BREAKING NEWS...

35 further cases of polio have been reported since the last newsletter:

- a total of 16 in Afghanistan so far this year (compared to 18 this time last year)
- and 66 in Pakistan so far this year (compared to 7 this time last year).

Pakistan is facing a new challenge: an increasing number of people are using social media to seek and share news. Rumors and misinformation about polio vaccination and the program is spreading like wildfire on social media. This is having a negative impact on the immunization programme.

Meanwhile in Nigeria, no cases have been reported since 2016.

Know Your Blood Pressure Day


Last year, due to poor weather, footfall in the village was low, so our "Blood Pressure on the Green" only managed to test 53 people, though even then there were some who undoubtedly benefited from advice to see their GP.

This year, we tried a different approach. We had our "Know Your Blood Pressure" event, with the support of the Stroke Association, at the August Big Summer Bash on the Recreation Ground.



High blood pressure rarely has symptoms so regular checks are important to find if you have this condition. If left it will cause damage especially to blood vessels heart, brain, kidneys and eyes. If the lower pressure is too low, this is not anywhere as serious usually, but still advisable to have it checked by a GP.

How to reduce high blood pressure:

You can lower your blood pressure by making changes to your lifestyle:

Cut down on alcohol. Alcohol can have a serious long-term effect on blood pressure and research has shown that heavy drinking can lead to increased risk of hypertension for both men and women.

Healthy diet and exercise help to lower blood pressure.

Keep caffeine to a minimum: it can temporarily raise your heart rate and your blood pressure. If you regularly have more than four cups a day, it's a good idea to start cutting down.



Rotary First Aid Tips Of the Month



WHAT DO YOU DO WITH "OUT OF DATE" BANDAGES?

If you are a business then it must have "suitable and sufficient provision for first aid". This normally means a first aid kit. What it contains depends on the numbers of people, the risks involved and the likelihood of occurrence. Bandages have a "best before date" which is a guide to the chance of them being unsafe to use because of contamination through the packaging.

The best advice generally is obtain replacement bandages with a long shelf life then give the out of date ones to a youth group, school, or pre-school so that children can learn about first aid in a controlled environment.

If there is a chance of bandages being contaminated prior to the date on the packet then it would be unsafe to consider them safe to use. However, if someone is bleeding to death would you use a soiled piece of cloth to save their life if that is all you have?

Domestic first aid kits are not regulated. See if you can find someone with common sense to decide what to do.

Braunton Caen Rotary is currently working with Mont Albert and Surrey Hills Rotary Club in Australia to raise funds for Phase One. Summer Programme, Part 2

Coastal Wildlife Sightseeing Boat Trip

As part of the continuing summer programme of outings, on August 28th an intrepid party of Rotarians, their families and friends (totaling 46 in all including some young children) embarqued on an evening coastal wildlife sightseeing voyage aboard







the Ilfracombe Princess. Upon leaving the harbour the catamaran steamed past Damien Hirst's statue, Verity, and turned north up the Bristol Channel. The boat visited the coves of Hele Bay, Samson's Bay and Watermouth Bay, heading in close to shore to see Watermouth Castle and the caves, then onward towards Broadsands beach and Sandy Bay outside Combe Martin. Sadly due to the spring tides, we had to turn for home then in order to enter Ilfracombe harbour with enough water to clear the sand. However on the return journey we were lucky enough to see porpoise playing in the sea as well as a multitude to seabirds. All agreed it was a very enjoyable evening.

Ashford Waste Water Treatment Works

In contrast, two weeks later a hard core of Rotarians and friends, numbering 13, visited the 'South West Water Waste Water Treatment Works' at Ashford. Having been kitted out with high-visibility waistcoats, hard hats and gloves we were taken on a guided tour of the works by Jenny and Berni. It proved to be a very interesting and informative tour, discovering how the water is screened and grit and rag are removed before treatment of the waste water by primary settlement and two stage biological treatment by aerated flooded filter. Final effluent is UV irradiated prior to release to the estuary. As the Taw estuary is an area of outstanding natural beauty, a stop-over for migratory birds and the waters are a designated







shellfishery inhabiting the river and its

tributaries, it was most reassuring to see the care with which the waste water was treated so as not to disturb the river ecology. Our thanks to SW Water for allowing us to visit and especially to Jenny and Berni for their expert knowledge and most interesting and enjoyable tour.
