The **Dedication of the Basilicas of the Apostles Peter and Paul** is a <u>feast day</u> on the <u>liturgical calendar</u> of the Catholic Church, which is celebrated on 18 November.

This feast combines the standard celebration of the <u>dedication of a church</u> for <u>St. Peter's Basilica</u> and the <u>Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls</u>, which were both built by the Emperor <u>Constantine the Great</u> during the 4th century. These sites had already been visited by <u>pilgrims</u> for over a century when the basilicas were built to honor the <u>apostles</u> traditionally believed to have been buried there. [1] The basilicas were originally joined by a <u>colonnade</u>, which was built despite the distance of several miles between them.

Their significance in the Catholic Church is emphasized in the reference made to them in the obligation on <u>Catholic bishops</u> to make a <u>Quinquennial visit ad limina</u> in which they are required to go "to the tombs of the Apostles" in Rome every five years to report on the status of their dioceses or prelatures. 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time – Lectionary C (11-16-25) Deacon Jerome Bettencourt

Our faith tradition teaches us that in moments when disasters strike and we find ourselves in need, God draws closer to us and sustains us. If we are attentive, we feel God's love holding us up. Seeing this phenomenon in others is an amazing experience. The stories of natural disasters, terrorist attacks, horrible epidemics, or even the mass shootings that seem to plague our society, are all filled with tales of strength, heroism, and the indomitable human will to survive. The readings this Sunday explain that our faith can both sustain us in times of cataclysm and serve to shine forth the grace of God.

In the passage from the Prophet Malachi, God's justice is presented as a cleansing fire that will burn away the proud and the evil of heart who the prophet describes them as stubble thrown into the fire of God's wrath. While a very frightening image, amid this trial, the just and faithful will remain unscathed. For them, the heat will be like a healing sun. In disaster, the greedy and selfish are destroyed by their vices. On the other hand, the kind and generous save others and frequently find themselves saved by the courage which comes from God.

The reading from the Second Letter to the Thessalonians consists of Paul's warning that members of the church be models of virtue for one another. The Apostle points to the example he set for them. He asks them to bear their hardships bravely. He reminds them that through hard work he avoided being a burden on them and asks them to do the same. In tragedy and challenge it is easy to become paralyzed by self-pity. Sometimes we can become jealous of the good fortune of others or become busybodies gossiping about troubles of our neighbor. Paul urges us to focus on the positive and to work on our relationship with Christ.

In the Gospel passage Jesus makes a prophecy about the future of his followers and provides advice to help them endure. Luke presents a prayer of hope for a Church in midst of great tribulation. Jesus urges us to be brave. He assures us that even if they find ourselves persecuted, we will not face the test alone. Public humiliation will be opportunities to witness to the faith. God himself will inspire us to give a defense. We as disciples are promised that even if our lives are taken, we will not be destroyed for God loves us and will take us to Himself. Over the ages followers of Christ took these words to heart and put their hope on the promises made in this passage. These courageous martyrs became a shining example of God's grace and inspire us to weather the storms and catastrophes of our own era.

As we take stock of our own lives and the trials we have undergone, may we pray in thanksgiving for the support that our Lord has given us. May we also pray for members of our Church who each day face a struggle to survive, physically, emotionally and spiritually. We ask God for the strength to live out our faith courageously that we may join the long line of our forbearers who have become beacons of faith in a very dark world.
