Saying Farewell



In January 2022 Hugh Boyle gave notice that he was stepping down from the Presidency of the Delaware Valley CWRT after 30 years as president. Hugh, of course, had also served as Executive Director and President of the GAR Museum and Library and as a Board Member. Hugh had every intention of remaining involved in the local Civil War community.

At that time, GAR Museum President Joe Perry shared these sentiments with the Del Val CWRT:

"Commitment is what transforms a promise into reality" – Abraham Lincoln. "The Grand Army of the Republic Civil War Museum's success over the past 14 years is due to Hugh Boyle's commitment. His distinguished leadership, as Board Member, Executive Director and

President, inspired cooperation and confidence. He demonstrated a strong ability to identify, analyze and solve problems. His extraordinary enthusiastic spirit motivated the volunteers. His efforts have secured the future of the Museum. We are greatly indebted to Hugh – a friend, a mentor and a teacher."

Sadly, Hugh passed away on March 17 – St. Patrick's Day – while at Jefferson Abington Hospital. Tributes poured in from colleagues and friends of the Museum, the Del Val Round Table, and other organizations, expressing shock and sadness.

GAR Museum Vice-President Andy Waskie and Treasurer Herb Kaufman, who are also members of the Del Val CWRT shared their thoughts on hearing of Hugh's passing:

Free Program Video for January 2022

'The Civil War in Story & Song' by Famous Balladeer Charlie Zahm

Pennsylvania Balladeer Charlie Zahm took us through 4 long years of Civil War through song and story, poems and reflections that illustrate the human experience – both on the battlefield and at the home front – during this most tumultuous time. The arts always reflect the personal side of tragedy and triumph, a window into the souls of those who lived it. In this presentation, Charlie shared with us some of his favorite selections from both North and South.



Several years ago, Charlie's interest in the music of the Civil War was sparked when friends in the Civil War community finally convinced him that his repertoire of Scottish, Irish and traditional American songs was a strong basis for attracting the Civil War community through his music. Charlie boasts a degree in history (one of several in his portfolio). His interest in Civil War history led him to disciplined research of the period, along with how it affected the body of music, so important to its proper understanding. He also located family connections to the war, including Col. Lewis Zahm of the 3rd Ohio Cavalry. A Michigan native, Charlie now lives in Pennsylvania.



February 6, 2022

<u>"Volunteers, Substitutes, & Drafted Men: Enlisting in the Civil War"</u> by Historian Bryan Cheeseboro

Our understanding of the service of the Civil War soldier is typically limited to the man who willfully volunteered, joining the Army after Fort Sumter, and being discharged after Appomattox. While there is no question that most soldiers joined on their own accord, many

means, including the first draft in history at the time, were employed. This presentation provided the story of the volunteer, as well as the other methods used by both sides to get men into uniform.

Bryan Cheeseboro works for the National Archives with the records of the Civil War. He is a reenactor with Company B, 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry. He has been featured on American Battlefield Trust's *Zoom Goes the History* series and Antietam Live: programs. He has written for the *Emerging Civil War blog*. His presentations to the Rock Creek, DC Civil War Round Table include the programs *Outside of Lincoln's White House: Civil War Men and Women of the DC Metro Area; The Grand Reviews of the Civil War;* and *The 1st United States Colored Infantry*. He is also a board member of the Alliance to Preserve the Civil War Defenses of Washington.



March 6, 2022

Women's Lifestyles of the 1860's – by renowned historian Jane Peters Estes

This program described how women lived during the Civil War era and covered everything from society matrons to female spies. Topics included fashion, health problems, career choices, and the "typical" lifestyle.

Jane Peters Estes is well known in the Civil War community as a speaker and tour leader with Starr Tours. She is the author of a number of articles

published in various magazines and periodicals. In addition to being a member of the GAR Museum and Library, Jane is also a member of the Delaware Valley CWRT, the Meade Society, the 28th PA Volunteers, and numerous other historical organizations. Her repertoire of topics includes Victorian civilian life and fashions, Pets of the Past, and the Origins of Memorial Day.

