

On November 2, 2021, the city of Detroit is holding general elections for mayor, city council, clerk, and board of police commissioners. A primary is scheduled for August 3, 2021. The filing deadline for this election was April 20, 2021.

FUTURE FOR FAIR ELECTIONS

Thanks in part to targeted work by Michigan's nonprofits, voters passed an amendment to Michigan's Constitution, establishing the state's first Independent Citizen Redistricting

1

Commission (MICRC) in 2018.

To achieve the creation of fair and impartial Michigan district maps, nonprofits statewide are helping citizens understand how the new redistricting commission works, what's at stake, and encouraging their communities to participate in the process. Randomly selected from over 9,000 applicants, the MICRC is composed of 13 citizens from across the state. They include four people who affiliate with the Democratic party (D), five Independents who do not affiliate with either major party (neutral - N), and four who affiliate with the Republican party (R). The members of the inaugural MICRC are: Douglas Clark (R), Juanita Curry (D), Anthony Eid (N), Rhonda Lange (R), Steven Terry Lett (N), Brittni Kellom (D), Cynthia Orton (R), M. C. Rothhorn (D), Rebecca Szetela (N), Janice Vallette (N), Erin Wagner (R), Richard Weiss (N) and Dustin Witjes (D).

The MICRC meets weekly on Thursdays. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, these meetings take place virtually. Once in-person meetings are restored, the MICRC will meet across the state of Michigan. Please visit www.michigan.gov/MICRC to find out meeting locations and times.





Detroit's = primary election is on August 3, 2021. The Detroit General Municipal election is on November 2, 2021. Both elections will have major implications in the city of Detroit for the next four years. We encourage everyone to participate in the political process by voting and becoming an Election Day poll worker. Detroit has 503 voting precincts and 134 absentee counting boards. Citizens who are 18 years of age or older must be registered voters of the State. They cannot be a challenger, candidate, or member of a local Board of Canvassers. Anyone convicted of a felony or an election crime may not serve. Citizens who are 16 and up can also apply and work as precinct inspectors.
