"I can't believe that's a Watercolor"? Workshop

The title of this workshop is the question that many people asked when I displayed the originals. The rich, bright colors reminded viewers of acrylic or even oil paintings. In this workshop I will demonstrate to experienced and inexperienced participants how to create a beautiful, brilliant watercolor painting.

Workshop participants will have a choice of any of eight 11x14 inch paintings of local scenes and wildlife to create a painting they will enjoy seeing hung in their home.

To begin, I will demonstrate how to properly tape a watercolor sheet to a mounting board. I will then demonstrate various techniques and processes such as masking with fluid or tape, painting different kinds of washes, glazing and layering, pulling color with brush and paper towel, blending, etc. Participants will then be given time to practice any techniques they are unfamiliar with.

Participants will choose an image and, using an outline which I will supply, transfer the outline to a watercolor sheet taped to their mounting board. I will supply a print as a guide to follow for colors and shading. These paintings generally take apx. 12 hours to complete therefore the workshop will be spread across two sessions.

I will explain and assist with techniques to use with each painting and the result will be an 11x14 inch painting ready to be mounted in a mat and framed.