April 3, 2022

"The Conspiracy and the Men Who Killed Abraham Lincoln"

The program originally scheduled for this month was canceled due to the sudden passing of our planned speaker Hugh Boyle. As the General Meade Society dedicated their History Colloquium in his memory, our members were encouraged to support their program entitled <u>"General George</u> <u>G. Meade and the Battle of Gettysburg and Campaign" – A Discussion & Commentary</u> – moderated by Dr. Andy Waskie, President of the Meade Society, and featuring renowned and distinguished Historians and Authors: Jennifer M. Murray and Kent Masterson Brown

May 1, 2022

<u>"Legacy of Freedom - Highlighting the role of the newspapers, especially the *Inquirer* in the reporting of the news in the Civil War" by Ed Colimore</u>

More than 300 years ago William Penn set out to create his "Greene Country Towne," which would "never be burnt and always be wholesome." He wanted the new town to be very different from the congested, disease-plagued London of his time. Penn called his city a "Holy Experiment," a place where people could live in peace and worship freely. In the years between Penn's time and ours, Philadelphia became more like London in its crowding and griminess but glimpses of the "Green Country Towne" are still found in its public squares and in Fairmount Park, the nation's largest landscaped urban park. With its



tolerance and hospitality, the city became the perfect backdrop for a heroic era of ideas that would change the world. This is the birthplace of freedom where the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution were written and debated. The nation's greatest leaders – George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, James Madison and Patrick Henry – walked these streets, worshipped in the churches and lived out the most dramatic period of their lives. In his talk, Ed Colimore followed the footsteps of those who gave us a legacy of freedom. He took us to neighborhoods across the city during the colonial and federal periods, the Civil War and Victorian Age.

Edward Colimore is an author and longtime journalist. He began a newspaper career in 1969 at the Baltimore News American where he was an investigative reporter and columnist. In 1982, he moved to the Philadelphia Inquirer where he was a staff writer and editor for 34 years. Ed covered the courts, police, politics, the arts and military. He also reported on stories from Afghanistan, Qatar, Germany, Colombia, Canada and military bases across the world. But whenever he could, he focused on his interest in military history and the history of Philadelphia, producing hundreds of articles and five books, including *Eyewitness Reports – The Inquirer's Live Coverage of the American Civil War* and four editions of *The Philadelphia Inquirer's Walking Tours of Historic Philadelphia*. The most recent edition came out last summer. Ed also has devoted himself to preserving the history of World War II combat glider pilots like his father who flew three missions. He recently created a new website called <u>ww2gliders.com</u> and a nonprofit 501C3 to raise funds for a bronze monument to honor the glider pilots.

Museum Members At Home, Out, and About

Many of our members attend other events, always with the intention of spreading interest in the Civil War, the GAR, the SUV, American History in general, and the men and women they represent. Even with Covid restrictions, we've been able to present ZOOM programs for other organizations and to attend events with restricted attendance.

Andy Waskie, Herb Kaufman, Jane Peters Estes and Paula Gidjunis presented programs for other historical organizations, and various round tables.

Walt Lafty, Herb Kaufman, Tom Donnelly, and Andy Waskie were among the instructors conducting classes for the Civil War Institute and History Institute offered by Manor College and the Delaware Valley CWRT throughout the year. Programs for the Summer session have been announced and will continue on the ZOOM platform for the foreseeable future. You can find the schedule in this newsletter. As lovers of history, you know how critical it is to keep history alive, especially today! The institutes and the instructors would love to have your support to keep the programs active.

In-Person Programs



A Mississippi River Sojourn by Mary Ann Hartner

This past April, John and I were truly fortunate to be able to cruise up the Mighty Mississippi River on a replica paddle Riverboat. We went for 9 days, a Civil War themed cruise, starting in New Orleans for one night and heading up to Natchez, Vicksburg, St Francisville, Baton Rouge, and Bayou Lafourche on the way down.



The highlight of our trip was visiting the National Battlefield at Vicksburg and of course seeing the USS *Cairo*. I was only disappointed in the fact that we did not have enough time on the field. We only stopped at two places. Our tour guide was a licensed Battlefield guide and was highly informative about the battle, and the events that led up to the actual siege and the surrender. John and I were both surprised by the terrain of the battlefield. It is very rugged!!

