






more work possible, more pasture and farm ground gone. Our roots are deep in the piece of land.



News & Notes

- A report from The National Weather Service indicates it may be another rough spring for the Northern Corn Belt. The report indicates a high risk of flooding again this spring in a region where the ground is already saturated. USDA Meteorologist Brad Rippey tells *Agri-Pulse* that adding a wet spring to already high river levels and snowpack offers a "three-pronged recipe" for disaster. "It's only mid-February but given the forecast and antecedent conditions, we are looking at a broad area, especially across the northern Corn Belt, facing what would be the likelihood of fieldwork delays," he says.
- The administrator of USDA's Risk Management Agency, Martin Barbre, presented the latest numbers on 2019 prevented planting claims at the annual Crop Insurance Industry Convention. Farmers filed claims on 19.1 million acres, claiming indemnities totaling \$4.3 billion. That includes \$2.6 billion in benefits on 9.6 million acres that were supposed to be seeded to corn. South Dakota had the largest number of prevented planting acres, 3.9 million, followed by Illinois and Ohio at 1.44 million acres each. Missouri was next at 1.3 million acres.
- A group made up mostly of environmental organizations plans to sue EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers over the new "waters of the U.S." rule, alleging the agencies did not properly consult with federal wildlife agencies over the impact the rule would have on endangered species. The EPA-Corps rule would categorically remove ephemeral streams from protection under the Clean Water Act, and limit protection of intermittent streams depending on their flow. "EPA's action in repealing protections for categories of wetlands and other waters will have significant real-world impacts on those waters and the specific endangered and threatened species that rely on them," the groups, led by the Center for Biological Diversity, say in their notice of intent to sue EPA and the Corps. The Center for Food Safety and several Waterkeeper groups also signed on.
