

I've spent much of my life steeped in symbols—mythology, tarot, the language of archetype and intuition. And just as deeply, I've been in love with the magic of silent film. There is something profoundly human in those black-and-white reels: the longing in a glance, the courage in a pose, the heartbreak in a shadow. Without words, these actors said everything.

This deck was born from a question that haunted me: What if the archetypes of the tarot could step onto the silent screen?

And what if, in doing so, they helped us see ourselves more clearly?

As the director of this deck, I have cast iconic figures from early cinema to play the roles of the Fool, the Empress, the Lovers, and more. They come to life again here—not as distant memories, but as timeless guides. I've chosen each scene with care, framing emotion, character, and meaning in a way that speaks through stillness and symbolism. Each card is a frame from a film that never existed, yet somehow always has.

Whether you're new to tarot or a seasoned reader... whether you're a film lover or a curious soul, this deck is meant to draw you in and light something within. It's not just for reading—it's for watching, feeling, imagining. Just as the best films leave something unsaid, the Silent Cinema Tarot invites you to fill the silence with your own truth.

So sit back. Relax. Let the curtain rise.

The screen is blank, the reel is ready, and your story is about to begin.

The Major Arcana: A Cast of Archetypes

The Major Arcana are the headliners of the tarot stage—the iconic stars whose roles speak to universal moments of transformation, challenge, awakening, and truth. In the Silent Cinema Tarot, these 22 cards are reimagined as a cast of cinematic archetypes, portrayed by the actors and characters of early film who best embody their essence.

Each card in the Major Arcana represents a scene from the greater film of your life. These are not background roles or fleeting cameos—they are pivotal plot points. From the moment the Fool takes his first step to the grand finale of the World, the Major Arcana takes you through the Hero's Journey, projected in silver and silence.

In creating this deck, I carefully matched each archetype with a figure or film from the silent era whose expression, posture, or narrative mirrors the spiritual themes of the card. Whether it's the commanding presence of the Emperor, the mystery of the High Priestess, or the cosmic symmetry of the Star, each image invites you into an emotional and symbolic landscape.

You'll notice that many of these characters don't speak with words—they speak with eyes, hands, bodies, and shadows. And like tarot itself, they rely on intuition, impression, and deeper meaning to tell their stories.

Reading the Major Arcana in This Deck

Watch the Character: Each figure was chosen for their ability to embody the card's meaning. Imagine them on screen. What's their mood? Their motion? What story are they living?

Feel the Scene: Consider the lighting, background, and framing of the image. Silent film is all about atmosphere—let it speak to you the way tarot does.

Enter the Arc: The Major Arcana are not isolated symbols—they are part of a greater unfolding. Every card is a scene, and you are the one moving through it.

From the Fool to the World

The journey begins with The Fool (o)—a symbol of innocence and infinite potential—and unfolds through 21 archetypes, ending with The World (21), a card of completion and fulfillment. Along the way, we meet guides, face trials, fall in love, discover power, and awaken to a deeper self.

In the pages ahead, you'll meet each member of this unforgettable cast. Some may already feel familiar. Others may surprise you. All are here to help you find your role—and your voice—within the ever-turning reel of life.

O. THE FOOL

Actor/Character: Charlie Chaplin as The Tramp Film & Year: Various films (The Tramp, 1915 onward)

Classic Image Description:

The card shows Charlie Chaplin's iconic Tramp character standing on a quiet street corner. Dressed in his trademark ill-fitting suit, bowler hat, and carrying a cane, he gazes upward with an expression of hopeful innocence. Beside him sits a loyal little dog, looking up with affection.



Tarot Meaning

Upright: New beginnings and fresh starts. Innocence and spontaneity. Courage to step into the unknown. Trust in the journey ahead. Freedom from convention and expectation.

Reversed: Recklessness or foolish risk-taking. Lack of direction or naivety. Hesitation or fear to take the leap. Ignoring consequences or warnings.

Behind the Curtain

The Fool is the eternal wanderer — the soul about to take its first step on a grand adventure. This card invites you to embrace curiosity and trust your intuition, even when the path is unclear. Like Chaplin's Tramp, who journeys through life with a mix of humor and heart, the Fool reminds us that beginnings often come with uncertainty but also great potential. Whether you are about to start a new project, relationship, or chapter in life, let go of fear and step forward with playful courage.

1. THE MAGICIAN

Actor/Filmmaker/Magician: Georges Méliès Notable films: A Trip to the Moon (1902) The Kingdom of the Fairies (1903) The Impossible Voyage (1904)

The Scene:

As the velvet curtains open, George Méliès stands center stage—his arms raised like a conductor summoning both matter and magic. Around him swirl ethereal dancers of light and thought, mushrooms bloom from celestial soil, and invisible forces respond to his will. A trick of the eye? Or the raw power of intention made real?



