4th Sunday of Advent — Lectionary A (12-21-2025) – Dcn. Jerome Bettencourt

In this fourth Sunday of Advent, we stand at the end of our preparations in anticipation of the Christmas event. Christ came into the world in an ordinary way, yet his arrival was marked by great signs. If you read the stories of Nativity, it is apparent that those signs were not apparent to everyone. The three Magi see the star, but Herod is unaware of what is going on. The shepherds in the fields seethe angels, but the rest of the inhabitants of the area are blind to what has happened. The readings for this week present us with a lesson on how, when it comes to our encounter with God, faith makes all difference.

The passage from Isaiah concerns a prophecy given to Ahaz, the wicked king of Judah. Ahaz had abandoned the worship of God for the practice of idolatry. He had even sacrificed one of his sons to the pagan Gods. As this King of Judah finds himself in a dangerous situation, the Kings of Israel and Aram to the north have banded together to attack Judah, Isaiah visits and urges Ahaz to repent and turn to God The prophet tells Ahaz that if he would ask for a sign, God is ready to give it. The King has no faith in God, so in a sarcastic show of false piety, he refuses on the grounds that he would be tempting God. Ahaz has his own plan, which like most things in his life, does not include God. The king has decided to make an alliance with the powerful Assyrian Empire. Ahaz makes his pact with the devil and subjects his kingdom to Assyrian domination for years to come In the beginning of Paul's Epistle to the Romans, the apostle describes himself as a slave. He explains that even though the gospel he serves is the fulfillment of the Jewish prophecies, his service is one of faith in Jesus Christ. Paul lives that relationship among the Gentiles to whom he preaches the Gospel. The apostle labors to bring the good news to all those who belong Christ. This is an act of trust inspired by a living relationship, not a historical promise. Through faith, Paul sees this relationship as the fulfillment of the covenant introduced in the Jewish tradition. Yet this relationship transcends its cultural roots and leads Paul to a ministry among people outside that tradition. He now belongs to Christ, and through the obedience of faith, comes to spread the Gospel. In the Gospel, Matthew tells a story about Joseph. Like Ahaz in the first reading, Joseph finds himself in a dilemma. The girl he is engaged to is pregnant. Joseph knows that the child is not his. Probably assumes that she has a lover. He does not want to punish Mary and is willing to quietly divorce her. An angel visits the Nazarene carpenter in a dream and tells him not to fear taking Mary into his home. When Joseph wakes up, he accepts the vision and does as he was told. He is a man of faith. Joseph hears the command of God and obeys. The same prophecy that was delivered to Ahaz is applied here with a very different outcome. Joseph accepts the sign and protects the child that will become the salvation of the world.

In Advent we prepare for the coming of Christ into our lives. This is an event that will change us, yet we will only enjoy its blessings fully if we embrace the signs given us. To do this we must have faith. We need a trust in God which keeps us from rejecting God's plan for our own ambitions. In humility and love we can grasp the importance of this season and celebrate its impact on the rest of our lives. This is what it means to be a people of faith in the Advent season.
