A Few Thoughts from Pastor

The 4th of July is just around the corner, and for many this will give rise to a renewed sense of patriotism and pride ... for believers and unbelievers alike. Some will humbly give thanks to God for the gifts of a good land and the freedoms we've enjoyed, while others will revel in the "greatness" that is the USA and all that it supposedly represents. As I prepare to mark this now largely secular holiday, I'm struck by how potentially idolatrous an unguided and radical focus on freedom and independence can be (or has become).

We Christians worship God, not country. We humbly give thanks to God for His gifts of government and ongoing providence, even as we resist the temptation to

misuse/abuse the freedoms (& liberty) we enjoy. While originally offered nearly 30 years ago, consider the following prayer offered during the opening session of the Kansas Senate in 1996. I suspect those assembled were expecting some sort of general, thank-you God, God-help-us type prayer, but this is what they got:

"Heavenly Father, we come before You today to ask Your forgiveness and to seek Your direction and guidance. We know Your Word says, "Woe to those who call evil good," but that is exactly what we have done. We have lost our spiritual equilibrium and reversed our values.

We confess that

- ... we have ridiculed the absolute truth of Your Word and called it Pluralism,
- ... we have exploited the poor and called it the lottery,
- ... we have rewarded laziness and called it welfare,
- ... we have killed our unborn and called it choice,
- ... we have shot abortionists and called it justifiable,
- ... we have neglected to discipline our children and called it building self-esteem,
- ... we have abused power and called it politics,
- ... we have coveted our neighbor's possessions and called it ambition,
- ... we have polluted the air with profanity and pornography and called it freedom of expression,
- ... we have ridiculed the time-honored values of our forefathers and called it enlightenment.

But sometimes I worry; I worry about some of the "freedoms" and things that many claim our flag now represents. The "freedom" to live in ways that are counter to God's revealed will. The "right" to do as we please rather than as God would have us do, and to live in ways that "seem right to us" but which are at odds with how God says people should live.

Amidst all the reflecting and remembering, and all the celebrating, eating and drinking, and fireworks of the 4th of July, I hope and pray that all of us will pause to repent, to confess our sins and wrong-headedness, and to turn to God once again for forgiveness and for guidance. And don't just pray for your-selves, pray for our country and its leaders as well ... God knows we/they need it.

God bless the USA? He has; He is. But I think it's high time the USA blesses Him! Yes, blesses Him by listening to Him once again, and by praising, worshipping, and glorifying Him! And I don't mean some loosely defined idea of a god that everyone can rally around; I'm talking about the one and only true God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Wonder how that would go over in Congress? Or in Topeka? Or in Fairview or Hiawatha?

Lord, have mercy! ... and come Lord Jesus, come quickly! Amen



Stewardship

The Rewards of Godliness

It's no secret that you can't bribe your way into heaven. No amount of good works will impress God enough to open heaven's door for their sake. "For the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23) and the person who "keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it" (James 2:10). Rather, salvation is "the free gift of God ... in Christ Jesus" (Romans 6:23).



So, your good works won't earn you the reward of heaven. But does that mean that there are no rewards at all? Consider what the Small Catechism says in the "Close of the Commandments":

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Exodus 20:5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands. (SC II)

God promises to bless you in keeping His commandments. What might these blessings be? Well, consider what Paul says about keeping the Fourth Commandment: "*Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right.* 'Honor your father and mother' (this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land" (Ephesians 6:1–3).

And think about what your life would be like if you went around stealing (breaking the Seventh Commandment), telling lies about people (breaking the Eighth Commandment), and generally being cruel to those around you (breaking all the commandments!). That is obviously not a blessed way to live. In fact, you'd be miserable living that way.

And Jesus says more about what is in store for those who make sacrifices for His sake: "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on His glorious throne, you who have followed Me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for My name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life" (Matthew 19:28–29).

So don't grow impatient in doing good. Follow the Lord who has freely given you everlasting life.

ST. PAUL DORCAS

Our Dorcas Group met in the basement following our Sunday morning church service June 2, 2024. Sharon Meyer served yummy strawberry or blueberry cream cheese pie and juice, while Sadie Meyer led our fourth Bible study on Joseph.

To often we cannot understand God's plan and loose hope or try to ask, "what now" and will it work out for us? In Genesis 39:21-23 we are reminded that the Lord is always with us. This is shown to Joseph as he is in prison and yet he gets placed in charge. We jumped into reading Genesis 40 through 41:46. Two new prisoners (Chief cupbearer and Chief baker) are placed in prison under Joseph's care and Joseph really does care for them. They tell him their dreams and he interprets the outcome. As Joseph matures he becomes a humble servant of the Lord and continues to give credit to God. Two years later Pharaoh seeks Joseph to explain his twin dreams and through Joseph's interpretation Pharaoh, like Potiphar, recognizes the Spirit of God in Joseph. Joseph was elevated to second in command (prime minister) to preserve and rescue His people over the next 14 years. Joseph's suffering taught him much, and led up to him being in charge of an entire land. Nothing is impossible by God's will.


