5th Sunday of Lent – Lectionary A (3-22-2026)

As we begin the last week of Lent, the scriptures reflect on the ultimate destiny of humanity. We were created by God to live in heaven. Our sin separated us from that destiny and placed us in exile. With God’s help, we have found the way back. Jesus is the way, the truth and the life. If we believe in him, the end of our lives in this existence will merely be a passage to our home in heaven. As we reach the end of our Lenten journey and approach the wonder of Easter, we remember the basics of our faith.

Our first reading today is taken from the book of the prophet Ezekiel. It is the end of the prophet’s vision of the dry bones. Ezekiel is known for colorful visions told, with great imagery, and this is one of the most famous. It is a vision of the restoration of Judah after the Babylonian exile. Ezekiel teaches that even as liberation and a return to Jerusalem seems impossible, God will bring them home. In the vision, dry bones lay strewn across the desert. God calls to the bones and resurrects them. Even when there seems no hope, God will call us from our graves and lead us home.

In the passage from Paul’s letter to the Romans, the apostle makes a distinction between the “Flesh,” which represents human weakness, and the “Spirit” which symbolizes the power and freedom to follow Christ. Paul argues that those who live by the Spirit will not be subject to the ultimate death of the flesh. This is the promise of eternal life which is open to those who live according to the Spirit. If we fail to fill ourselves with the Spirit, we lose the benefits of salvation because we will not belong to Christ. This marks the distinction between existing in the Flesh and living in harmony with the Spirit.

In the Gospel reading from John, Jesus’ most famous miracle, the resurrection of Lazarus, is described. The story shows how God can accomplish miracles when it seems that there is no hope. When Jesus received a message about Lazarus’ illness, He says that the illness will not end in death and waits for two days. When Jesus tells the apostles that He is going to awaken Lazarus, they do not understand. Then He clearly states that Lazarus is dead which confuses them. Death seems so final, they cannot conceive of what Jesus is suggesting. When they arrive in Bethany, Martha and Mary come to Jesus for comfort, but their grief renders them unable to hope for a miracle. Their hopelessness brings Jesus to tears because, blinded by grief, they do not understand what is about to take place. Jesus asks that the stone covering the tomb be rolled back and Jesus reminds Martha of the promise that faith brings. When Lazarus is resurrected, many are shocked, amazed, and begin to believe. This event showed that God has the power to save us, even when all seems lost.

As we approach the celebration of Easter, we must believe that God’s love is more powerful than even death. Our eyes must not be blinded by despair to hope for our own ultimate journey to heaven.
