OUR GOAL is to build a rural library; stock it with educational books and media stuff for research and reading. This would allow citizens a comfortable environment for information sharing, learning and access computers and internet for communicating with the outside world.

Our target is to send the books in a shipping container. The cost for shipping one book is \$10.00. The proposed location is at a primary school of about 1600 students and a high school of about 900 students.

By supporting the Sewing Club of 18 ladies, we can expand economic opportunities for women and help them strengthen their families and communities and the economy.