Tarot Meaning

Upright: This is your cue. All the tools are within your grasp, even if you can't see them. You possess the knowledge, presence, and energy to bring your visions to life. Lead with intention. Create with focus.

Reversed: Misdirection or self-doubt may cloud your magic. Are you manipulating or aligning? When power is scattered, even the best illusion falls flat. Reconnect to your deeper purpose and restore your balance.

Behind the Curtain

Georges Méliès (1861–1938) was not only an actor and magician, but a pioneering filmmaker, designer, and illusionist. Known for A Trip to the Moon (1902), Méliès invented groundbreaking special effects, built fantastical sets, and was the first to bring true magic to the screen.

2. THE HIGH PRIESTESS



Actress/Character: Theda Bara as Cleopatra Film & Year: Cleopatra (1917)

The Scene:

With kohl-lined eyes and regal bearing, Theda Bara's Cleopatra embodies the High Priestess's timeless aura—enigmatic, intuitive, and deeply attuned to the mysteries of the unseen world. She sits prominently on a crescent moon above the waves of emotions. In an era when women on screen were either temptress or innocent, Bara's Cleopatra was something more: a keeper of ancient power, unafraid to wield it with divine poise.

Tarot Meaning

Upright: The High Priestess invites you to turn inward and honor your intuition. Your power lies in what is unspoken, unseen, and sacred. Embrace the mystery, seek deeper knowledge, and trust your inner knowing. It's a moment of stillness, of sacred silence before the next scene.

Reversed: When reversed, the High Priestess warns of blocked intuition or secrets kept too tightly. Like a silent film with missing reels, the full story isn't being shown. You may be ignoring your instincts or relying too much on outside validation

Behind the Curtain

Theda Bara, one of early Hollywood's first screen legends, revolutionized cinema with her hypnotic presence and bold portrayals of mythic women.

3. THE EMPRESS



Actress/Character: Mary Pickford as Molly

Film & Year: Sparrows (1926)

The Scene:

A farmer and his wife operate a dismal "baby farm" near an alligator-infested swamp. Molly, an adolescent inmate and the oldest of their charges, attempts to provide the other poorly clothed, starving kids with loving maternal care.

She becomes an archetype of the Empress as guardian, healer, and fierce maternal presence. Her character resists tyranny and brutality with love, endurance, and emotional courage. This interpretation honors the Empress not only as a symbol of fertility and beauty, but as a creative and protective force, willing to risk all for her "children."

Tarot Meaning

Upright: Then You are surrounded by the energy of growth and nurturing. Now is the time to cultivate your ideas and support those around you. Trust your intuition and embody compassion.

What you plant will bloom.

Reverse: Neglect of self or others. Creative stagnation. Overwhelmed by demands or emotionally depleted. Reconnect with what nourishes your body and soul.

Behind the Curtain

Mary Pickford, "America's Sweetheart," used her fame to create strong, emotionally layered roles for women. As the Empress, she brings power to tenderness — a voice for care, creativity, and the sacred act of protection.

4. THE EMPEROR



Actor/Character: Emil Jannings as Pharaoh Amenes Film & Year: The Loves of Pharaoh (1922)

The Scene:

Emil Jannings brings regal intensity to the role of Pharaoh Amenes. Clad in ornate robes and framed by monumental columns, he becomes the living embodiment of ancient authority. Every gesture is heavy with consequence. Every word unspoken carries the weight of empires. This Pharaoh is both divine ruler and fragile man—bound by duty, driven by pride, and undone by passion.

Tarot Meaning

Upright: Authority, stability, leadership, legacy. You are called to claim your power and wield it responsibly. This is about taking ownership of your path, bringing order where there was chaos, and ruling wisely over your inner and outer worlds.

Reverse: When reversed, The Emperor warns of misuse of power, overcontrol, or rigid thinking. You may be acting out of fear, forcing order where flow is needed. Alternatively, it may reflect a resistance to authority or the presence of a domineering influence stifling your growth.

Behind the Curtain

Now is the time to take charge. Draw upon logic, discipline, and experience to build something enduring. The Emperor asks you to lead with wisdom, not ego. Set boundaries. Create structure. Call upon the ancestor within you who knows how to rule your own domain.

