

#### SUNDAY CONNECTION

John 20:19-31 Thomas believes because he sees Jesus.

In today's Gospel, Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace. Jesus then commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun; as Jesus was sent by God, so Jesus sends his disciples. He gives his disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit so that they will be able to accomplish this task. Jesus' words to his disciples also highlight the integral connection between the forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit. With the grace of the Holy Spirit, we can share forgiveness and reconciliation with others.

Thomas, the doubting disciple in today's reading, represents the reality of the Church that comes after this first community of witnesses to Jesus. All but the first disciples of Jesus must believe without seeing. Like Thomas, we may doubt the news that Jesus, who was crucified and buried, appeared to his disciples. Our human nature seeks hard evidence that the Jesus who appeared to his disciples after his death is indeed the same Jesus who was crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to be our representative in obtaining this evidence. He gives witness to us that the Jesus who was raised is the same Jesus who died. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are among those who are blessed, for we have not seen and yet believe.

Within normal family life, there are many opportunities for conflict. Jesus did not promise us the absence of conflict in our lives. Instead, he gave us the gifts of peace, forgiveness, and reconciliation so that we could reduce conflict. The measure of Christian family life is not the absence of conflict, but the manner in which conflict is resolved. Filled with the gift of the Holy Spirit, we ask Jesus to help us to bring peace and forgiveness to situations of conflict in our families.

- 3. Ask for light from the Holy Spirit. "Spirit of God, help me to understand the mystery of my heart and to know my own limits. Help me to see how I have responded to your many gifts."
- 4. Review your day.

"God, help me to see the faces of the people I have met, the places I have been, and the things I have thought, spoken, and done."

Pray words of forgiveness and resolve. "God. for where I have seen you present, I give thanks. Where I have resisted seeing You, I ask for forgiveness. I resolve, with Your grace, to strive to seek You and to see You at all times."

# What is Divine Mercy Sunday?

In a series of revelations to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s, our Lord called for a special feast day to be celebrated on the Sunday after Easter. Today, we know that feast as Divine Mercy Sunday, named by Pope St. John Paul II at the canonization of St. Faustina on April 30, 2000.

The Lord expressed His will with regard to this feast in His very first revelation to St. Faustina. The most comprehensive revelation can be found in her *Diary* entry 699:

My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and a shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day are opened all the divine floodgates through which graces flow. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My mercy.

In all, St. Faustina recorded 14\_revelations from Jesus concerning His desire for this feast.

Nevertheless, Divine Mercy Sunday is NOT a feast based solely on St. Faustina's revelations. Indeed, it is not primarily about St. Faustina — nor is it altogether a new feast. The Second Sunday of Easter was already a solemnity as the Octave Day of Easter<sup>[1]</sup>. The title "Divine Mercy Sunday" does, however, highlight the meaning of the day.

We are excited about the possibility of Hawai'i having a third saint!

**Brother Joseph Dutton**, as he is affectionately referred to by many of us in the islands, willingly entered a life of penance, dedicating nearly 45 years of service to those suffering from Hansen's disease (leprosy) in Kalaupapa, Moloka'i. Hawai'i parishes can play an important role in drawing attention to his contributions and advancing the cause for beatification and canonization of this special layman (non-religious) and former Civil War lieutenant.

As Bishop Larry Silva noted in his homily delivered on Jan. 21 in the Cathedral Basilica of Our Lady of Peace, "Joseph Dutton exiled himself so that he could do penance for his own wayward life; so that he could change course completely from thinking about himself and his own needs to unselfish service of others in extreme need...His simple service would announce to many the gospel of liberation and freedom, even as they remained confined."

Those poignant words, spoken at a special Mass to mark the closing of the diocesan phase of the cause for beatification and canonization of Servant of God Joseph Dutton Layman, speak to our hearts today. Parishes throughout Hawai'i now have the opportunity to amplify this powerful message as the next phase of the beatification and canonization process moves to the Vatican.

This is a moment that we can all be proud of, as Catholics and Hawai'i residents. Saint Damien DeVeuster was proclaimed a saint in 2009, and Saint Marianne Cope was elevated to sainthood in 2012. We believe it is time to now recognize Servant of God Joseph Dutton Layman.

Bishop Larry has approved a *Special Collection* for this cause, scheduled for April 27 and 28, 2024. While participation is optional, we highly encourage your support, considering its significant impact for Hawaii's faithful. As pastors, you have the flexibility to hold it on an alternative date within four weeks from the scheduled dates.

There are 2<sup>nd</sup> Collection Envelopes at the back table for you to help Hawaii gain a 3<sup>rd</sup> saint. Mahalo for your support.

#### The Call to Stewardship Janan Malinowski

"Then children were brought to him that he might lay his hands on them and pray. The disciples rebuked them, but Jesus said, 'Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these.' (Matthew 19:13-14)

The Call to Stewardship, to service in the community of God's people, is not just for adults. Children can serve too, even from a young age, once they have received Confirmation and First Holy Communion. The most common form of that early service has traditionally been in the role of Altar Server. It is a wonderful way for children to learn that they are an important part of God's people and to learn to understand what Mass and liturgical celebrations are all about. Service is a true antidote to boredom and disinterest in going to church.

This ministry was once reserved for "altar boys", but bishops now allow anyone, male, female, of any age, who has received their Sacraments of Initiation and have undergone proper training "on the Mass and its parts and their meaning, the various objects used in the liturgy (their names and uses), and the various functions of the server during the Mass and other liturgical celebrations" as well as "guidance on maintaining proper decorum and attire when serving Mass and other functions" to serve.

In our parish we are truly blessed with a dedicated group of accomplished Altar Servers who range in age from Elementary School students to College students. They include: Christian Acosta, Noah Baquial, Leah Baquial, Kershaun and Kersten Dopich, Michael Gamiao, Lindsey Julian, Coco Rarangol, Emson Sorcy, Xavier Tablit, Cysten San Jose-Tejada. We thank these young people for their service and hold them up as examples to parishioners of all ages. One is never too young, or too old, to find a way to actively serve the Lord and others. We invite anyone who feels called to join the ranks of Altar Servers to talk to Fr. John.
