

BREAKING NEWS...

At the time of going to print, the latest polio figures are as follows:

- 29 children paralysed by polio in Afghanistan (compared to 13 this time last vear).
- 56 children paralysed by polio in Pakistan (compared to 50 this time last year).

A total of 85 cases so far; which is very disturbing when just 3 years ago, the total for 2017 was just 16.

Meanwhile in Nigeria, no cases have been reported since 2016.

Since the pandemic began, polio programme workers across the country have pivoted to messaging applications, especially WhatsApp, to disseminate COVID-19 prevention and messages communities. This is one aspect of the extensive support being offered by Pakistan polio programme to the COVID-19 response.


Youth News

International Support


It appears that almost everywhere on Earth has been affected by Covid-19. Many countries have been "locked down" and some are facing dire situations. Braunton Caen Rotary has a strong reputation of supporting two International charities.



Approximately £30K has been donated to Shelterbox and Mary's Meals over almost 10 years since the formation of the club. These fantastic amounts are due to the generosity of club members and the general public. Our greatest supporters of Shelterbox are Rinus & Aniet Van de Sande (Broomhill Art Hotel & Sculpture Gardens). They have hosted 10 different concerts and raised substantial funds. Appreciative audiences have enjoyed musical entertainment and fabulous Mediterranean Suppers.

Street collections, talks and film shows, coffee mornings & huge

Rotary support helped achieve the Grand Total. Our most recent donation of £1,180 which will fund two Shelterboxes has coincided with the 20th Anniversary of ShelterBox, a charity which started out life as a Rotary Club project for Helston, and is now Rotary's global partner in disaster relief.



daily nourishing meal for a whole school year. £900 was donated to Marys Meals —£15.90 is all it costs to feed a child for a whole school year.







The humanitarian crisis in many of the poorest countries caused by conflict continues to grow as does the spread of the Aquabox Covid-19 virus. The populations in the poorest countries do not have access to clean water, soap, sanitation or adequate

medical care. For the last two years, Aquabox and its partner charity JOY (Jubilee Outreach Yorkshire) have sent humanitarian aid packages to support the people of Yemen, in the form of supplying safe drinking water and humanitarian aid to those suffering unimaginable suffering. Braunton Caen was delighted to donate £300 which will fund two Aquaboxes, for the next joint shipment to Yemen next month.



A member of Braunton Caen Rotary kindly purchased a Covid-19 crisis pack for Martha, a student sponsored by Rotarians from Braunton Caen. She was very thankful to receive the pack and was able to purchase a radio for learning, five kilograms of beans, five kilograms of rice, a

sanitizer, five bars of soap, and five masks.

For many Tanzanians, the Covid-19 crisis has meant a total loss of income as well as serious health risks. There is no financial support from the government and families are struggling.





The Rotary Club of Braunton Caen

Our club plays a vital role in the local and wider community to support and help those in need. We raise funds by holding events for the local community and donate funds to provide opportunities to individuals and to charities who help others.

We employ a literacy teacher at Southmead Primary School in Braunton, through our Ready Steady Read Literacy Programme. Four children each term are selected by the School and receive dedicated 1:1 tuition by our teacher. Feedback from the School shows that children progress with their literacy, self-esteem, confidence and focus.

We also run a Memory Café in Braunton. During the pandemic we are not able to meet face to face, but are keeping in contact with members by regular phone calls for a chat. We have sent each member a rainbow card, monthly newsletters, a small goodie bag containing activity books and a few luxuries, a Devon cream tea, and this month Rotarian Peter Little's book of Limericks, which was very well received and appreciated by all. We are now planning the next treat for them.

Internationally we support charities such as Shelterbox and Marys Meals (a school feeding programme; and Umoja (a children's education centre in Tanzania); all of which have given huge benefit to many. We also support End Polio Now - Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 30 years and since 1988, we've seen a worldwide reduction in polio cases of 99.9%.

Some of our regular events include:

- A Charity Car Tour, which takes everyone on a round 80-mile drive in the Devon countryside navigated by a tulip map with a quiz for added entertainment. A fun day out for all the family
- Braunton Village Fair, a joint event with Braunton Rotary Club, a day full of fun and entertainment for all the family
- Braunton Wheels, a day when anything on wheels is shown off. There's fun for all the family with cars, side shows, refreshments by the Rotary BBQ and kids rides.
- Santa Sleigh, our favourite event, when we join Father Christmas as he tours the streets of Braunton with his little Rotarian elves spreading the Christmas cheer.

Rotary is always looking for people who want to give back to their communities. Through membership of your local Rotary club, you will become part of a network of 1.2 million members, in 35,000 Rotary clubs all over the world.
