From the Pen of the Pastor

"Freedom's Price Has Been Paid"



So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed. (John 8:36) 3

In just a little while, we here in the United States, will again celebrate our nation's independence. One of the themes of that celebration is, of course, that our independence, or our freedom from Britain, was not free, for in terms of military casualties, approximately 4500 American men lost their lives in the Revolutionary war and hundreds more were severely wounded.

And, as costly as that was, the casualties of our country's freedom were not limited to just the men who openly fought the British. In a radio broadcast on July 4, 1974, Paul Harvey reminds us that the cost also included those who signed the Declaration of Independence. For instance...

Carter Braxton, a wealthy planter and trader, after signing the Declaration saw his ships swept from the seas to pay his debts. He lost his home and all his property. He died in rags;

Thomas McKean of Delaware was so harassed by the enemy that he was forced to move his family five times in five months. He served in Congress without pay -- his family in poverty, and in hiding; Thomas Nelson, Jr. of Virginia raised \$2 million on his own signature for provision for our allies, the French fleet. After the War he personally paid back the loans, wiping out his entire estate; he was never reimbursed by his government. He died bankrupt;

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside while she was dying; his 13 children fled in all directions for their lives. His fields and gristmill were laid waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves and returned home after the War to find his wife dead, his children and properties gone. He died a few weeks later of exhaustion and a broken heart.

Of the 56 signers of the Declaration, few were long to survive. Five were captured by the British and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes -- from Rhode Island to Charleston -- sacked and looted, occupied by the enemy, or burned. Two of them lost their sons in the Army; one had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 died in the War from its hardships or merciful bullets. They had learned that liberty is so much more important than security, for that they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor. They fulfilled their pledge; they paid the price, and freedom was born.

Dear friends, I share all that because no talk of freedom is complete unless one seriously considers the cost of it. That is not only true for the temporal political freedoms we in this country currently enjoy, at the cost I might add of over one million of country's servicemen and women, and many others, but it is also true for the eternal freedom we now partially and will someday fully enjoy at the cost of God's only Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Deep down we all know, 'Freedom' is anything but free, whether we are talking about physical freedom from oppression or bondage or spiritual freedom from the power of sin, death and the devil. In order to free you from the former, many men died, and to preserve that freedom, many more have since and will continue to die. Sadly, that freedom is also, at best, only temporary. We pray it lasts, but we cannot be sure it will. In order to free you from the later...from spiritual bondage to sin, God had to literally come down from Heaven and enter this fallen world. He was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, lived an absolutely perfect life...one devoid of any sin... and then He had to suffer a most excruciating and horrific death; all in order to pay the established penalty of mankind's sin.

Dear friends, He loves you that much. He loves you so much in fact that He gives you this freedom from sin as an absolute gift, so that you might live – eternally. It cannot be earned or deserved. It is received by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone.

So, as you gather together to celebrate our Nation's independence this 4th of July, as you watch the firework displays and listen to their explosion, please pause just a second and contemplate freedom's cost, And then, with that cost in view for a freedom which is only temporary, consider also the greater freedom you have been given by Christ and just how much that 'eternal' freedom cost our sinless Lord. Cherish the gift of life His death bought you above all things, recognizing that the freedom our Savior Jesus purchased for us, is an eternal gift that will never fade or be taken away.

PRAYER: Dear Lord Jesus, thank You for all the freedoms we enjoy, most especially that which you earned for us through your own suffering, death and resurrection. Help us recognize and appreciate the Grace through which our salvation comes and joyfully share Your Gospel message with everyone we can, that they too may be free, Amen!



You will notice in the calendar that every Saturday morning from 9-9:30 is now marked with a slotted time for Private Confession. I will be available in the Zion sanctuary for anyone who would like to take advantage of this treasure of the Church.

Certainly we can see numerous examples in the bible of private confession (Matt 16; Matt 18; John 21; 1 John 1; Psalm 51; James 5; 2 Samuel 12) and this is in no way a "catholic" practice but it is indeed very Lutheran! You can see in our Small Catechism, the fifth chief part is all about this. Then of course the Augsburg Confession teaches that "private confession is not abolished among us" but instead that "private confession ought to be retained in the churches" (Augsburg Confession XXV & XI). But after all that, hear these compelling words from Dr. Luther who said "When I urge you to go to Confession, I am doing nothing else than urging you to be a Christian" (Martin Luther's Exhortation to Confession, 1529).

I and my family try to go monthly, some people go weekly, and some people just go 4 times a year. There is no law on how much you can or have to do this but it is a great treasure of the Church and comfort to troubled souls to receive the forgiveness of sins. You can see what the Rite of Private Confession looks like in the Lutheran Service Book (LSB) on page 292. When you come in, you can kneel at the rail in front of where I will be sitting and go through the Rite in the LSB and then you can confess specific sins or general ones. Either way, as a called and ordained servant of the Word, I am there to give you personal and private forgiveness for your sins.

