LOCAL NEWS.

Three Chinese gamblers were caught yesterday.

Half an inch of rain fell at Kahului, Maui, on the night of October 27th.

Four blooded brood mares were on board the Alameda en route for Sydney.

A large steam engine was unloaded from the Alameda for the Honolulu Iron Works.

The S. S. Zealandia leaves San Francisco for Honolulu on the 10th inst., and will be due here on the 17th.

Forty tons of fireworks for the Jubilee festivities arrived by the steamer yesterday. That looks like painting the town red.

The W. G. Irwin did not sail from San Francisco until the 17th October, and this is therefore only her fifteenth day out.

The schooner Anna arrived at Kahului October 27th, nineteen days from San Francisco, with O. H. Babcock as passenger.

From the quantity of freight brought by the Alameda, there will be some lively shaking out of holiday goods for the next few weeks.

Mr. Daniels, a Seventh Day Adventist preacher from Iowa, on his way to the Colonies, delivered an address last evening at the Gymnasium.

The Honolulu's six oared race boat did not come by the Alameda. It was reported on the dock that Alf Rogers' boat building establishment had been burned out.

On October 22nd the wife of Mr. J. G. Howie gave birth to a daughter at Honouliuli, which is believed to be the first white child born in the district of Kanapali, Maui.

The Library and Reading Room Association desire to acknowledge a further contribution of books from Mr. A. J. Cartwright; also four volumes from Mr. James Morgan.

Officer Kauhane caught a kanaka smoking opium at Cape Horn about one o'clock this morning, and took him with supply and apparatus to the ante chambers of justice.

The Alameda was detained at San Francisco a day waiting for the English mails. Her report appears in our shipping news. She was billed on arrival to leave for the Colonies at six o'clock this morning.

Several familiar faces are again seen in the city, after visits of more or less duration to the Coast—those of Mr. T. J. King, Mr. C. J. Fishel, Mr. C. W. Ashford, Mr. and Mrs. Bowler, and others.

Mrs. D. Saylor, Sr., mother of Mr. Benjamin Saylor, the billiard player, and Henry Saylor, employed at the Hawaiian Hotel, died in San Francisco on October 18th, in the 57th year of her age.

Mr. J. B. Atherton arrived home yesterday, after a visit of several months to the United States. His absence was a felt blank in the business and social life of Honolulu, and his return will be generally hailed with pleasure.

The admiralty case hearing before the Chief Justice did not reach a termination on Saturday. Expert testimony was taken from Mr. Allen, Mr. Sorenson, Capt. Jackson, Capt. Drew, Kalalaina and the native captain of the schooner Mana.

The funeral of the late High Chiefess Kalala took place yesterday afternoon from Honouliuli to Kawaiahoala cemetery. Rev. H. H. Parker, pastor, assisted by Rev. J. Waiamanu, of Kaunakapili Church, conducted the services. The King and Queen, also Princess Lanihau, Governor of Kauai, were present. There was no military display.

A German appeared at the Station last evening with a battered head and a mangled ear. He complained that he had been clubbed by the bootblack at the Pantheon Stables carriage stand, Hotel street. The club was left at the Station as evidence, it being a heavy hardwood handle of some implement and spattered with blood. Up till a late hour last night the alleged assailant had eluded the police.

It is announced in the last issue of the O Luso Hawaiian, that an important robbery was committed, some time during the end of last week, in a house belonging to Mr. Miller, the cabinet maker at Sea View Estate, east of Punahou. Clues have been found which will, it is believed, lead to the discovery of the robber, supposed to be Portuguese, although the Luso hopes that he is not. Very valuable spoil was secured by the robber.

A HISTORICAL EVENT.

Raising the Corner Stone of the Sailor's Home.

At one o'clock on Saturday afternoon the corner stone of the Sailor's Home was lifted from the bed where it had lain thirty-one years. Mr. Geo. Lucas with a staff of workmen performed the interesting operation. From the cavity of the stone was taken a copper box measuring 10 inches by 6 1/2 inches by 5 1/2 inches, closely soldered. The box was handed to Mr. F. A. Schaefer, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Honolulu Sailor's Home Society. The only other trustees present being Messrs. P. C. Jones and W. W. Hall, it was decided not to open the box until the Board gives the word. Following is a list of the contents of the box, from an account of the ceremonies at the laying of the stone in the Friend for August, 1855:—

- 1. Bible in the Hawaiian language, gilt bound.
2. History of Hawaiian Islands (3rd edition), by J. J. Jarves, Esq.
3. Daguerreotypes, 1st, of Kamehameha I., daguerreotypes, 2nd, of Kamehameha II.; daguerreotypes, 3rd, of Kamehameha III.; daguerreotypes, 4th, of Kamehameha IV., (two copies large and small).
4. Copies of Polynesian, Friend, New Era and Elele.
5. Report on Schools and Education.
6. Various publications, relating to the Home.
7. Copper coins, with the impression of "Kamehameha III."

This list is given as it appears in the Friend, without Nos. 4 and 5, one of which is of course the assortment of periodicals. Standing in the front row of spectators at the raising of the stone were four citizens who had stood on about the same spot at the ceremony of laying it, namely: Hon. Jas. I. Dowsett, Messrs. A. J. Cartwright, Horace G. Crabbe and W. W. Hall.

