Church membership is a process that formalizes the Christian's commitment to a particular congregation.

II. The Case for Membership

- a. Biblical Arguments
 - i. Shared commitment defines the local church (Matt 18:19-20).
 - ii. The local church must be visibly distinct from the world (Matt 16:19; 1 Cor 5).
 - iii. The local church must have defined pastoral relationships (Heb 13:17; 1 Pet 5:1–3)

b. Practical Arguments

- i. Provides an affirmation of your salvation (Col 1:3–8).
- ii. Ensures that only qualified people can serve in areas that represent the church (e.g., children, music, teaching, finances, legal, counseling).
- iii. Provides a way to regulate the church's teaching ministries (1 Tim 1:3).
- iv. Forms a voting body for affirming important decisions by the elders (e.g., annual budget, property purchases, ordination of elders).
- v. Helps existing members know when someone has decided to join us.

d. Summary

Formal church membership is a practical application of Christ's command to make the true church a visible reality. It also provides numerous practical benefits to the pastors and the people. On the other hand, a church with an undefined membership blurs the line between the church and the world and eventually leads to spiritual decay.

b. Affirm that salvation is through faith alone in Christ alone (Gal 1:8; 2:16; 5:4).

c. Affirm the sixty-six books of the Bible to be the church's sole infallible rule of faith (2 Tim 3:16–17).

d. Baptism by immersion as a believer (Matt 28:19; Acts 2:38, 41).