5. THE HIEROPHANT

Actor/Character: Theodore Roberts as Moses Film & Year: The Ten Commandments (1923)

The Scene:

Theodore Roberts delivers a towering portrayal of Moses, a prophet blazing with purpose as he descends the mountain, stone tablets in hand, eyes filled with divine fire. He is both the chosen intermediary of God and the custodian of sacred law. Every expression radiates reverence and conviction. His character evokes the gravity of spiritual leadership, the weight of tradition, and the sanctity of knowledge passed down.



Tarot Meaning

Upright: Spiritual wisdom, institutions, religious or moral guidance, traditions, conformity with purpose. The Hierophant supports connection to something greater through established channels—churches, schools, or belief systems.

Reverse: This reversal challenges blind adherence to tradition. Are you following rules that no longer serve your spirit? Or resisting wise counsel out of pride? The Hierophant reversed urges you to think for yourself, question authority, and forge your own spiritual path.

Behind the Curtain

You are being invited to seek deeper meaning and spiritual guidance. Turn to trusted mentors, sacred texts, or communal wisdom. This card honors the wisdom of the elders, the sacred rites, and the lineages of truth that span lifetimes.

6. THE LOVERS

Starring: Rudolph Valentino & Vilma Bánky Film & Year: The Son of the Sheik (1926)

The Scene:

Rudolph Valentino and Vilma Bánky ignite the screen with magnetic intensity. Valentino, in his final film role, embodies both untamed desire and noble restraint.

Bánky's character, fiery and independent, is no mere damsel.

Their romance unfolds in a landscape of peril and passion, testing loyalty, trust, and forgiveness.

This depiction captures not just the ecstasy of love, but its trials—the shadows that test the strength of connection and the integrity of choice.



Tarot Meaning

Upright: A meaningful relationship or heartfelt decision comes into focus. There is potential for deep alignment, shared values, and emotional resonance. Trust your inner compass—it knows the way.

Reverse: Conflicted emotions. A disconnect between values and desires. The reversed Lovers warn of choices made from impulse or fear, rather than truth. Step back. Recenter. Rediscover your alignment.

Behind the Curtain

Love is more than chemistry—it's conscious alignment. The Lovers ask you to choose with clarity and heart. Whether in partnership, belief, or direction, you are being called to act from a place of harmony and soul-knowing.

7. THE CHARIOT

Actor/Character: Ramon Novarro

as Judah Ben-Hur

Film & Year: Ben-Hur: A Tale of

the Christ (1925)

The Scene:

Here, the symbolism is literal and epic. As Judah grips the reins and confronts his rival in a thunderous arena, we witness external conflict mirroring internal transformation. The race is not only a test of speed and strength—it is the battle of vengeance versus redemption, chaos versus mastery.

The Chariot's essence lives in Novarro's performance: focused, determined, and fueled by both pain and purpose. Through sweat, dust, and divine fate, he becomes the driver of his destiny.



Tarot Meaning

Upright: Momentum is building. With clarity and control, you're poised to overcome opposition. Success comes through discipline and unwavering intent. Stay the course.

Reverse: Lack of direction or internal conflict may be stalling your progress. The reversed Chariot warns of impulsiveness, burnout, or loss of control. Reclaim your focus and your vision.

Behind the Curtain

This card signals it's time to take the reins. Whether you're moving through obstacles or chasing a goal, your determination is your greatest weapon. When your inner forces align, nothing can stop your momentum.

8. STRENGTH



Starring: Lon Chancy & Patsy Ruth Miller Film & Date: The Hunchback of Notre Dame (1923)

The Scene:

In The Hunchback of Notre Dame, Lon Chaney's Quasimodo is both monstrous in appearance and majestic in spirit.

When Quasimodo is chained and publicly flogged in the square, Patsy Ruth Miller's Esmeralda approaches him with a jug of water.

Esmeralda is the figure of Strength not because she's physically strong, but because she shows emotional bravery and grace in the face of cruelty and public scorn.

Tarot Meaning

Upright: You possess the inner fortitude to endure challenges with kindness. Draw upon compassion, courage, and self-control. Tame your fears and channel your energy into protective, healing action.

Reverse: Self-doubt, impatience, or misuse of power may be sapping your resilience. You might be forcing issues or suppressing emotions. Reconnect with gentleness and allow compassion to guide your strength.

Behind the Curtain

This card reminds you that true power arises from love and patience. Softness is not weakness, and vulnerability can become your greatest strength.

9. THE HERMIT



Actor/Character: Himansu Rai as Prince Gautama (Buddha) Film & Year: The Light of Asia (1925)

The Scene:

Himansu Rai portrays Prince
Gautama's journey from sheltered
royalty to enlightened wanderer. A
defining scene finds him alone at
dusk, seated beneath a Bodhi tree, in
deep meditation. The world fades to
shadow as he searches his soul for
answers.

