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INTERIOR DESIGN: CLASSROOM SEATING REIMAGINED LESSON PLAN

ENDURING IDEA: Throughout time and across cultures, people design furniture to provide comfort and support.

LESSON TITLE: Interior Design: Classroom Seating Reimagined

GRADE/CLASS: Grades 8

TIME ALLOTMENT: (2) 79 minute class periods

LESSON PLAN OVERVIEW:

SUMMARY:

Students will be asked to think like an interior designer to redesign their existing art classroom stool into a customized chair that makes them more comfortable, organized, efficient and happier. They will be introduced to how interior designers research and develop ideas. Students will learn about Eileen Gray (1878-1976), a Modernist architect and interior designer. After a presentation, students will draw multiple components on a stool template to enhance their learning experience and classroom environment.

RATIONALE:

It's important for students to understand how people design and create objects that improve their lives by providing physical comfort, functionality, organization and an elevation of their mental state by being aesthetically pleasing. They will imagine how furniture can made to be functional and aesthetically pleasing. Furniture can enhance a students learning experience and is an important part of a productive classroom environment.

OBJECTIVES:

The student will...

- identify elements to enhance their chair functions of: comfort, focus, organization and aesthetics
- design and sketch a unique chair
- decribe the chair functions with explanatory labels

ASSESSMENT:

1. PRE-ASSESSMENT

Students will draw a criteria grid into their sketchbooks and will consider the

following:

Physical comfort: Will the chair be comfortable to sit at for an entire period?

Organization: Will the chair help to organize belongings? Focus: Will the chair help to focus better on art lessons?

Aesthetics: Does the chair have design?

2. FORMATIVE ASSESSMENT

- · Students brainstorm about good furniture design
- Students are observed and questioned throughout the class
- Group critique

INSTRUCTIONAL PROCEDURES:

DAY ONE:

1. MOTIVATION/ENGAGEMENT/ANTICIPATORY SET:

A classroom stool is placed on top of the front table Students are asked to give a thumbs up if they think their stool is comfortable to sit on. Why or why not?

2. DEVELOPMENT:

Discussion of chair features: movable, transformable, comfort, fabrics

- Can you easily see, hear, and talk to your classmates and teachers?
- Are there parts of your stool that you like?
- Do you like the way your stool looks?

Slide 10: Think like an Interior Designer: What can you change that might make you happier, more comfortable, and more efficient in your workspace?

Slide 11: Grid with criteria: Physical Comfort, Focus, Organization, Aesthetics (Students draw grid in sketchbooks. Discuss examples which are written onto white board: high back, water bottle holder, backpack holder/hook, fabric, pillow, wheels, chromebook charger, etc)

3. CULMINATION/CLOSE: Materials and sketchbooks are cleaned up

DAY 2

1. MOTIVATION/ENGAGEMENT/ANTICIPATORY SET:

Interior Design review of last class: Students are asked to decribe the project and

steps needed and taken.

2. DEVELOPMENT:

- Sketchbook and pencil are taken out
- Students are given stool template with choice of using or freehanding.
 Discussion about using it as an infrastructure to build on or using the back to freehand
- Reminder to add decriptive labels.

3. CULMINATION/CLOSE:

Group critique. Clean-up

PREPARATION:

1. TEACHER RESEARCH AND PREPARATION:

Eileen Gray (1878–1976) was an architect, interior designer and a furniture designer. She was one of the first women to study at the Slade School of Fine Art and one of the few women in the Modernist world. First she was a furniture designer and then she taught herself how to be an architecture and without any formal training. As a female designer working in the 1920s and 30s, her work wasn't always given the recognition it deserved. Gray working closely with many of the outstanding figures of the modern movement, including Le Corbusier and J.J.P Oud. Her most famous piece is the E-1027 glass and tubular steel table. 'To create, one must first question everything.' Eileen Gray







