A Few Thoughts from Pastor

... we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to Him, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God. May you be strengthened with all power, according to His glorious might, for all endurance and patience with joy, giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light.

Colossians 1:9-12

Sometimes, just saying "thank you" isn't really enough! Certain gifts demand more than just passing acknowledgment. When someone makes a great sacrifice for another, we expect the beneficiary to respond in a way consistent with the gift or sacrifice. Parents who sacrifice for the education of their children justly expect them to diligently apply themselves. To misuse the gift of a college education by turning it into an opportunity to spend Mom and Dad's money, to party, to play, and to enjoy being young is the epitome of selfishness and inconsiderateness, and it's wrong, very wrong.

So, what of the gift that we've been given by God? What about the gift of forgiveness, life, and salvation we've been given by virtue of the great sacrifice of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ? Do we always live our lives in a manner consistent with His sacrifice and gifts? We have been freed **from** sin, **from** selfishness, and **from** all that would put us at odds with God, but is that the way we always think, speak, and act?

Not me! Oh sure, there are times that the Holy Spirit guides me and I actually behave as one who has been freed from sin and all that comes with it, but not always. All too often, in the face of temptation, I find myself tempted to think: God will forgive ... and this will make me happy ... so what the heck, here I go.

Folks, this is dangerous thinking. It is potentially deadly thinking. It is our "Old Adam" (our sinful nature) trying to have its way in things. It is to regard God's incredible gifts and Christ's amazing sacrifice as no big deal, and I can't think of too many other ways to insult God more. Jesus didn't lay down His life so that we could do whatever we please; He suffered and gave His life so that we might have life, abundant life, forever with Him and with His Father. He did it so that we might call His Father our Father, and so that we might be freed from our bondage to sin. And He did it with no strings attached ... it's all gift!

We deserve nothing good ... NOTHING ... and yet Christ suffered and died to give us life, to rescue us from ourselves, the world, and the devil. A simple "thank you" is not enough for such a gift as this! For those times when we've regarded His gift and sacrifice as anything less than precious and totally undeserved, let us again come to Him pleading for mercy and forgiveness. And doing so we will find He waiting ... waiting to forgive, and waiting to free us all over again. Join me in repentance and faith, won't you?

In closing, consider these words, based on the text above, from John Chrysostom (c. 350-407):

Grace, although it is grace, saves the willing. But it won't save those who don't want it, who turn away from it, who fight against it, and who oppose it. ... Be thankful that we are saved by the gift of God, since we can't save ourselves by works.

Don't give thanks only with your words also, but through your works and actions. For genuine thanksgiving is shown when we do those things that glorify God and when we run from those things we have been freed from. If we are honored after insulting the King, instead of being punished, and then go and insult Him again, we deserve the most horrible punishment for our ingratitude. ... For our ungratefulness is seen much more when we insult Him after we have been given honor and attention.

So then, flee from those things we have been freed from. Don't give thanks only with your mouths, lest it be said of us, 'This people honoreth Me with their lips, but their heart is far from Me.' Matthew 15:8

Stewardship



St. Paul teaches us: "Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches" (Gal. 6:6). And again, he says: "Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way, the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:13–14). In other words, ministers of the Gospel are supported by the offerings of those they serve.

And this is how the church lives even now. It is standard practice. But this deserves closer examination. For it instructs us not just *that* we are to give but also *what* we are to give. And it does so with four little words: "In the same way ..." St. Paul is building his case for supporting the preachers of the Gospel with the sacrificial giving of individual members on the example of the Old Testament people who supported the Levites with their offerings and sacrifices. We're to support the Gospel ministry "in the same way." But how did the Old Testament people support the Levites?

Moses records this: "You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that He will choose, to make His name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always" (Deut. 14:22–23). The Levites were supported by the tithe, 10 percent of all the yearly yield of that which was harvested.

Does that seem like a lot? Does it surprise you that St. Paul instructs us that we are to support the New Testament Gospel ministry "in the same way?" If it does, ask yourself: Is the church's job in the New Testament bigger or smaller than the Levites' job in the Old Testament? Back then, there was one Temple, and the ministry was almost exclusively located in one nation among the descendants of Abraham. In Matthew 28, Jesus calls us to teach and baptize all nations, and there are churches and ministries all around the world! How could we support this new Gospel ministry with anything less than the Israelites supported the Old Testament ministry?

Of course, we are free to give more, for we have received more than those in the Old Testament. We have received the fullness of God's revelation, the fullness of His salvation, and the fulfillment of everything that God promised to do. For we have received Christ, God's own Son, in the flesh, who took upon Himself our sins and in exchange gave us His righteousness. The Father claimed us as His own in Holy Baptism. He gathers us together in the place where His name dwells to feast on the first fruits of the resurrection, the risen and living body and blood of His Son – our Lord Jesus. He reminds us that we are His, that all things are ours because we belong to Him. He blesses us here in time with physical and spiritual gifts.

In the same way – and in response to His fatherly divine goodness and mercy – we gladly give to those who proclaim to us "the excellencies of Him who called us out of darkness and into His marvelous light." For once we were not a people, but now we are God's people; once we had not received mercy, but now we have indeed (1 Peter 2:9–10).
