the steward often forgets the One who entrusts them. Worse, with so many physical trusts evident, the steward loses sight of the greatest trust: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The failed steward sees so much plenty that they lose sight of the treasure: Jesus!




