6th Sunday of Easter (5-10-26)

In this sixth Sunday of Easter, the scriptures remind us that we are saved through our relationship with Christ. The readings also show that, from the very beginning, Christians have lived this relationship in their rituals. It is essential for us to engage Christ in this connection which makes it important that we are attentive to the rituals of our tradition. Understanding the symbols and learning the meaning of the prayers of the liturgy give us a window into this bond that we have with our savior and enrich the nature of our friendship with Jesus.

In the Acts of the Apostles, we hear the story of a town in Samaria which was converted to Christianity. This was the work of the deacon Phillip, who through signs, exorcisms and healings, powerfully preached the Gospel. He baptized the converts at their request but did not lay hands on them to bestow the Holy Spirit. This ritual could only be performed by one of the Apostles. The Jerusalem community sent Peter and John to Samaria to confirm this community's acceptance into the Church. Today deacons and priests still perform baptisms, but the Sacrament of Confirmation is normally conferred by a bishop. This is an important symbol. The initiation into the body of Christ can be performed in the small local community, but the conferral of the Holy Spirit is reserved for an Apostle. The bishop, as a successor to the Apostles, is a representative of the larger Church and is a living sign of our connection to the first followers of Jesus. It is fitting that this important ritual includes their presence.

In the Epistle, Peter urges us to draw close to Christ by sanctifying our hearts. The Apostle tells us to be ready to explain our faith in Jesus but to do so with gentleness. He explains that if we approach others from a stance of kindness, we will be beyond reproach. If our efforts are rejected or bring persecution we will suffer righteously as Christ did. This is hard to keep faith the way Peter challenges us to do, and it would be impossible were it not for our relationship with Jesus Christ. In God we are led by the Spirit to be loving and kind even in the face of persecution. This bond with our savior strengthens our faith and allows us to follow Christ in ways we once may have thought impossible.

The Gospel passage taken from John, tells of Christ reminding the disciples that their love for him must translate into doing the will of God. How can we humans have a bond with Jesus powerful enough to allow us to follow His will? Jesus explains that God sends forth the Holy Spirit to sustain that bond. When Christ speaks of his commandments, He is referring to a living relationship made possible by the Holy Spirit. This connection is not defined in terms of obedience but instead requires love. Jesus says, "whoever loves me will be loved by my Father, and I will love him and reveal myself to him." We celebrate this bond in the Sacrament of Confirmation. A ritual in which the Holy Spirit is called down upon us through the laying on of hands. This is a celebration of a connection that will lead us through our Christian lives.

Meet our new Bishop Elect Jesuit Father Michael Castori, S. J.

The official appointment took place on Wednesday, May 6, at 12 p.m. Rome time (midnight Hawaii time). Father Castori was introduced to the media, the College of Consultors, the Presbyteral Council members and diocesan staff members at a press conference on May 6 in St. Stephen Diocesan Center's Lualaba Auditorium.

Father Castori comes to the Diocese of Honolulu from the Arrupe Jesuit Community at Seattle University, where he had served as rector. Prior to his time in Washington, he served in numerous roles in the Diocese of Oakland, Calif., and held pastoral and teaching roles across California.

Father Castori has extensive experience in the South Pacific, serving in pastoral ministry and education in Tonga, Guam, Fiji and the Marshall Islands. His middle name, "Tupou," was given to him by a Tongan family of which he became a member during his time in the region.

To formally become Bishop of Honolulu, Father Castori first will be ordained a bishop (an "episcopal ordination"), then installed in his new seat in the Diocese of Honolulu.

His episcopal ordination and installation will take place Tuesday, July 28, at 10 a.m. at the Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa, 712 N. School Street, Honolulu.

Beginning May 6, Bishop Larry Silva will serve as the diocese's apostolic administrator; he is still "in charge" until Father Castori is officially installed as bishop, though he will discuss any major decisions that might affect the future of the diocese with Father Castori.

After July 28, Bishop Silva's title will become the Bishop Emeritus of Honolulu, while Father Castori will become Bishop Castori, the Bishop of Honolulu.

Generally, laypeople in the Diocese of Honolulu will see little change in their day-to-day faith life, other than learning more about Father Castori and showing their appreciation for Bishop Silva's leadership over the past 21 years.

Confirmation 2026 Maila Tolentino

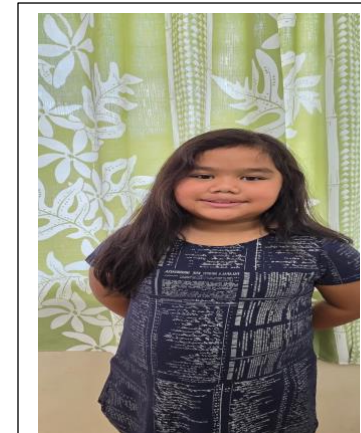
