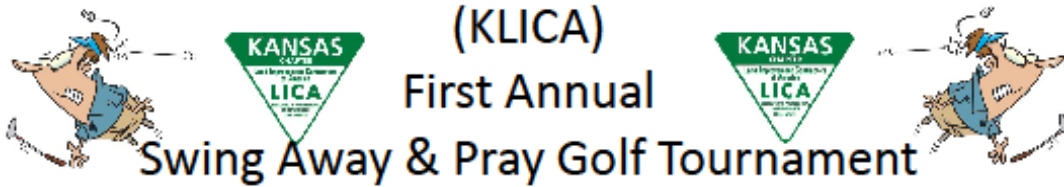
The sun is trying to shine, our yard is sprinkled with the "gold" of many jonquils. A new baby in the pasture, more on the way.

Plastics & Polymers - Pipe Prices

LICA is hearing more and more from members about the continuing price increase and availability of plastics products. The situation is impacting drainage, packaging, bottling, medical supplies.....you name it and if plastics are involved a scramble is underway now for product. After a fairly consistent and predictable market the past few years, a series of unforeseen events has significantly upended the supply of plastic products. There was the dispute between the Mexican government and a dispute regarding natural gas costs led to the Mexican government shutting off the supply of natural gas to a plant literally in the middle of the night, taking its output to zero immediately. This tipped the balance of supply and demand in the Gulf region just enough to stabilize, and even slightly increase PE prices in North America through the remainder of December, which was a surprise to everyone involved according to Reuters. Plastics production took another hit when the deep freeze in Texas put most refineries and reactors large and small on hold as the State's power grid took weeks to recover. Industry experts see continued strong demand, low inventory levels, and ongoing supply constraints continuing to put pressure on the market.

LICA Supports Technical Assistance

LICA joined over 70 organizations in a letter to Congress calling for robust discretionary funding and support for Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) field staff through the Conservation Operations and Conservation Technical Assistance programs. The letter emphasizes that technical assistance is essential for the delivery of conservation support for farmers, ranchers, and forest landowners across the country by providing capacity and conservation planning to support conservation practice implementation.

In the 2018 Farm Bill, Congress reaffirmed the importance of voluntary, incentive-based conservation by maintaining level funding overall for the conservation title. Demand for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) consistently exceeds available dollars by at least two to one; in some years, USDA has been forced to turn away as many as three-quarters of eligible applicants. We are pleased that, since fiscal year 2018, appropriations legislation included no cuts to these programs below authorized levels, and we urge you to ensure that Farm Bill conservation programs remain fully funded in the FY 2022 appropriations bill as well.

Roadbuilders Optimistic - Massive Infrastructure Bill Debate Begins

The American Jobs Plan was released March 31 by the White House and unsurprisingly drew mixed reactions from congressional leaders. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) called the plan “a visionary, once-in-a-century investment in the American people” and vowed to get a bill through the House of Representatives by July 4. Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) cast doubt on Republican support, stating “my view of infrastructure is we ought to build that which we can afford, and not either whack the economy with major tax increases or run up the national debt even more.” Senator Joe Manchin (D-W.Va.), who will play a critical role in any infrastructure package discussions, had a different take. “Infrastructure, my God, when you think about it, that pothole doesn’t have an R or D name on it, it’ll blow your tire and ruin your car, it doesn’t care,” Manchin said. “So, don’t you think infrastructure is something that could bring us together?”

Simply maintaining federal surface transportation program funding at current levels would require finding \$70 billion for the Highway Trust Fund. Top White House and administration officials told senior ARTBA staff this week their proposal reflected a set of “principles.” The House and Senate will still be responsible for drafting and passing a bill. If the measure does not receive any Republican support, congressional Democrats are expected to use reconciliation, a complicated process that requires only a simple majority vote in the Senate for passage.

The Biden administration’s Fiscal Year 2022 budget is expected later this month. Procedural obstacles are being addressed in the Senate to at least allow for consideration of what would be a historic infrastructure funding initiative. As the Administration and congressional leaders sell the concept to the American people, House and Senate committees prepare surface transportation legislation on their own. The federal highway and transit expire on September 30 so the clock is ticking on congressional action this summer on a 10 year infrastructure plan.

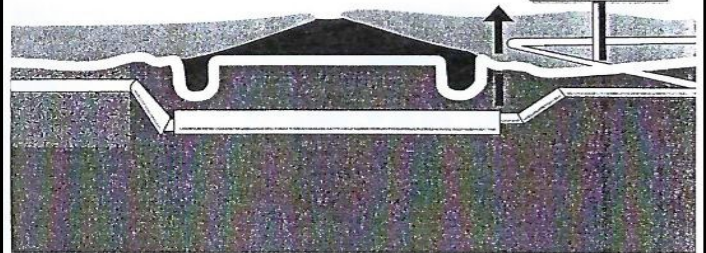
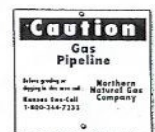

Keeping it Safe

As the weather starts warming up everyone is going to get busier. As jobs back up and the pressure builds to get jobs done don't overlook being safe and preventing accidents to ensure you're able to get to that next job. Although this is by no means a complete list here's a few things I found online or picked up somewhere.

- 1) Take your time and don't get in a hurry. This one's pretty simple but also easy to ignore as we look for shortcuts to "getting down the road". Just slow down and take care of business.
- 2) When moving even short distances properly secure all machinery and equipment. It's easy to think "I'm just moving a couple miles down a township road". But the unexpected can happen just as easy in those couple miles - take the time to eliminate any opportunity for mishaps.
- 3) Wet weather and mud makes surfaces slippery. Keep your hands/gloves and boots as clean and dry as possible. This makes it easier to get on/off and operate machinery.

- 4) Keep windshields and windows clean to ensure good vision. If you wear glasses have a cleaning cloth to wipe moisture and mud off your glasses and keep them clean.
- 5) Be sure to always have rain gear and a warm jacket on hand. Spring weather in the Midwest can change in minutes and unexpectedly - be prepared.
- 6) Be aware of the forecast. Spring in the Midwest means thunderstorms with strong winds, hail, and tornadoes always a threat. Don't get caught out in the open on top of a hill when these move in.
- 7) Maintain communications with other workers and be sure someone knows where you are working. This is always something to keep in mind with numerous individuals on a worksite and when working in remote areas.

I understand these are pretty basic but it's easy to get in a hurry and overlook some of these things - especially after a long winter and spring brings a long list of jobs to get done.
