

## 27<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time – Lectionary C (10-05-25) Deacon Jerome Bettencourt

Patience can be a difficult virtue to develop. It is not easy to have patience when we are in a hurry or are in a rush to accomplish something important. It can be almost impossible to have patience when we are in pain or are afraid of some impending danger. Patience is the virtue of bearing these things in a quiet and steady perseverance. Such strength cannot come from us alone, but it is the fruit of our faith in God. We are willing to bear suffering or be subject to delays in our path because we know that God loves us and that in the end we will be triumphant. Our Sunday scriptures this week teach us some important lessons about patience.

The Prophet Habakkuk in our first reading begins with a complaint to God about the injustice the people have had to suffer. He is answered through a vision which tells him to wait for its fulfillment. We hear that impulsive people have no integrity, but the faithful shall survive. In this life we often come upon such injustice and suffering. These encounters try our patience and challenge our faith. The prophet makes the connection between fortitude and faith. If we can trust in God, we will develop the courage to endure.

We are called to courage in the passage from the second letter to Timothy. This is fortitude in the face of persecution and possible martyrdom. Timothy is reminded of his call to spread the Gospel courageously with power, love, and self-control. These are the traits of patience. One cannot persevere without God's Grace and cannot endure without love, yet we tend to become impulsive without self- control. The author reminds Timothy that such virtue is are centered in Jesus Christ and sustained by the Holy Spirit.

Gospel of Luke in today's passage presents an interesting explanation of faith. The disciples ask Jesus to give them more faith. They seem to equate faith with power. This makes sense given that Jesus regularly attributed the miracles he performed to faith. But Jesus explains that it is not the amount of faith one has which determines the greatness of their acts and power. Faith is essentially trusting in God to help you accomplish His will; it is not some super power. Jesus continues with an image of a servant and a master. He reminds us that the master does not stop and serve the servants just because they did their duty. He is teaching that it is not a matter of power to serve the Gospel but is instead an act of trust and reliance on God's guidance and power. It is the truth that all ministries must flow from God and that ministers are vessels of this power but are not the source. We must trust and be patient that God conducts His ministry through us. We can choose to be a more effective tool in his hands, but ultimately we wait for him to act.

The essential connection between faith and patience is presented in today's scriptures. Without trust in God, we lack power to endure suffering and injustice. As we draw closer to God, we find the capacity to persevere. God gives us the courage to withstand the threats and dangers of this life; we only need to reach out to Him in trust. Patience, therefore, is much more than endurance of some annoyance -- it is the result of letting go, and letting God. May all of us live lives of patience and thank God each and every day for the power he gives us to persevere.

# Why do we celebrate Our Lady of the Rosary?

Pope St. Pius V knew that Our Lady had interceded for the Holy League, ensuring their victory. In fact, on the day of the Battle of Lepanto, October 7, 1571, he saw the Blessed Mother in a vision, and she revealed the victory to him.

As an offering of thanksgiving, the Pope declared this day as the Feast day of Our Lady of Victory, later known as Our Lady of the Rosary.

# Who fought in the Battle of Lepanto?

The Holy League, a coalition of Catholic maritime states promoted by Pope St. Pius V, fought against the Ottomans, an Islamic empire centered in Istanbul. The "Turks" were trying to extend their influence beyond Southeast Europe. A Turkish victory might have permitted the expansion of Islam deep into Europe.
