S. Kaali, who for years was employed in C. J. Fisher's store, died Tuesday evening and was buried yesterday in the Kawaiaho Church cemetery. A detachment of the Hawaiian National band preceded the hearse.

A native named Kane will have his headquarters in the Low hotel for the next six months. He pleaded guilty in the District Court today to two charges of larceny, one of tobacco from a Chinaman on the 19th, and another of a pair of clip-pers from a Jap yesterday.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

Seventeenth Day. THURSDAY, JUNE 21. President Dole called the Convention to order at 10 a. m.

Delegate Hitchcock by letter asked to be excused from further attendance on account of illness. Granted.

Vice President Wilder presented a report from the majority of the special committee on woman suffrage. It was against granting the privilege in the Constitution, but recommended a new Article giving the Legislature power to grant it.

Coun. Brown presented a minority report, giving the opinion that woman's proper place is in the home, and recommending that the petition be laid on the table.

Del. Kahane moved the adoption of the minority report. This was a new question and confined entirely to Honolulu. There had been nothing heard about the question in the country districts.

Vice Pres. Wilder moved the adoption of the majority report. One would think to hear the previous speaker that the life or death of this nation depended on the passage of the minority report.

Min. Damon seconded the motion to adopt the majority report with pleasure. They had heard the delegate from Waikua declaim with the fiery eloquence of his race against the idea of allowing women any part in politics.

The Convention adjourned at 12 o'clock till 10 o'clock Monday morning.

Successful Bidders at the Government Land Sale. Twenty-three lots of land suitable for coffee growing were put up at auction at the Executive building at noon to-day.

PROVISIONAL LEGISLATURE.

Regular General Session of the Executive and Advisory Councils. The Executive and Advisory Councils met at 1:30, Vice President Wilder in the chair, with him being present: Ministers Hatch, King, Damon and Smith; Councillors C. Brown, John Ena, Henry Waterhouse, W. F. Allen, J. A. McCandless, D. B. Smith, E. D. Tenney, Alex. Young and John Nott.

Min. Smith presented a petition from a native woman praying for the pardon of her husband in jail. Referred to the Judiciary Committee.

A letter was read from the Board of Education enclosing certain claims from persons at Kahuku, Oahu. Referred to the Minister of Finance.