When we stopped at the USS Cairo, we were able to have a stop that allowed us to spend time enjoying and admiring the amazing USS *Cairo* and the feat of her coming to her last resting place. She was able to be raised in three pieces and was well preserved because of the cold water of the Yazoo River. Our guide said something very amusing, but so fitting and true, that only Edwin C. Bearss would find this, while we find minie balls.

I could go on and on about all the museums we toured, including one on the Lower Mississippi, and the Great Plantations we toured, but that would take up the whole newsletter. The Curator's Corner ... by Herb Kaufman

We are very excited to let all of our wonderful members and supporters know that we are working diligently to get our historic collection ready in our new location.

Our new building is the Lewis-Pattison House. The property was originally owned by Thomas Holme, the man for whom Holmesburg is named. He

sold this parcel to Robert Lewis and his wife who built the house in 1805. The first two rooms are made of stone and date to 1805. The second part of the house is frame, and was built in 1857, prior to the Civil War. This location at 8110 Frankford Avenue has far greater accessibility for visitors and volunteers.

Our wonderful museum volunteers have worked diligently in securing and moving our historic collection to the new museum. At this time, I am very pleased to advise all our members and friends that this arduous project has been successfully completed. At this time our entire collection of relics, artifacts, photographs, paintings and other historic objects are now safely secured in our new museum.

As you can well imagine moving our vast collection to a new home is a difficult and complex undertaking. We have a wonderful core group of volunteers who have worked diligently in wrapping and packing the relics, photos and artifacts.

We are currently in the process of creating our new and exciting exhibits. We plan on bringing to life many historic objects that have not been exhibited in quite a while. We have already installed a new exhibit focusing on Civil War medicine.

We also have just completed a new exhibit on women featuring many previously unseen photographs and a beautiful mourning bodice along with a bonnet, miser's purse, spectacles, and reticule.

Of course, we will have a new exhibit focusing on the veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic, featuring new and historic photographs and memorabilia.

We are now working on hanging many of our historic portraits and other framed objects and we are developing new exhibit descriptions intended to make your museum visit more educational and instructive.

Our new exhibits will also directly emphasize the individual soldiers. We are exhibiting many objects of personal memorabilia that we can directly link to a specific soldier. Where possible we will feature a photograph or image of the soldier, bringing his story to life.

Preserving an Artifact by Joe Perry

As we began our move to our new location, we had to make a number of difficult decisions concerning some of our furniture. For many years an old table sat in the back library room. The table had previously suffered water damage and was in seriously poor condition. The wood had dried out and the center was broken away. However, museum member Dan Cashin believed that this historic table could be saved.

On May 3, Dan and Henry Connor arrived at the new museum and brought with them a truly beautiful and fully restored gaming table. This table once probably sat in the library at the Post 2 Memorial Hall.



This is a tilt-top game (or center) table designed and patented by George Hunzinger (1835-1898) in 1894. It features his patented hinge that allows the top to tilt and lock into place. One top has

an inlaid chess/checker board and the flip top is green felt for playing cards. The table sits on legs with animal claw feet.





George Hunzinger achieved numerous patents throughout his career and is known for incorporating mechanical innovations in his chairs and tables. His works are found in the permanent collections of many museums, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to Dan and Henry for their outstanding efforts in preserving this fine piece of Civil War and G. A. R. history.

We will proudly display this historical table when the museum reopens in the near future.



FROM THE MUSEUM'S BOOKSHELF Walt Lafty

Fiasco at Fredericksburg

By Vorin E. Whan, Jr. Penn State University Press, 1961, 159 pages



When *Fiasco at Fredericksburg* was first published in 1961, up to that time there were only a couple of books covering the 1862 battle of Fredericksburg. As author and historian Gary W. Gallagher noted in the year 2000, "The battle of Fredericksburg awaits full scholarly treatment. The best study to date is Vorin E. Whan Jr.'s *Fiasco at Fredericksburg*."

