6th Sunday of Ordinary Time – Lectionary A (2-15-26)

The Bible indicates that God has provided rules for us to follow throughout life. The Jewish people believed that their covenant with God hinged on their observance of 613 rules set forth in the Torah, the first five books of the Bible. Christian tradition seems to emphasize a relationship with Jesus with a code of ethics centered on the virtue of love. The problem comes when our human weakness tempts us to take a minimalistic approach to this love. We ask ourselves, “How much do I really have to do to follow Jesus?” The scripture readings this Sunday teach us the futility of minimalistic thinking when it comes to our relationship with God.

In the first reading, taken from the Book of Sirach, the author highlights the free will of humanity. The passage tells us that we are given a choice -- we can have life or we can suffer death. What we choose will be given to us. If we want to live, we should choose to follow God’s will. When we do so, we draw close to God and enjoy the benefits. When we choose otherwise, we wander far from God and suffer the consequences. Therefore, sin becomes its own punishment, and righteousness becomes its own reward. From this perspective rules and laws exist to warn us of danger rather than plague us with guilt and self-loathing. We have the power to choose, and we pray for the grace to choose wisely.

In the passage from the first letter to the Corinthians, the apostle points out to his audience that God’s wisdom is foreign to people of his era. Paul explains that conventional human wisdom is shortsighted and is based on what we can perceive with our feeble human senses. God’s wisdom, on the other hand, is superior since it transcends these limitations. The point is to urge us to seek a relationship with God. Only this connection can afford us access to divine wisdom. In this passage we too are reminded that the Spirit will reveal to us things that we are unable to see, or hear, or conceive of in our hearts.

In today’s passage from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus tells his disciples that He has not come to abolish the Law but to fulfill it. The Lord insists that in following the rules we embody kingdom of heaven. Then Jesus warns his disciples not to follow the example of the scribes. These scholars study the law but neglect covenant relationship which follows from it. Christ goes on to demonstrate how the scholars have minimized the Law of Moses. He emphasizes the spirit of the law in contrast to its letter. Christ teaches that murder means more than killing the body. He contends that adultery is more than just sex. Marriage is more than just an easily broken contract between a married couple. In every instance Christ raises the bar by insisting that relationships should take center stage when applying the rules.

God is love. This love and our relationship to God should not be minimized into a set of rules. Love does not flourish in doing the least we can give but in offering the most of ourselves. This is the lesson of today’s celebration.

The annual observance of Lent is the special season for the ascent to the holy mountain of Easter. Through its twofold theme of repentance and baptism, the season of Lent disposes both the catechumens and the faithful to celebrate the paschal mystery. Catechumens are led to the sacraments of initiation by means of the rite of election, the scrutinies, and catechesis. The faithful, listening more intently to the word of God and devoting themselves to prayer, are prepared through a spirit of repentance to renew their baptismal promises.	

Diocese of Honolulu Lenten Regulations

Fasting: Ages 18 through 59 are bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Abstinence From Meat: Abstaining from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Eggs, milk products and seafood are permitted. The penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

Easter Duty: All the faithful initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by obligation to receive Communion at least once a year.

Lenten Practices: All are encouraged to attend daily Mass during Lent, receive Holy Communion, participate in Penance Service and receive sacramental absolution; to be a part of public and private exercises of piety, giving generously to works of religion and charity, perform acts of kindness toward the sick, aged and poor; to practice voluntary self-denial, especially regarding food, drink, and worldly amusements; and to pray fervently, particularly for the intentions of the Holy Father.

The Sacred Paschal Triduum: The sacred Paschal Triduum of the Passion and Resurrection of the Lord shines forth as the high point of the entire Liturgical Year.

- The Triduum may be viewed as a single liturgical action that occurs over a period of three days.
- The Triduum is not part of Lent, but in its entirety, celebrated the Easter Event.
- The entire focus of the Triduum is on the Triumph of the Cross and Resurrection.
