## PROFILE

Since 2009, Broadnax has worked as a trustee for the Goodyear VEBA, she chair the audit subcommittee and sit on the investment committee. The VEBA was established through a court order to provide health benefits to over 30,000 retirees of Goodyear.

From 2014 and 2019 Broadnax was a consultant to the Emory Beacon of Light, Inc. She served as the primary contact for the Emory Beacon of Light on a Mixed Use, Multipurpose Building Project, The Beacon Center, that will provide 99 units of affordable and permanent supportive housing around a newly renovated church edifice that will be community-based in Northwest Washington, DC

From 2012 to early 2014, Broadnax was Interim Executive Director-Emory Beacon of Light, Inc. She served as the Interim Executive Director responsible for day-to-day operations, grant programs, and community outreach with the Brightwood Community.

From 2005 - 2010, Broadnax worked as a consultant for KPMG. KPMG is one of the big four accounting firms in the USA. She assisted the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) in resolving accounting issues to achieve a clean audit opinion. She reported to the Deputy Chief Financial Officer and performed duties and accounting work as assigned. Traveled throughout the country with the environmental engineers resolving outstanding accounting issues.

From 2001 - 2005, Broadnax was Deputy Executive Director And Chief Financial Officer for Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation. As CFO, she served as the principal advisor to the Executive Director on the establishment and maintenance of an adequate system of internal controls to assure the issuance of reliable financial information in a consistent, reliable, and timely manner. She was responsible for a broad range of corporate administrative functions including financial operations, financial policy, investment, management and premium operations. She had the responsibility of coordinating financial reports with the Office of Management and Budget as well as the General Accounting Office. She assisted in the preparation of testimony for Congress and presentations to other Cabinet-level administration officials.

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## PROFILE CONT.

During 1999 through 2001, Broadnax held both a Director and Treasurer position in Financial Operations Department. She was the first person in the agency to have the dual title of Director and Treasurer. As Director, she was responsible for day-to-day management of all financial operations in the agency. This included financial systems, accounting policy and implementation, and collection of premiums in excess of one billion dollars a year. As Treasurer, she oversaw day-to-day management of the agency's trust and revolving fund investments. This amount exceeded twenty-five billion dollars. It was my job to hire and fire money managers, evaluate reports and implement improvements consistent with our mandate under ERISA.

From 1993 to 1999, Broadnax was Deputy Director of the Financial Operations Department for the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation. As Deputy Director, she shared responsibilities with the Director for management of the department, which included administering all financial accounting systems and operations, the management of policies and procedures, investment administration, and premium income and debt collection. She also served as the acting CFO in the absence of the Director and CFO.

From 1990 to 1993, Broadnax worked in the Department Of Human Services for the Government Of The District Of Columbia. She worked as controller for the largest department in the District and was responsible for the development and execution of a comprehensive program of fiscal policy and financial control. The department had a budget in excess of \$1.2 billion dollars. She was responsible for fiscal and general accounting, budget execution and formulation, as well as all financial system development within the department. She was also responsible for the Medicaid program throughout the City.

Before these positions, Broadnax served in various financial positions for the district government and held various positions including finance officer and executive director at a nonprofit organization that was both federally and locally funded.