The corner stone taken up on Saturday was laid by Kamehameha IV. on the 31st of July, 1855, the anniversary of the restoration of the Hawaiian flag by Admiral Thomas, of the British navy. The programme was as follows:—

- 1. Prayer. By Rev. S. C. Damon.
2. Laying the Stone and Address. By His Majesty, Kamehameha IV.
3. Music. By "Mississippi Band."
4. Address. By E. H. Allen, Esq., Pres. of H. S. M. S.
5. Music.
6. Address. By Rev. R. Armstrong, in Hawaiian language.
7. Benediction. By Rev. J. D. Strong.

The King's speech breathed a very intelligent and humane spirit, containing the following passage, that the Friend put in italics, "The sailor, the miner, the seamstress, and even the slave, for generations to come, will all have cause to bless the Nineteenth Century."

The speech of the President gives an account of the relation of the whaling business to the islands, showing therefrom the great desirability of the institution about to be founded. It concludes with this passage: "I congratulate you on this event, auspicious for the better condition of seamen at our port. A regard for the foreigners who visit us, an interest in the prosperity of the port and the Kingdom, and the higher and holier regard for humanity, should urge us on to the most vigorous efforts for the success of this enterprise. May this corner stone long remain as the support of a cheerful, happy home, for all those who come from 'old Ocean's' gray and melancholy waste."

In an advertisement the then trustees "gratefully acknowledge the kindly feeling manifested toward the institution by the following parties, to Mr. Thomas for his judicious preparation of the mason work for the corner stone, to Mr. Actrim for daguerreotypes of Kamehameha II. and IV. (two copies), to Mr. Stangenwald for daguerreotypes of Kamehameha III. and to Mr. Sidors, for the copper box, deposited beneath the corner stone, and also to Mr. McGinnis, the proprietor of the water cart on the occasion of laying the corner stone."

Within sixty days after the laying of the corner stone, the building was erected; but it was not opened for boarders until September, 1856. Mr. Harding was the architect, and Mr. C. W. Vincent the builder. Its cost was about \$13,000. The first managers of the Home were Mr. and Mrs. Thurm. The officers of the society for 1855-6 were as follows:—

Electricity in the Jubilee.

The electric light is to take an important position in the Jubilee celebration. By the Alameda yesterday there arrived costly machinery and apparatus for this purpose, together with Mr. A. W. Smith, an expert in the employ of the Thompson-Houston Electric Light Company of New York, who will conduct the operations. Not only will the mere lighting capacity of electricity be displayed, but beautiful effects will be produced by combinations of colored globes. There will probably be an illumination surpassing in splendor any that has hitherto been attempted here. For such an event the credit will be mainly due to the enterprise of Mr. D. P. Smith, who has been here as agent of the above company for several months. As a special plant is to be employed the exhibition will doubtless give the Honolulu public a grander idea of electricity as an illuminant than there has hitherto been an opportunity for forming. Mr. A. W. Smith, the conductor, had charge of electric light exhibitions in New Orleans and Philadelphia. The company referred to above was one of the first in the field of electric lighting, and is always to the front in competing for contracts to light cities, towns or buildings.

Police Court.

There were six charges of drunk on the docket Saturday, each yielding the usual six dollars, namely, D. Malo, Kelihipa, Kekina, Nela, Annie (w.) and Lau Un. Kikibi pleaded not guilty to a charge of disorderly conduct, but it was proved that he took a bottle of gin to a house and asked the wahines to drink, then, when they refused to do so, made use of foul language. He got hard labor for 48 hours with \$3.30 costs. George Bowman was committed to the Asylum, on the evidence of Dr. Webb that he was insane. The trial of Kamehameha, for keeping a disorderly house near the Kakaako salt works, continued from the previous day. The evidence showed that it was a regular hula and rowdy ranch, and that many of the licensed hack drivers act as runners for it. Defendant was remanded for judgment until the 5th inst., to enable the Court to visit the locality.

Released from Custody.

Prior to the final adjournment of the October Term on Saturday last, a writ was filed by the presiding Justice (Preston J.) in the case of the King vs. Ichabod B. Peterson, authorizing the Marshal to release defendant from custody. It will be remembered that July last Mr. Peterson after preliminary examination was committed for trial by his Honor R. F. Bickerton, Police Justice, under a charge of embezzlement. The Attorney-General having certified to the Court that he declines to present an indictment led it to resort to the only open course, that of discharging the accused. Mr. Peterson, up to the time of his commitment, was Assistant Postmaster-General of the Kingdom. Another writ of discharge was also filed in the case of the King vs. Alin (Ch.) who was held in custody accused of committing the offense of perjury.

October Term.

The closing session of the Supreme Court, October term, Justice Preston presiding, occupied forty-five minutes on Saturday. The King vs. Alin, perjury 2nd degree. The Attorney-General declined to present indictment. Ordered that defendant be discharged. A Rosa for the Crown; Jora Austin for defendant. The King vs. I. B. Peterson, embezzlement. The Attorney-General declined to present an indictment. Ordered to be discharged. It was ordered that all matters on the calendar for the term, not otherwise disposed of, stand continued till the next January term.
