

Sunday Connection

Matthew 5:13-16

Jesus teaches that his disciples are to be the salt of the earth and the light of

the world.

Following upon the teaching of the <u>Beatitudes</u>, Jesus uses the now familiar metaphors of salt and light to describe the life of discipleship. We take salt and light for granted in our society, but these commodities were more precious in ancient cultures. Just as now, salt was used in Jesus' time for flavoring, as a preservative, and as a healing agent. Similarly, the widespread use of electricity in the modern world makes us less aware of the value and importance of light in our lives.

Still, our familiarity with this passage from Matthew's Gospel speaks well to the abiding power of the imagery that Jesus presented. Jesus' call to be salt for the earth and light for the world powerfully states our mission as Church and as Christians. Our commitment to social justice flows from the exhortation that Jesus gives us in today's Gospel. Some of the activities that this commitment leads us to are given more concrete expression as the Corporal and Spiritual <u>Works of Mercy</u>. When we feed the hungry, clothe the naked, console those who mourn, and so on, we show ourselves to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. When we do these things with the community of faith, the Church, we are indeed acting as "a city set on a mountain" that cannot be hidden!



Each year over 2 million people make their way through the mountainous country of southeastern France to Lourdes. They come seeking cures, hoping to find answers, believing, and praying. At Lourdes, people recall the Lady dressed in white, with a blue sash, yellow roses at her feet, and a Rosary on her arm—the Blessed Virgin Mary.

On February 11, 1858, Mary appeared to 14-year-old Bernadette Soubirous. This was the first of 18 visits, many of them with 20,000 people present. When Bernadette asked the Lady's identity, she replied, "I am the Immaculate Conception." Just four years earlier, the pope had proclaimed it a dogma that Mary was conceived immaculate without original sin. The Blessed Virgin, through Bernadette, had come to call sinners to a change of heart. Her message was a request for prayer and penance. She also instructed Bernadette to tell the priests that a chapel was to be built on the site and processions held.

On February 25, 1858, the Lady told Bernadette to dig in the dirt and drink of the stream. Bernadette began to dig, and after several attempts she was able to find the water to drink. The water continued to flow from where she had dug with her hands until it was producing over 32,000 gallons of water a day—as it still does. There have been over 5,000 cures recorded but less than 100 of them have been declared miraculous by the Church. Most of these have taken place during the blessing with the Blessed Sacrament.

Today we celebrate the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. We may never travel to Lourdes and join in the processions, but we can know always that we have a Mother to help us and lead us to her Son, Jesus. And so we pray to her:

> Grant us, O merciful God, protection in our weakness, that we, who keep the Memorial of the Immaculate Mother of God, may, with the help of her intercession, rise up from our iniquities. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, One God, for ever and ever.

Lent Preparation

In less than a month Lenten Season will begin. Planning for Lent may include: **Prayer: Eucharist, Sunday, Daily Catechumens: RCIA, Scrutinies, and Presentation, Liturgy of the Hours, Penance, Stations of the Cross, Fasting and Alms Giving.**

<u>Understanding the Catechumenate Process</u>

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, often called **RCIA**, is an effort to restore the spirit of early Christianity that emphasized conversion as a participation in the passion, death, and resurrection of Christ. In addition, the role of the entire community is to pray, witness, and teach the new members of the Body of Christ, thereby giving support and shape to the journey.

RCIA, as a process, involves a series of rites, conducted in the context of learning about the faith and spiritual formation, through which a person is fully incorporated into the Body of Christ, the Church.

The Catholic Church, through the current Code of Canon Law, opens its doors to the admission of new members through the proper liturgical procedure as stated in *Lumen Gentium #14: "With love and solicitude Mother Church already embraces them as her own."* Canon 851, §1, identifies the RCIA as the preferred form of preparation for adults seeking baptism:

"An adult who intends to receive baptism is to be admitted to the catechumenate and, to the extent possible, be led through the several stages to sacramental initiation, in accord with the order of initiation adapted by the conference of bishops and the special norms published by it."

There are **four stages** in the RCIA process. The first stage is the **Precatechumenate**, or period of inquiry and evangelization; the **Catechumenate**, which is a time of serious and dedicated formation; the **Period of Purification and Enlightenment**, which coincides with the Lenten season; and **Mystagogy**, which lasts from Easter to Pentecost. All of these stages are marked by distinct liturgical rites.