Since that time, a few really great books about the battle of Fredericksburg have been published. Among them are included *Fredericksburg! Fredericksburg*! (2002) by George Rable and *The Fredericksburg Campaign: Winter War on the Rappahannock* (2003) by Francis A. O'Reilly.

However, author Vorin E. Whan did not live to see either the comments by Mr. Gallagher or to see the award-winning books of Rable and O'Reilly. Author and U.S. Army Officer Vorin Whan died in South Vietnam in 1967.

Vorin Edwin Whan Jr. was born in 1928. He graduated from the University of Alabama (B.A.) and Penn State University (M.A.). He enlisted in the United States Army in 1950 as a 2nd Lt. and by 1967 he had risen to the rank of Lt. Colonel.

On February 7, 1967, he was serving with *MACV Advisory Team 31 on an operation in the Central Highlands of South Vietnam. The helicopter landed with LTC Whan, another MACV advisor, and a crew of four. They were ambushed and all six members killed. The helicopter was destroyed, then set on fire by the Viet Cong. All bodies were eventually recovered, and that of LTC Whan was brought home to be buried at Fredericksburg, Virginia. His remains lay in the Confederate Cemetery there as a tribute to his love of history and to his service to our Country. (*MACV is Military Assistance Command Vietnam).



His book *Fiasco at Fredericksburg* was published in 1961 by Penn State University and in recent years reprinted publications are available for a very reasonable price via any internet search. The

book is short, only 159 pages, with some maps that provide a good general overview of the situation.

While the previously mentioned books by Rable and O'Reilly are certainly more scholarly and overall better books for the person wanting to "study" the battle of Fredericksburg, *Fiasco at Fredericksburg* is one that is a very good start for the beginner. It is a very easy and quick read with a nice overall summary of the campaign. It provides information on the political and military situation leading up to the battle, covers the fight to cross the Rappahannock River on December 11th, the fighting in the town itself, and the battle on December 13th at both Marye's Heights as well as the southern end of the battlefield against "Stonewall" Jackson. The author also includes the Order of Battle for the Union and Confederate Armies, a Casualty Recapitulation, and a short tactical study from his perspective as a military officer.



GETTYSBURG NMP ANNOUNCES CLOSURES

In order to address safety concerns Gettysburg NMP will close some very popular tourist sites beginning this spring. The closures will affect Little Round Top, Devil's Den, and the Observation Towers. According to the website:

<u>Devil's Den Closure Rehabilitation Project:</u> "Devil's Den closed for rehabilitation work on Monday, March 21. This project will address significant erosion and safety issues in this highly visited area of the battlefield. Devil's Den will be CLOSED for approximately five to six months.

<u>Little Round Top Rehabilitation Project:</u> "This project is estimated to begin in late Spring '22 and will take approximately 18 months to complete. During this time, Little Round Top will be CLOSED. Overwhelmed parking areas, poor accessibility, safety hazards, and erosion will be addressed.

<u>Observation Towers Close for Safety Inspections:</u> "Temporary and intermittent closures of all three of the park's observation towers will take place from April 5 to 8 for safety inspections."

Stories of Posts of the Grand Army......by Walt Lafty

At its heyday, there were thirty-six (36) Posts of the Grand Army in Philadelphia alone. This is part of a continuing series on GAR Posts and GAR History that will appear in the Grand Army Scout

J.K. Taylor Post 182 Bethlehem, Pennsylvania

On 25 May 1869, G.A.R. Post 182 Department of Pennsylvania was organized and named in honor of Captain Jonathan K. Taylor (1842- 1863). Captain Taylor served in Company C, 129th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry (PVI). He enlisted 5 August 1862 and died at Georgetown, Washington D.C., on 28 March 1863. His death was the result of wounds received at Fredericksburg, Virginia on 13 December 1862 while fighting at Mary's Heights.