"The Hermit" embodies solitude, introspection, and the quest for inner truth. He is the seeker who turns away from the crowd to light his own path, guided by wisdom rather than spectacle.

Tarot Meaning

Upright: Retreat, reflection, solitude, spiritual pursuit. You're called to trust your inner light and pause before making decisions. Seek answers within rather than outside.

Reverse: Withdrawal may become avoidance. You could be stuck in overthinking or refusing help. Darkness without illumination can breed confusion. Reach out if needed, and reengage with the world when ready.

Behind the Curtain

This card invites you to step back from distractions and seek clarity within. Wisdom emerges in quiet moments when you listen to your own heart's guidance.

10. THE WHEEL OF FORTUNE



Actor/Character: Charlie Chaplin as the Tramp Film & Year: Modern Times (1936)

The Scene:

In Modern Times, Chaplin's Tramp becomes literally entangled in the cogs of a massive factory machine. This iconic scene shows him pinioned within the gears—mechanical force grinding around him as he struggles to keep pace. This powerful image captures the relentless churn of circumstance and the way external forces can carry us forward or grind us down. Chaplin's comedic resilience underscores the Wheel's dual nature: it can lift us high or cast us low, yet always keeps turning.

Tarot Meaning

Upright: Luck shifts, seasons change. Be ready to adapt and make the most of opportunities when they arise. Trust that what goes around will come around—prepare to ride the wave.

Reverse: Resistance to change or fear of uncertainty may trap you in unproductive patterns. You may feel victims of circumstance. It's time to step out of the mechanism and reclaim your agency.

Behind the Curtain

This card reminds you that life moves in cycles. Surrender to the flow, adapt to change, and recognize that highs and lows are part of the journey. Your response to the turn of the wheel shapes your path forward.

11. JUSTICE

Actor/Character: Buster Keaton as Sherlock Jr.

Film & Date: Sherlock Jr. (1924)

The Scene:

In Sherlock Jr., Buster Keaton plays a humble projectionist who dreams himself into the detective role to solve a framed crime. With magnifying glass in hand, methodically examining clues—every movement precise, every expression deadpan yet determined. His silent sleuthing, free of melodrama, mirrors Justice's impartial gaze: he seeks truth through observation and steady reasoning, unhindered by bias or theatrics.



Tarot Meaning

Upright: Clarity, accountability, and ethical decision-making are at hand. You are invited to act with integrity and to trust that fairness will prevail. Legal matters, contracts, or negotiations may come into focus—review all details before proceeding.

Reverse: Bias, injustice, or imbalance may cloud your perspective. You could be evading responsibility or resisting correction. Be wary of partial truths and question whose interests are really served.

Behind the Curtain

Justice embodies balance, fairness, and moral truth. It is the card of cause and effect, where actions meet their consequences and integrity is weighed without prejudice.

12. THE HANGED MAN

Actor/Character: Harold Lloyd as

The Boy

Film & Date: Safety Last! (1923)

The Scene:

In the legendary climax of Safety Last!, Harold Lloyd's character dangles perilously from a giant clock face high above the city streets. His body twists against the wind, while his hands grip the minute hand. The bustling world below continues unaware, while he is suspended in time and space—caught between fear and calm resolve. This iconic image captures The Hanged Man's essence: suspended action, reversed orientation, and the calm heart that endures amid uncertainty.



Tarot Meaning

Upright: Surrender, patience, perspective shift, voluntary sacrifice. You're invited to release control, trust the process, and embrace the lessons that come from hanging between worlds. New insights arise when you allow yourself to be still.

Reverse: Avoidance of necessary action or fear of change may leave you immobilized. You might be trapped by indecision or clinging to sacrifice as martyrdom. It's time to move forward, even if uncertainty remains.

Behind the Curtain

The Hanged Man embodies surrender, new perspective, and the wisdom gained through voluntary pause or sacrifice. He teaches that sometimes the greatest power lies in letting go and seeing the world from a different angle.

13. DE ATH

Actress/Character: Brigitte Helm as Maria / The Machine-Man Film & Year: Metropolis (1927)

The Scene:

In the laboratory of the mad scientist Rotwang, Maria, the spiritual leader of the oppressed workers, is captured and bound to a mechanical chair encircled by mysterious Tesla-like devices and glowing rings of energy. As Rotwang activates his machinery, a supernatural current transfers Maria's essence—her face, her soul, her symbolic meaning—onto the blank, expressionless robot. The robot's body pulses with energy and gradually transforms into Maria's double, becoming a seductive, corrupted version of her—used to manipulate the masses and incite chaos.



