Article 2 - Zoning Amendment No. 1

More than 2 single-family and/or two-family dwellings per lot will require a Special Exception from the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Single-family dwelling conversions to two-family or multi-family will require a Special Exception. Also, amend the permitted uses in the Mixed-Use Zone to allow single-family dwelling conversions to two-family or multi-family by a Special Exception.

Article 5 - Zoning Amendment No. 4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Littleton Planning Board for the Littleton Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article VIII regarding Home Occupations to allow "no impact" home occupations by right in the R-1, R-1a, R-2, Rural and Mixed-Use zones and to allow "low impact" home occupations by special exception in those zones. A "no impact" home occupation would not be visible from the street, would have no customer visits, and would have limited deliveries. A "low impact" home occupation could have up to 4 non-resident employees, up to 20 customer visits per day between 7 am and 9 pm, routine parcel deliveries, and screened outdoor storage and display of merchandise in a single area of up to 200 square feet.

Article 9 -- Public Works -- Borrowing for Sewer WWTP Upgrades

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000,000 (nine million dollars) for the Public Works Department to make upgrades and repairs to the Sewer Wastewater Treatment Plant; to authorize the issuance of \$9,000,000 (nine million dollars) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33); to authorize the Select Board to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; to authorize the Select Board to apply for, accept and expend federal, state or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project, WITH THE AMOUNT OF SUCH BONDS OR NOTES TO BE REDUCED BY ANY GRANT, AID OR OTHER FUNDING RECEIVED FOR THE PROJECT, and to comply with all laws applicable to said project; and further to authorize the Select Board to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto. Without impairing the general obligation nature of the bonds or notes, it is anticipated that debt service payments will come from Sewer User Fees.

Article 11 – 2026 Sewer Fund Operating Budget

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget for the Sewer Department the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$1,823,799 (one million eight hundred twenty-three thousand seven hundred ninety-nine dollars). Said sum to come from the Sewer Fund and be offset by user fees. Of this amount, \$1,415,752 will be used for Direct Expenses associated with running the sewer system, and \$408,047 will be used to reimburse the General Fund for indirect Expenses included in the Article 10 operating budget, such as salaries. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$1,500,396 (one million five hundred thousand three hundred ninety-six dollars) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Article 12 – 2026 Water & Light Operating Budget

Article 13 – Water & Light Battery Energy Storage System Multi-Year Lease

Shall the Town lease approximately 15,000 square feet of land at the Town's West Side Substation at 1533 St. Johnsbury Road to a vendor recommended by the commissioners of Littleton Water & Light. The lease would involve a development period, a 20-year fixed term with an option to extend the lease term for up to 10 additional years. The leased land will be used to develop a battery energy storage system to benefit Littleton Water & Light customers directly by allowing Littleton Water & Light to utilize stored energy in lieu of purchasing energy from ISO-NE during peak energy demand hours. The lease agreement for use of the land shall be negotiated to the agreement of the Select Board and Commissioners of Littleton Water & Light.

Article 15 - Collective Bargaining Agreement - AFSCME UNIT A

To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement for 3 years reached between the Select Board and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) Council 93, Local 1348 Unit A: Highway Department & Transfer Station, which calls for increases in wages and benefits at the current staffing level as follows:

Article 16 - Modify Elderly Property Tax Exemption

To see if the Town will vote to modify the provisions of RSA 72:39-a for elderly exemption from property tax in the Town of Littleton, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$70,000 (increased from \$35,000); for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$105,000 (increased from \$52,500); for a person 80 years of age or older \$140,000 (increased from \$70,000). To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least 5 consecutive years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$40,000 (increased from \$30,000) or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$50,000 (increased from \$40,000); and own net assets not in excess of \$100,000 (increased from \$75,000) excluding the value of the person's residence.

Article 17 - Town Office Building Planning and Improvements

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 (twenty-five thousand dollars) for the purpose of planning, architectural and engineering services, minor renovations and repairs, and site improvements in connection with the conversion of town property located at 50 Pleasant Street into a new Town Office Building. Article 19 - New Full-Time Police Officer (School Resource Officer)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$104,296 (one hundred four thousand two hundred ninety-six dollars) for the purpose of increasing the current level of police officer staffing for the Town's Police Department to assign said officer to the Littleton School District (SAU 84) as a School Resource Officer.

This is the estimated cost of the officer, inclusive of benefits, equipment, and uniforms. The full-year inclusive cost is estimated to be \$125,266, and if approved, the full cost will be added to the 2027 default and proposed budgets. The full-year inclusive cost will be offset annually by \$41,667 in 2026, 2027, and 2028 through a United States Department of Justice COPS Hiring Program grant totaling \$125,000.

Article 20 – Fire Dept - Ladder Truck Production Slot Cancellation Fee

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85,500 (eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars) from the General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance for the sole purpose of covering a potential manufacturer cancellation fee of up to 4.5%, should the Town later determine not to proceed with the purchase of a new ladder truck after securing a production slot. This authorization is intended to allow the Town to reserve a future production slot without obligating the Town to the full purchase or financing of a new ladder truck. Any final authorization to purchase, lease, or bond an estimated \$1,900,000 for a new ladder truck shall require a separate warrant article at a future Town Meeting. If the ladder truck order proceeds to full purchase, this authorization shall become null and void. This special warrant article will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the purpose is completed, or by 12/31/2031, whichever is sooner.

Article 31 – Parks & Recreation - Swimming Pool Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200,000 (two hundred thousand dollars) to be deposited into the Swimming Pool Capital Reserve Fund, previously established in 2024 by Article 38, and to fund this appropriation by withdrawing that amount from the General Fund Unassigned Balance. This amount represents the \$200,000 raised and appropriated in 2021 for the design and construction of a new town pool, which vote is proposed to be rescinded by Article 30, above. 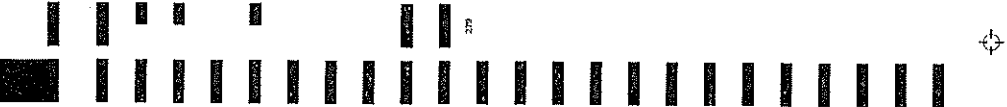
