Feds Rally for Full Funding, 7.4% Raise

AFGE members braved the cold last week to call on Congress to fully fund the government and give them the 7.4% raise they deserve.

Chanting "Do your job! Do your job!" government workers gathered on Capitol Hill as lawmakers had less than three weeks to come up with a funding package before the first of two deadlines hits on March 1. Chaos in the funding process and a constant threat of a government shutdown has hurt morale and hampered efforts to recruit and retain workers. The House of Representatives left D.C. last week and won't return until Feb. 28, a few days before the deadline.

"We are here to send a message, a loud clear message to our senators and our representatives here on the Hill: Do your job! Fund the government!" said AFGE President Everett Kelley. "This is the most basic function of Congress, but right now the House is setting a new low of this functionality. Destructiveness, chaos, incompetence and ignorance, brothers and

sisters...Members of Congress, it's time for you to deliver!"

AFGE members also called on Congress to pass the FAIR Act which would give federal workers a 7.4% raise next year to help close the pay gap between the public and private sectors. Federal employees earn 27.5% less on average than they would doing the same jobs in the private sector.

AFL-CIO Secretary-Treasurer Fred Redmond urged Congress to do their job and do what's fair.

"Some members of Congress only see you as pawns in their self-serving political games. Hell no, you're not pawns! You're patriots! You're heroes! You serve the public day in and day out and you do so with dignity, integrity and professionalism, and today we're going to remind the Congress of that," he said.

Several members of Congress attended the rally in support of federal workers. Rep. Val Hoyle of Oregon was the first to speak and said she has cosponsored the FAIR Act.

"I'm here to apologize that it's not nearly enough. Your pension has been gutted. Your wage has been stagnant," she told the crowd. "And then not to give you staff and blame you when things start breaking. It is not right. It is not fair. You are expected to show up at your job even when the government is shut down and you're not getting paid and you do because you're patriots and you care about this country."

Rep. Nikki Budzinski of Illinois said federal workers have her commitment to keep the government running and to oppose any fiscal commission that would cut our social safety net programs. Budzinski said she's bringing an AFGE Local 96 member April Williams with her to the upcoming State of the Union address on March 7.

'What I hope you know in that is my respect for the work that you do and the issues you fight for every day that I want those to be front and center for all of Congress to see," she said.

Rep. Greg Casar of Texas joined his colleagues in calling for a 7.4% raise for federal workers. He also led a chant "On the hill at the door, what do we tell them? 7.4!"

Also speaking at the rally were Reps. Maxwell Frost, Glenn Ivey, Donald Norcross, John Larson, and AFGE National Vice President for Women and Fair Practices Jeremy Lannan.
