A Few Thoughts from Pastor

The Joy of Giving to God

(Jesus said,) "No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money." Luke 16:13

This week, while studying the Gospel text assigned for the coming Sunday, I again came across an incredible text in the book of 1 Chronicles. The Gospel text was Luke 16:1-13 in which Jesus tells the parable of the "Dishonest Manager" and in which He warns us about the place money/stuff can take in our lives.



Of the many things that might be said in connection with this text is the simple, yet profound reminder that we are not lords of our own possessions; we are simply stewards (managers) of God's "stuff." My study along those lines took me back to the time of King David as he assembled the officials of Israel, and his son Solomon, to tell them of God's plans to have Solomon, not David, build the great Temple in Jerusalem. And while David would not get to build God a more permanent home (as compared to the Tabernacle), he was able to begin gathering material and riches to facilitate its construction. He gave generously with a joyful heart, as did the people of Israel, and then he prayed:

"Blessed are You, O LORD, the God of Israel, our Father, forever and ever. Yours, O LORD, is the greatness and the power and the glory and the victory and the majesty, for all that is in the heavens and in the earth is Yours. Yours is the kingdom, O LORD, and You are exalted as head above all. Both riches and honor come from You, and You rule over all. In Your hand are power and might, and in Your hand it is to make great and to give strength to all. And now we thank You, our God, and praise Your glorious name.

Registration is the first night starting at 5:30pm.



Stewardship



When it comes to stewardship, a favorite Bible verse is the account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4). It's a moving account. Our Lord praises the seemingly small gift of two copper coins given by a poor widow above the abundance of gifts given by the rich, saying, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them." And that is usually where we stop. But the text goes on. "For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on."





devil; who called her by the gospel and enlightened her with His gifts of Word and Sacrament; would continue to do this. He would provide her with all that she needed for this body and life because that is the character of the God she had.

But this is not why we give small gifts. Her gift, though it appeared small, was actually large. When we are tempted to give small gifts, it is precisely because we want them to be small! We don't trust the Lord to provide for us. We give small gifts because we lack faith in the One who created us, redeemed us, sanctifies and keeps us in the one true faith. We give small gifts because we doubt that God will really give us what we need and desire. We give small gifts because we are not content with what God has already given.

We are not slaves (children of the slave woman) under the Old Covenant (Gal. 4); we are adopted sons of the free woman. And since we are sons, we are also heirs, and heirs receive the inheritance. Everything is already ours in Christ. And thus, moved by the willing spirit of adoption, we do the will of God in financial matters far beyond all that done by those under the Old Covenant who were forced by legal demands.

So, what have you decided to give? How do I decide what to give? Let the Scriptures be your guide. We are to give proportionally to what we have received from God's giving to us (Luke 12:48; 1 Corinthians 16:1–2, 2 Corinthians 8:12). But you have not been set free to give nothing. See that you excel in the grace of giving (2 Corinthians 8:7)!

We are not free to live selfishly outside the Gospel, without regard for God who gives us all good gifts, without generosity for our neighbor who needs us and our gifts, without supporting the community of faith in which we live, without care for our spiritual fathers and those who teach and help raise our children in the faith, and without resources for the poor and needy.



In short, we are not free to live unto ourselves, hoarding what God has given us only for us. For love is the fulfillment of the law (Romans 13:10). And the sum of the law is this: Love God and love your neighbor (Matthew 22:34–40). We love because He first loved us. We give because He has given to us.

Luther once said, "Possessions belong in your hands, not in your heart" (LW 14:240). There is a reason your 10 fingers spread apart. With your hands you catch God's gifts for what you need and let the rest fall through your

fingers to your neighbors – your family, your church, your friends, your community.

You cannot serve God and money. But you can certainly honor God with your gifts and by returning a portion of what is His back to Him.

ST. PAUL DORCAS

On July 7, 2024, the St. Paul Dorcas meeting took place in the narthex following our Sunday morning service. We had our last lesson on Joseph's story, while we shared treats which Evan Brockhoff made (cherry coffee cake, cinnamon bundt cake, blueberry scones).

In Genesis 42, we looked back at Jacob and the brothers who are feeling the famine and must go to Egypt for help. Jacobs favoritism stands out when he keeps Benjamin at home. Unknown to them, their long lost brother Joseph is ruling (whom they will not recognize). Joseph instantly recognizes his brothers and recalls his dreams where God reveals his brothers bowing down before him. God is forever faithful. We think of all the emotions that must be present and focus on revenge, judgment and forgiveness; all which belong to God. God remains in control through Genesis 42 to 45 as Joseph puts his brothers through a series of tests revolving around Benjamin. After Joseph reveals the truth about himself in Genesis 45, we see Jacob trust God and move the family to Egypt in 46-47. In Genesis 48-49, Jacob blesses Joseph's sons, and rights the wrong done two generations before. Jacob then blessed his own twelve sons. Through Genesis 50:20 we understand, God meant it for good.

President Sarah Kleopfer opened the business meeting. Roll call was taken by Becky Meyer - there were eleven members present. The minutes of the previous meeting were corrected by removing that "Dorcas would be providing the table service and drinks for the service and potluck in the park". The meeting was adjourned and we closed with the Lord's Prayer.