Post 182 was active in G.A.R. affairs from 1869 thru 1929. They met at the G.A.R. Hall in the Nickums' Building at 41 S. Main Street, Bethlehem. On 19 November 1923, the Post turned over its hall, furniture, and carpet to the Captain O. A. Luckenbach Camp of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW). The Camp agreed to take care of the financial responsibilities of the hall and allowed the Post to continue to meet in the hall following the transfer. They continued to meet until June 1929 and the last meeting minutes are recorded on 7 June 1929.

Taylor Post 182 appears to have had at least 435 members while it was in existence. One of those members was Lewis Franklin Gold who is an ancestor of G.A.R. Museum Board member Mary Wible. Lewis Gold served in Company A, 153rd Pennsylvania Infantry.

The first member registered in the Post Descriptive Book was James R. Roney. A dentist by occupation, he enlisted as a Private in the 128th PVI. He mustered into Post 182 on 25 May 1869 and remained a member until his death in 1913.

The last Commander of the Post was William H. Wohlbach who died on 6 January 1935 leaving only two surviving members of the Post. Commander Wohlbach had served in Company B, 153rd PVI.

The G.A.R. Museum of Philadelphia is fortunate to hold a vast collection of records of the J. K. Taylor Post No. 182. Those records cover the years 1869 to 1929 and consist of thirty-five bound volumes, seven folders, and one binder. There are also a few items from the Captain O.A. Luckenbach Camp of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, dating from 1920 to 1944.

It is not known how the G.A.R. Museum and Library acquired the records or if additional records survived or exist. It is most likely they came from Post 2 in Philadelphia. Newspaper articles at the time the Camp disbanded state that the records were turned over to the Pennsylvania Department in Philadelphia. Like many GAR Post records of the time, those records and some artifacts that came into possession of the Department ultimately found their way to Post 2, and from there eventually made their way to the GAR Museum and Library of Philadelphia.

"There's GOLD in Them Thar Archives" by Mary Wible

Lewis Franklin Gold - 153rd PA, Co. A, Infantry

I often look for Civil War vets for family and friends. Recently I started a tree for my nephew John's wife Gillian. It was on her mom Debra King Grady's side that I found their ancestor Lewis Franklin Gold from Northampton County, PA.

Follow me on my GAR Civil War Museum and Archive journey for Lewis.

After finding some records on Fold 3, I turned to Walt Lafty, our researcher extraordinaire, to see if he could help. He checked the PA GAR Encampment Book for the year after Lewis died. Many of the books have a Memorial Roll in the back which lists the comrades who died the previous year. It includes their GAR Post, regiment and death date. I will be using that research tool from now on. Just know that not everyone is listed.

Lewis belonged to Post 182 which is the J. K. Taylor Post from Bethlehem. Walt then informed me that we had 12 boxes from that post in our archives. Talk about luck. I couldn't wait to get there to research.

Day one started with terrific finds. The first was from a ledger with minutes of meetings which included the deaths of comrades who died with details of the burial. Checking the first meeting after the death date of Lewis brought me to his listing. Wow! I could not believe my luck.

Next was a notation prior to that about him being sick. I was two for two and still had more to find.

Another book listed the dues paid by the Post members. Sure enough, Lewis F. Gold had entries. Three different kinds of documents in just the first day. I was thrilled, but it didn't end there.

As I was putting on my jacket to leave, a large, framed piece on the table that looked like a hand written charter with a seal in the bottom corner caught my attention. It was an elaborate thank you from a Philadelphia Post to the J. K. Taylor Post 182 for their hospitality. I was stunned.

Fortunately, Walt Lafty was there that day sharing in these finds with me. We were both amazed with the number of discoveries.

Another day of research brought his listing in the Record Book. Lewis and his documents continued. It was getting hard to believe my good fortune.

A subsequent trip to our archive got even better. Walt was busy researching something, while I went back to the Post 182 boxes. No luck on the first two, but the third was a winner. I was returning books to it when I noticed a file folder stuck snuggly in the bottom. I opened it, saw the torn document on the top, and jumped back. Whose name was on it? You guessed it. Lewis Franklin Gold. What are the odds? Walt and I could not believe it.

This document was a printed, blank form with questions to be used by the Comrade and Post Historian to prepare for the Record Book. It gave me some firsthand information about his time in Libby Prison when captured at Chancellorsville.

