Notice: Bees in the Park:

Al Meyer reports that there is an area approximately 20' X 20' on the East side of the Banff bridge that has a swarm of non-lethal bees. "I captured two of them in a bottle and took them to Merrfield Garden Center. They told me the bees are a type of Andrena Digger Bees that pollinate our trees and flowers. They appear in Spring and last about a month and then disappear.

Soooooo, don't be concerned if you see them this month."

Zika alert from Fairfax County Health Department

We recently received a letter from Fairfax County Health Department asking us to provide you with information about how to protect yourself against spread of the Zika virus. Although we have edited slightly for brevity, we have included most of the information sent us. More information can be found on the County website at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/hd.

As you prepare for the warm weather ahead, the Fairfax County Health Department reminds you that mosquitoes and the diseases they carry are always a concern this time of year. Zika virus was detected for the first time in North America in 2016 and the virus can cause serious birth defects and other problems with pregnancies. While the virus has not been found in mosquitoes in Northern Virginia, it poses a risk for those who travel to areas where Zika is active and return home infected with the virus.

To minimize that risk, it is important that residents remain vigilant about controlling mosquitoes around their homes and protecting themselves from their bites by doing the following:

Control mosquitoes where you live:

- **Eliminate standing water.** Tip and toss standing water each week from artificial containers like tires, buckets, flower pots, corrugated drain pipes, tarps, etc. Mosquitoes can breed in as little as a teaspoon of water.
- **Treat standing water with a larvicide if it cannot be eliminated.** If you cannot get rid of the water, treat it with a mosquito-specific, environmentally-friendly product such as Mosquito Dunks®, which are available at

hardware stores and garden centers. Follow label instructions when applying.

- **If mosquitoes are biting, consider treating your yard with an insecticide.** When used according to label instructions, an insecticide can help control biting mosquitoes. Pay attention to areas where they hide, such as dense vegetation and ground cover.
- **Organize a neighborhood clean-up.** Get rid of litter and debris, discard old tires and manage vegetation that mosquitoes may be using as hiding places.

Protect yourself and your family from mosquito bites:

- **Wear an EPA-registered insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR 3535.** Insect repellent is safe and effective for children and pregnant women, too. Always apply according to label instructions. If using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first and then repellent.
- **Dress to protect.** Cover exposed skin by wearing loose-fitting, light-colored long-sleeved shirts and pants. For extra protection, treat clothing with permethrin or purchase permethrin-treated clothing and gear. Never apply permethrin on skin and always follow label instructions.
- **Keep mosquitoes out of your home.** Keep doors and windows closed. Make sure screens are in good repair.

Street Lights Needed for Wakefield Chapel Road

As many of you are aware, there are no street lights on Wakefield Chapel Road for our WCWHA community. The Board is interested in trying to resolve that matter with little disruption to the neighborhood

and NO cost to our association. In order to proceed it is necessary for the HOA to petition Fairfax County to install such lighting. At the present time, there are no county funds available for the project. It is the Board's desire, however, to get the ball rolling by filing a request with the county to install such lighting. *In order to proceed, we need the approval of affected home owners on Wakefield Chapel Rd.*

It is important to note that no work will be commenced in the near future. The project is dependent on county funding and it is uncertain when that would be available. In the meantime, it is necessary to get our request filed with the county. To accomplish this, a Board member will contact residents in the affected homes to ask those residents to sign the petition to file our request with the County. *For more information, please review the information concerning street lights on the Fairfax County webpage at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dpwes/construction/streetlights/light_main.htm.*

You can, of course, go to any one of the temporary plant stands in the area, to a local nursery or big box store like Home Depot for a great assortment. Fairfax County Green Spring Gardens (located on Green Spring Rd, Alexandria – just outside Annandale) may also be able to help if you don't want to go the route of professional landscapers. Their Garden Gate Plant Shop is now open

Monday – Saturday 9 am-4 pm, Sunday noon-4 pm. where you can buy plants specially chosen to do well in our local growing conditions. They also offer plants featured in Green Spring's gardens. You can get 10% off at the shop if you join Friends of Green Spring (FROGS).

Saturday, May 20, 9am. -3 pm Green Spring will sponsor and host the **Spring Garden Day Big Plant Sale** where more than 40 local garden vendors offer beautiful and unusual plants for sale. Growers and master gardeners will on hand to help with plant selections and offer gardening advice. FROGS will also receive 10% off at this sale.

Sharing Neighborhood Service Resources (by Donna Caruso, Banff St.)

Today I am sitting here looking out my sparkling window, delighted with how well a service shared with me by a neighbor worked out. I was looking for a service or handyman to power-wash our disgustingly filthy deck. The handyman I had contacted to do the job did not get back to me as he had promised so I was not a happy camper. My neighbor shared a resource she had just used for gutter cleaning and was happy with the service. Turned out this company, **Sonshine Cleaning Service (703-932-0351)** also does power washing, window cleaning, carpet cleaning, and air duct cleaning as well as gutter cleaning. I hired them for my deck power washing at a reasonable \$160 (not cheap, but reasonable). Needing my windows washed as well, I reluctantly agreed to what I thought was an exorbitant

\$265 until I counted all my windows (17 plus 2 basement), 2 glass doors and 2 porch skylights. **Carlos Cordova's** crew of 5 did an amazing job. It was well worth the price. They were prompt, efficient and thorough (my window sills even shine on the outside). They did everything I expected and more. One of the workman responded to a question that he just wanted to make the customers happy! I would definitely recommend them.
