

President's message...

Once again we had to close for three weeks because of another COVID outbreak, this time in the Modbury area.

Our current COVID Safe plan listing our current restrictions is on the noticeboard by the office entrance. This is about our tenth update which has had many changes over the last 18 months or so.

I have underlined the relevant clauses so you don't have to read all 12 pages.

Our current rules about mask wearing state that although it is highly recommended, because we are communicating with people who are hard of hearing, it is not mandatory. So we can all make our own decision as to whether we want to wear a mask at U3A or not.

I have endeavored to call into as many classes as possible to try to clear up any confusion over our current restrictions. In calling into the classes, I have surveyed all the members and have found we have almost 100% with at least one vaccination, and by now most will have had their second.

So I believe we are as safe here as we are anywhere outside of our home.

There has been some confusion over QR requitements.

Everyone has a legal responsibility to use the QR code if they are able, on entering any establishment including U3A.

All business have to have a backup written list for those unable to use the QR code.

Our backup is our attendance sheets, so if you are unable to use the QR code, make sure you are entered in the attendance sheet in your class. But if you are able to use the QR code, please do, should the need arise, this could enable the contact tracers to warn us much more quickly of someone who may be infected.

Even though we are all vaccinated, we should always try to remember to sanitize our hands on entering the building and each room. This is a basic public health issue that will pay dividends in keeping colds etc at bay.

We will continue to supply hand sanitisers and wipes in the rooms for the foreseeable future, so please make use of them. If anyone notices these supplies missing from the rooms please leave a note in Tony Mittiga's pigeon hole, sometimes these things walk. We have had several rolls of toilet paper disappear.

Tea Tree Gully Council have finally erected their sign at the left of the northern entrance. This is their property and it is at no cost to us.

We may decide to change the existing sign on the right of the entrance, which the Council is going to leave.



The Management Committee has once again decided that it is too risky to plan our usual Christmas get together at Tea Tree Gully Golf Club due to the continued uncertainty of numbers allowed at venues.

Consequently we will again be issuing vouchers for Dimples Restaurant to volunteers and Group Leaders as a thank you for their efforts throughout the year. We can never repeat enough the appreciation we all have for all those that give up their time so that we can all enjoy the classes.

Our Rendezvous 2021 will also not be going ahead. So a big thank you to all those Group Leaders and members who had volunteered their time.































Pioneers Association of South Australia

Centenary of establishment of the Province of SA in 1936 – impetus for formation of Pioneers Association of SA - inaugural meeting 1935.


Birth of the Province – when and why? 1836 – first settlers in SA?
