GANG FORMED FOR MURDER.

List of Persons to be Assassinated by Annexationists.

The Honolulu correspondent of the San Francisco Bulletin, after mentioning the arrest of Walker, Sinclair and Crick for conspiracy, adds:

"The Government claims to have the most complete evidence against the alleged conspirators, and other arrests are anticipated.

"The following is an authentic list of the names of those suspected of being engaged in the conspiracy: Sam Parker, half white and ex-Minister of Finance; John Cummins, native and English; J. E. Bush, native and English; A. P. Peterson, American and ex-Attorney-General; Chas. Creighton, lawyer, English, but American born; Antone Rosa, lawyer, Portuguese and native; Dr. Foote, American; Charles Wilson, ex-Marshal, native and Tahitian; J. W. Robertson, ex-Chamberlain, English; John Bowler, Irish-American, contractor and builder; E. B. Thomas, English, stone mason; Jos. Tinker, English, butcher; G. C. Kenyon and Edward Norrie, English editors of the Honolulu newspaper; W. H. Rickard, English mason; James Campbell, Irish, ranch owner; John F. Colburn, ex-Minister of the Interior, half white, and W. H. Cornwell, English, but American born.

In the same letter the correspondent furnishes the startling information given below: "As an offset to this royalist plot the annexationists have a little one of their own, which is quite as deadly in its nature as that of the royalists. The citizens' reserve, which now numbers between six and seven hundred men, all armed with Springfield rifles, and the annexation club, most of whose members belong to the Reserve, play quite an important part in this plot.

"In the event of a royalist outbreak, certain prominent supporters of the ex-Queen are marked for slaughter, and even if the men have not been detailed to do the work, there is a tacit understanding among certain of the citizen soldiers as to which man each is to pick out and go for.

"A member of the Citizens' Reserve has given to the Associated Press correspondent a list of names of those Royalists who are to be killed at the first sign of trouble. It includes nearly all the Royalist leaders and is as follows: Sam Parker, V. V. Ashford, C. W. Ashford, John Cummins, J. E. Bush, A. P. Peterson, Charles Creighton, Antone Rosa, Dr. Foote, Charles Wilson, J. W. Robertson, C. O. Berger, John Bowler, E. B. Thomas, G. C. Kenyon, E. Norrie, W. H. Rickard, James Campbell, John F. Colburn and W. H. Cornwell.

"It is said also that the ex-Queen and Claus Spreckels will be disposed of, and some of the extreme radicals go so far as to say that if Minister Blount interferes in any fight that may occur he also will be shot down."

Kaaua has been connected with Kaunakapili Church for many years, in fact was one of the two oldest members. He has been a trustee of the church for twenty years and chairman of that body for four years. The deceased was 64 years of age at the time of his death. He leaves a widow and other relatives to mourn his loss. The funeral took place this morning from the Kaunakapili church and was largely attended. Rev. J. Wainman conducted the services. The church choir, with Mr. Wray Taylor at the large organ, sang several selections. The remains were interred at Kawaiahae.