So if you live in Hiawatha or thereabouts, it's pretty easy to make it every now and then and I highly encourage it. If you don't live in Hiawatha, perhaps if you are making a trip to Walmart or McDonalds on Saturday morning, you can add this to your schedule every now and then. Otherwise, I am happy to meet with you at your home or at any of the sanctuaries of the partnership if another time works better for you. Next month's newsletter will discuss this in depth but if you have any questions, please don't hesitate to ask.

Let the little children come to me

Children are not the future of the Church. They *are* the Church **right now**. Everything the Church has is their inheritance, their heritage, and their birthright **right now**. Jesus wants your children and your grandchildren in church. Even the small ones. Even the wiggly ones. Even the ones that sometimes squawk with frustration.

Jesus knows that children tend to wiggle and squawk a bit so don't be embarrassed about it. Your children are welcome at Church and the treasures here are their heritage too. It is such a joyous sound for me to hear babies and children cooing or babbling during the Liturgy. Because if a church doesn't have the sounds of children, well *that* is a sad day. Because a quiet church is a sad church. Because if a church is not crying, it's dying.

But of course, that's easier said than done. Children are experts at testing our patience. That's okay. That is one of the gifts that God gives to you through children is the opportunity to be patient. If kids don't act the way you want in church right away, that is okay. Just like everything else, they need to be taught. Whether it is getting kids to eat or getting them sleeptrained, mothers and fathers know how difficult it is to raise up children in the way they should go so that when they are old they won't depart from it (Prov 22).

Another difficult aspect is teaching children the way to be in church. However, if your children or grandchildren just

have a tough time sitting through the Divine Service, don't worry! And please don't feel like you have to run out of the sanctuary. Jesus wants your children in church. If they make a little noise, that is okay. They are learning the Liturgy! They might even be trying to participate in their own little way. For example, my little 2 year old knows the Words of Institution by heart and loves to sing them out even if part of that is her own little unintelligible 2 year old language. Kids want to participate, they just have to be shown how and taught that church is for them. But if you are in a tough time of life with kids, to make it easier on your family, there are some things you can do.

Believe it or not, dare to sit closer to the front of church. I know that sounds nuts but it works! The closer they are to the front, the easier your children can see the procession, note the colors of the church year, hear the bells, watch the pastor, wonder about the beauty in the sanctuary, and embrace the mysteries at the altar. It has to be hard to be a kid in church when everyone is taller than you and all you have to look at are

people's backs and heads. That would be boring! But if you sit a little closer, they can see more.

Even though they don't entirely understand it, your children have come to the "city of the living God" where the Body and Blood of that living God are made present on this altar and the sanctuary is filled with His "innumerable angels in festal gathering" (Heb 12). In this gathering, Jesus comes with His blood for you and your children "that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel" (Heb 12). All of that, and they are only two feet tall staring at everyone's backs. That would be frustrating! But if you sit up a little closer with them, then they can see and participate in what is going on and they are more likely to be engaged. Granted, this will look different for children of different ages, but the principle is the same. Then, as we go, feel free to softly explain the service to your children as well and encourage them to chime in on their parts: Amen! Lord have mercy! And with Thy spirit! Alleluia! etc. All of that belongs to them. This Faith is their heritage too, even if they can't articulate it yet.



During church, if they are getting restless, ask them about whatever stained glass is closest to you. Ask them where Pastor is. What is he doing? What is he wearing? Where are the crosses? Where is Jesus? Fold their hands inside of yours when we pray. Encourage them to say *Amen!* when I bless them at the altar rail. Take their hand in yours and trace the sign of the cross over them. When Pastor holds up the Body and Blood of Christ, teach your child how to worship as you whisper into their ear *My Lord and My God*. Finally, be

sure to say and sing your parts too as you stand and kneel and sit. Your children will learn by your example, especially you fathers. Things like that will engage them in the Liturgy as you help them along. The important part is that if they aren't acting how you want in church, don't give up but distract them *with* the Liturgy, not *from* the Liturgy. And if you are having specific concerns that you want some guidance on, just send me an email or stop by the parsonage and we can chat.

But, if you and your children must leave the service, please hurry back. Like Jesus, we want your children in the Liturgy, not out. If you're overwhelmed, don't give up. If you need a little help, just ask. Myself or someone else would be thrilled to help in any way possible. Finally, know that while you care for your children in the Liturgy, the rest of us will be rejoicing in Jesus' words "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these" (Matt 19:14).
