Year 11 - CURRICULUM BULLETIN AUTUMN TERM 1



What the students are learning in

English	Year 11 will finish their study of Shakespeare's 'Macbeth'. Students will also be taught the remainder of the
	'Power and Conflict' poems needed for their examinations.
	Year 11 will then start a tailored 'countdown' programme that will change on a weekly basis. This will ensure
	full component revision across both English GCSEs.
B4 - 41	Assessment focus: Ongoing class/exam assessment
Maths	Y11 will be focussing on rearranging formulae and will continue their work with equations. They will also investigate how to work with statistics, and the ideas around significant figures and bounds.
	As well as preparing for their mock exams by working through past papers, Year 11 Higher students will be
	studying error bounds, circle theorems, direct and inverse proportions and iterations.
	Assessment focus: Year 11 will be preparing for a mock exam just after the half term
Science	Biology – Students will learn about the nervous and hormonal systems in our body.
	Chemistry – Students will learn about energy changes and the rates of reactions.
	Physics – Students will learn about the interactions of forces which dictate the workings of the Universe.
	Assessment focus: Paper 1 mock exams in all science subjects toward the end of HT1
Computer Science	In Digital IT students are learning about Data Dashboards including the importance of data, its quality and
-	reliability, how to use spreadsheets and present information in a data dashboard. They will cover this through
	theory and practical lessons to enable them to put into practice what they have learnt. Students complete
	their externally assessed coursework for component 2 during this term which is worth 30% of their final
	grade.
	Assessment focus: Coursework completion includes 6 tasks using office applications.
iMedia	Students will be looking at how to interpret a client brief to include the audience, purpose and user
	requirements for their comic strip. They will use a variety of different pre-production documents to support
	this brief interpretation as well as a written interpretation of requirements. This will be covered through a
	variety of theory and practical lessons
	Assessment focus: end of topic multiple choice test and sample exam questions, completed task 1 for
	practical assessment
Geography	We will begin with our topic on global climate and extreme weather. Focusing mostly on different pressure
	systems, the hazards they create and microclimates
	Assessment focus: End of unit test
History	Students will begin with the completion of our work on Elizabethan England, and the social changes that took
	place. They will then move onto completing their study of American West.
Religious Studies	Assessment focus: Time-lagged assessment on Elizabethan England. Students will continue with their study of 'Issues of Life & Death' this half term. They will explore controversial
Religious Studies	issues such as abortion, euthanasia and capital punishment, developing their own opinions and applying
	Christian beliefs to these topics.
	Assessment focus: End of unit test (Issues of Life & Death)
Spanish	In Spanish lessons students will focus on developing their ability to Read, Write, Speak and Listen on the topic
•	of 'school rules'. They will build on their Key Stage 3 knowledge of 'School' and continue to develop their
	ability to give detailed and more complex opinions, and to use conjugated verbs in at least 3 tenses; present,
	past, and future.
	Assessment focus: Weekly vocab tests and Check 20 quizzes.
Art	In Art, students will start their Unit 1 major project. The starting point is Diversity, so students will be expected
	to develop and explore and this as they progress. They will continue with their exploration into Vakseen the
	artist and develop their own ideas based on his work.
