Turkey Run Creek Erosion

Welcome to the Turkey Run Creek erosion update! An erosion committee was formed during the spring of 2019 which led to a proposal to put in preventative measures to help control the erosion problem along our section of the creek. The proposal included a phased approach to help control and reduce bank erosion by preventing sediment from leaving the banks of Turkey Run Creek. With the Board approval to move forward, we were fortunate to obtain free shrub seedlings from Fairfax ReLeaf. Fairfax ReLeaf is an independent, non-profit organization of volunteers who plant and preserve trees, improve community appearance and restore habitat on public and commons lands in Northern Virginia. This would not have been possible without Brian Kiviat, who was our main contact with Fairfax ReLeaf. **A BIG THANK YOU to Brian!**

Our next challenge was to gather volunteers to get the seedlings in the ground. **A BIG THANK YOU to Al Meyer**, who was instrumental with connecting us with the Read Family, we were able to secure volunteers from Patrick Read's Boy Scout Troop. Patrick, who is currently in the process of completing his Eagle Scout requirements, submitted a well thought out erosion plan that included a timeline, water-tolerant plant suggestions and strategic planting pattern so the seedlings would have the space to safely grow. Under Patrick's leadership, he coordinated several Boy Scout volunteers to plant shrub seedlings on Saturday November 2, 2019 between the Banff Bridge and up towards the Truro border. In addition, his coordination and leadership led to the proper installation as

recommended by the Fairfax ReLeaf. As a result of their efforts, this will help maintain a level of sustainability along Turkey Run Creek for years to come. We would like to give a **BIG SHOUT OUT to Patrick Read and Boy Scout Troop 1523!**

We would also like to thank Girl Scout extraordinaire, Annika Miller and her girl scouts, who completed a planting of seedlings on Saturday, March 21. Annika, who coordinated this effort, is working on her Gold Star Award. The Gold Star Award is the highest award and stands for excellence and leadership for girls everywhere who make a difference in their communities and beyond. Annika has also been working with Fairfax ReLeaf and is developing a plan that will help provide a sustainable and lasting benefits. We're thrilled that she's chosen Turkey Run Creek. **A BIG SHOUT OUT to Annika and her Girl Scout Troop!**