I looked through them and found others from the 153rd PA. Each was in a different writing which made me wonder if the soldiers themselves wrote the answers. What a treasure that would be! Of course, I had no way to prove it – yet!

On our last day at Griscom Street, Andy Waskie came across an old photo of a GAR Post monument with a canon in a cemetery. There was no post name or cemetery name, only the number 482 or 182. Hmmm, I knew 182 was the Taylor Post. A closer look found the word Bethlehem in the corner.

Walt did a quick search on his phone to find that there was no 482 from that area. Could this be 182, and another Lewis F. Gold find?

When I got home, I found the photo online. It is Post 182, and the monument is in the Nisky Hill Cemetery in Bethlehem, PA. Unbelievable!

Herb Kaufman took it home, cleaned it up, and brought it to be framed. It looks great and will hang in our new museum. Stop by to see it.

That brings us to this final piece. Walt located the book of applications for Post 182. Sure enough, Lewis was there. This document had his signature! That is the best find of all as it personalizes things, and it brings Lewis to life for me. It also matches his name on the sheet for the Record Book, and Walt and Herb agree.

I have not made previous application for membership to the Grand Army of the Republic and filed the same with g. R. C. (Signature).

I checked three other men whose application signatures and Record Book forms match. This leads me to believe that the soldiers did actually fill in their papers themselves, although I'll never know for sure.

In addition, I found information elsewhere about Lewis in two other books which supported my research.

He had a brother, two cousins, and a brother-in-law who fought in the 153rd PA at Gettysburg. Lewis was not there after his capture at Chancellorsville.

Check out this uncanny connection. John's uncle was in the 75th PA. Gillian's was in the 153rd PA. These regiments were part of the 11th Corps and fought at Barlow's Knoll on July 1, 1863. Wow!

Gillian's mom Deb Grady is going to join the DUVCW in my tent.

Sean and Deb Grady also made a generous donation to the museum and will be life time members.

So, one never knows what one may find at the GAR Civil War Museum and Archive. For me, it was a GOLD mine.

I am not sure if I found Lewis F. Gold or if he found me. I am just happy that we found each other. Welcome to the family, Lewis, and God bless you for your service to our country.

RESEARCHING YOUR ANCESTOR TUTORIAL VIDEOS (FREE WEBSITE)


In recent newsletters I have provided some research tips specific to records held by this museum as well as other repositories such as the National Archives or websites such as FOLD 3 or Ancestry.com. In most of those articles the suggested sites and resources were specific tips relevant to the Civil War or the G.A.R.

This issue will be discussing free tutorial videos designed to help the novice researcher, but also the experienced researcher who might need a refresher. The videos are educational and provide general genealogical information as well as the Civil War and military research.

The information below is from the website of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (familysearch.org). This direct link from that website will show videos on explaining research tips for various worldwide records.

That link will take to you to the following screen. You can then do a word search in the box below.



Note: Example word search <u>hits</u> corresponds to videos as shown below.

- Ireland 29 hits
- Germany 76 hits
- Jewish 5 hits
- French 13 hits
- Immigration 67 hits
- Military 47 hits

Some tutorial videos are dated (earlier years) e.g., 2009, but still provide basic and valuable research information. Others are more current (2021) with discussions sometimes regarding digital records.

A broad search could result in an enormous amount of hits. For instance, typing in the words genealogy records (not in quotes) renders 680 hits. To narrow down a word search, try using "quotes" as in these examples:

"Civil War" in quotes gives 5 hits (videos) and also show approximate time length of each video. Examples of those include:

- Military Records: Civil War (35 minutes)
- Civil War Genealogical Research (46 minutes)
- Finding the Slave Connection (18 minutes)

"Pension records" in quotes gives 3 hits with one example being:

• U.S. Military Pension Files (1776-1916): A Gold Mine for Family History Research (2021) 46 minutes.

The videos are presented by experienced genealogists on specific subjects and provided free. While you are required to register an account, it is simply an email address and password. There is no charge nor is personal information requested or required for an account.
