

This year's theme is "Show Your Work," and a large part of the initial origin of this CFP was the anxiety that ChatGPT has created in our profession. In an era of technological out-sourcing, ChatGPT, for all its tools and upgrades, can't plan and run a conference, and is even less suited to replicate the kinds of camaraderie that come from an event like this.

- A.1. Community and Collaboration: Flipping the Script with Online Composition Stephanie Maenhardt, Brittany Stephenson, Jeshua Enriquez, Ron Christiansen, Emily Beck, Deon Martineau, Beth Howard, Salt Lake Community College
 - Online Plus teaching team, including how Online Plus works, a Writing Fellows program, partnership with librarians, and benefits for adjunct faculty.

• A.2. Unlocking Strategies within the Writing Process

Alexis J. Taylor, Weber State University/Salt Lake Community College

- O This presentation argues that the high-stakes associated with the "product" in writing classes encourages students to take shortcuts with process, including generative AI. This session will explore process stages, demonstrate support strategies, and discuss how we can implement such practices into our instruction.
- A.2. Accessibility in Abundance: Supporting Neurodiverse Students in Writing Courses Thomas Henry, Marianna Henry, *Utah Valley University*
 - This presentation helps to identify common forms of neurodiversity while summarizing the latest research from within the field of composition and external to the field to bring knowledge of these students to the forefront. Further, this presentation discusses best practices for working with neurodiverse students in the classroom, while surveying various strategies to support neurodiverse students.
- A.2. Rhetorical Sound: Bring Back Aural Listening and Learning into College Classrooms Keolanani Kinghorn, *University of Utah, Weber State University*
 - O I respond to Selfe's (2009) call by providing open-source audio and visual aids that students can slow down or speed up on YouTube. Doing this, I found I was able to reduce a multitude of problems for students who needed accommodations and had trouble getting through the assigned reading for various reasons, with a somewhat simple solution."

• B.1. A Collective Process: Long-Term Writing Partners (LTWP) as A Social and Professional Support System

Nayelee Villanueva, College of Southern Nevada and Amanda Carter, Nevada State College.

O The focus of this panel is to provide strategies on how to re-center our own writing and publishing process through Juana María Rodríguez and Emma Pérez's approach of long-term writing partnerships (LTWP) (Hannabach, 2022) as a coauthoring and collaborative writing effort that emphasizes how in the wake of long and sometimes arduous processes, a long-term writing partnership offers a sense of calmness in the chaos.

• B.2. Sabbatical as a Means of Process

Marlena Stanford and Brandon Alva, Salt Lake Community College

This presentation will argue for the importance of sabbaticals at two-year institutions and will share the scholarship and creative work accomplished on our own recently completed sabbaticals.

• Keynote: "failure | sweat | mess: the beautiful necessities of process"

Lisa Bickmore, Utah Poet Laureate

O Lisa Bickmore is the author of three books of poems. The second, flicker (2016), won the 2014 Antivenom Prize from Elixir Press. She won the 2015 Ballymaloe International Poetry Prize for the poem 'Eidolon,' which appears in her third collection, Ephemerist (2017, Red Mountain Press). She is the founder and publisher of the new independent nonprofit Lightscatter Press (<u>lightscatterpress.org</u>). She retired from the ELWS Department at SLCC in 2021. In July 2022, she was named the Poet Laureate for the state of Utah.

• C.1. The Process of Un-knowing: Techniques for Being a Better Teacher

Boyd Nielson, University of Utah

O As a way of approaching writing, and the teaching of writing, this presentation will explore the distinction between curiosity and the unknowable. Drawing from Alain Badiou's understanding of procedure and process, and Noam Chomsky's theory on mind, this talk will demonstrate that writing exactly is the capacity to initiate a reordering intrinsic to mind.

• C.1. Process and Professionalization: 25 Years of the Scully Effect

Gabrielle Wilkosz, Clemson University

O To cope with the increasing demands upon English language educators, this presentation will describe how creative thinking inspired by fictionalized characters and social-science research can lead to real-world improvement toward one's professional outlook.

• C.2. Using Travel as a Metaphor for Understanding the Writing Process

Maggie Walton, Salt Lake Community College

O This presentation will explore how travel is a fitting metaphor to help students not just understand but utilize decision-making in the field of writing by sharing how the stages of a physical journey can easily correlate to the steps of the writing process and how that can be used in the classroom.

• C.2. Incorporating Mental Health Discussions in the Writing Classroom

This presentation will share and invite strategies for infusing mental health awareness and well-being into the two-year college classroom.

• D.1. The Write Journey: Assessing Confidence in Writing Among Summer Bridge Students

Ann Fillmore, Salt Lake Community College

O This presentation shares the process and findings of a research project into whether explicit instruction in confidence-building has a measurable impact on high school students transitioning into college within a summer bridge program.

• D.2. The Large Language Model Writing Assistant

Tiffany Barney, University of Utah, Salt Lake Community College

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is offering new affordances for writing that have previously been limited to students who have access to good writing mentors outside of class. Large language models (LLM's) now make this type of support more accessible by assisting with those mentor tasks.

• Plenary Session: TYCA DEI Toolkit: Collaborative Session for the Committee's Toolkit and Next Steps

This facilitated discussion will share the newly developed Diversity Equity and Inclusions (DEI) Toolkit recently completed by the National TYCA DEI committee. which will be available for use. Participants will be able to share concerns, needs, and progress on their campuses related to DEI initiatives and provide guidance for the National TYCA's DEI committee for future priorities.

• E.1. Community Collaboration: Community-Engaged Learning in English

o Faculty from an Engaged Learning department will discuss their experiences with community engaged teaching in two-year college English and composition classes. They will share how student learning is a collaborative effort between nonprofit organizations and faculty, some challenges encountered, and tips for successful implementation.

• E.2. Symposium: University Transfer Students Offer Guidance on CC Pathways

University of Utah Undergraduate Writing Studies Students, University of Utah

O Undergraduate students share successes and challenges in transferring from two-year to four-year college settings and provide recommendations for faculty to improve the transfer process.

• F.1. Working Together: Collaboration & Mentoring at the Community College

Lynn Kilpatrick, Julie Roberts, Jessie Szalay, Simone Flanigan, Nikki Mantyla, Salt Lake Community College

Participants in an Adjunct Leadership Institute will present on its pilot year that has highlighted and
mentored exemplary adjuncts. Participants will discuss experiences in the Institute as well as share projects,
insights, and suggestions for how full-time faculty can work with and support adjunct faculty.

• F.2. Teaching English at the Two-Year College (TETYC): Meet the Editor

O The journal's editor will share information on the publication and review process, and the kinds of teacher-scholar research the journal is seeking. Audience members will be invited to brainstorm developing one of their in-class best practices into a possible instructional notes submission.