Tarot Meaning

Upright: Closure, release, metamorphosis. You are at a threshold: an old chapter closes so a new one can begin. Honor the passage. Allow yourself to grieve, then step forward into rebirth.

Reverse: Resistance to necessary endings may trap you in stale patterns. You could be clinging to the past or avoiding grief. The reversed Death urges you to confront what must fall away and to trust the cycle of life.

Behind the Curtain

The robot-Maria unleashes wild rebellion, seduction, and the breakdown of order, forcing society into crisis. From this destruction, change becomes inevitable. Like the Death card, the message is: through the dark night of the soul, we move toward awakening and truth.

14. TEMPER MNCE

Actress/Character: Lillian Gish as

Hester Prynne

Film & Year: The Scarlet Letter

(1926)

The Scene:

Lillian Gish's portrayal of Hester
Prynne is a study in dignified
endurance. Branded by public shame
yet bolstered by personal conviction, she
navigates a world of judgment with
quiet strength. A poignant scene shows
her facing her accusers, crimson "A" on
her breast, yet holding her child with
serene composure. Her posture—poised
between defiance and humility—captures
Temperance's essence: the measured
blending of heart and conscience.



Tarot Meaning

Upright: Patience, moderation, purpose, and mindful integration. You are being called to blend opposing forces—action with reflection, giving with receiving—to create inner and outer harmony.

Reverse: Excess, imbalance, or inner conflict may disturb your peace. You might swing between extremes or suppress vital parts of yourself. Return to mindful practice—find the middle path once more.

Behind the Curtain

Temperance is the alchemist who tempers extremes, guiding us to flow with grace between passion and restraint. This card reminds you to find your center amidst life's highs and lows. True equilibrium arises not from denying emotion, but from channeling it with wisdom and self-respect.

15. THE DEVIL



Actress/Character: Max Schreck as Count Orlok Film & Year: Nosferatu (1922)

The Scene:

Max Schreck's Count Orlok emerges from the shadows as a figure of uncanny dread. His gaunt form, elongated fingers, and rat-like teeth stalk the castle halls. One haunting scene shows Orlok's silhouette creeping up a narrow staircase, its long shadow stretching like a noose. The atmosphere of creeping horror and forbidden fascination perfectly mirrors The Devil's grip: what scares us also holds our attention, drawing us toward our own hidden fears.

Tarot Meaning

Upright: Addiction, materialism, obsession, or power struggles may be at play. Examine the habits and relationships that control your actions. Awareness is the first step toward liberation.

Reverse: You are turning away from what once held you captive. This reversal signals release from unhealthy patterns, reclaiming autonomy, and embracing self-mastery.

Behind the Curtain

The Devil embodies temptation, bondage, and the shadow side of desire. He lures us into excess, fear, and illusion—reminding us that what entices can also enslave. This card urges you to confront what binds you—addictions, unhealthy attachments, or inner demons. Only by shining light on shadow can you reclaim your freedom.

16. THE TOWER



The Collapse of the Great Machine Film & Year: Metropolis (1927)

The Scene:

The towering factory complex represents humanity's overreliance on mechanization. A pivotal sequence shows the machine's engine hall literally overloading—towers of pistons buckling, gears exploding, and molten metal raining down. Workers scramble in chaos as the monolithic structure collapses in a deafening roar. This cataclysmic moment perfectly channels The Tower's energy: the dramatic collapse of pride, the shocking confrontation with reality, and the cathartic clearing that follows destruction.

Tarot Meaning

Upright: Unexpected change, revelation, crisis. Old assumptions or systems collapse to reveal hidden truths. Embrace the upheaval—it forces necessary transformation.

Reverse: Clinging to false structures or denying necessary change can prolong suffering. You may be in denial about an inevitable breakdown. Accept the fall; it's the first step toward rebuilding on solid ground.

Behind the Curtain

The Tower signifies sudden upheaval, revelation, and the breakdown of old structures. It is the lightning strike that demolishes false foundations, clearing the way for authentic growth and new order.

17. THE STAR.



Actress/Character: Lillian Gish as Elaine of Astolat Film & Year: Way Down East (1920)

The Scene:

Lillian Gish portrays a fallen woman wronged by society, abandoned and disgraced. Yet through her harrowing journey, she remains luminous with faith and inner strength. As Elaine of Astolat, she mirrors the Star's archetype: a fragile figure guided by unwavering light, trusting in redemption even in the harshest conditions.

Her purity, vulnerability, and endurance become a source of inspiration and emotional healing.

Tarot Meaning
