**5th Sunday of Easter (5-03-26)
Deacon Jerome Bettencourt**

This Sunday in our Easter season, we hear in the readings of the familiar experience of being surprised by God. As human beings, we have a limited grasp of the world around us. The scriptures show that God sees more fully than we do. Consequently, His plan is superior to ours. No matter how many times this is made manifest in our lives, we are constantly amazed. We need to do is turn to God to access this wisdom and this requires humility and the ability to listen, not just with our ears but with our hearts as well.

In the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, we hear how the role of deacons was born in the early Church. There was a complaint that some of the widows, the Greek speaking ones, were being neglected. The Apostles not wanting to neglect their duty to preach the Gospel appointed seven men to serve at table. These men were the first deacons. While they are appointed to free the Apostles to spread the Gospel, they find themselves serving God in ways places that exceed their original purpose. Stephen is considered the first martyr of the Church. He was stoned to death by the Pharisees for performing miracles in Jesus' name. Phillip converts and baptizes a whole community of Samaritans causing the Church to send Peter and John to confirm and formally accept the community into the Church by bestowing on them the gift of the Holy Spirit. While these deacons were appointed to fulfill a simple task, God used them to spread the Gospel.

The First Epistle of Peter, our second reading, reminds us that we are the stones that make up the Church. Peter reminds us that God places us together like stones to build up his Church. The Apostle reminds his audience of the old rabbinical proverb that the stone the builders reject becomes the capstone. This means that the most important part of our lives, the part that seems to be missing, is often found close to us. It was there all along, we just needed to recognize it. In his letter, Peter warns that some will reject this stone because it is too close and too familiar. For these people, the stone becomes a stumbling block that leads to their downfall, yet those who accept this reality are drawn out of darkness into a great light.

In today's Gospel passage, Jesus encourages his disciples not to lose faith. He is almost at the time of His passion and knows that they will be greatly tested by the events to come. He assures them that He is leaving to prepare a place for them in God's kingdom. When he tells them that they already have everything they need to know, the disciples challenge this statement, and Jesus reveals that the answers has been with them all along. Thomas wants to know the plan, and Jesus replies, "I am the way the truth and the life." Phillip asks to see God

and Jesus reveals to them that He is God. Once again God surprises his people.

Our readings today teach us to turn to God for our solutions. If we have the strength and courage to humble ourselves and trust in the Lord, all the missing pieces will fall into place.

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LITURGY OF THE HOURS #3

General Instructions

Chapter I: Importance of the Liturgy of the Hours or Divine Office in the Life of the Church

1. Public and common prayer by the people of God is rightly considered to be among the primary duties of the Church. From the very beginning those who were baptized "devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the community, to the breaking of the bread, and to prayer" (Acts 2:42). The Acts of the Apostles give frequent testimony to the fact that the Christian community prayed with one accord.

The witness of the early Church teaches us that individual Christians devoted themselves to prayer at fixed times. Then, in different places, it soon became the established practice to assign special times for common prayer, for example, the last hour of the day when evening draws on and the lamp is lighted, or the first hour when night draws to a close with the rising of the sun.

In the course of time other hours came to be sanctified by prayer in common. These were seen by the Fathers as foreshadowed in the Acts of the Apostles. There we read of the disciples gathered together at the third hour. [2] The prince of the apostles "went up on the housetop to pray, about the sixth hour" (10:9); "Peter and John were going up to the temple at the hour of prayer, the ninth hour" (3:1); "about midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God" (16:25).

2. Such prayer in common gradually took the form of a set cycle of hours. This liturgy of the hours or divine office, enriched by readings, is principally a prayer of praise and petition. Indeed, it is the prayer of the Church with Christ and to Christ.

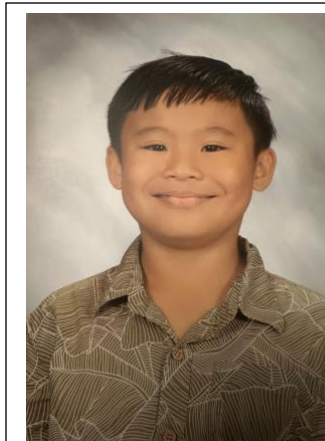
