



The Feast of All Souls // Lectionary C (11-02-25)

This Sunday we celebrate the feast of All Souls. The purpose of this feast is to remember and celebrate the lives of loved ones who, in death, have left this life and are making their journey to heaven. This feast highlights the Church Dogma of the communion of saints, the belief in a mystical bond uniting both the living and the dead in the "Body of Christ," nurtured by faith and confirmed through hope and love. Our readings today confirm our faith in the love of Christ, that Jesus will not abandon us to death if we remain close to him. Our connection to Jesus allows us access to the mystical body of Christ. This is described as the Church Triumphant (those who have entered heaven) the Church Suffering (those who have died and are making their way through purgatory) and the Church Militant (all of us who struggle to live the gospel in this life).

In the first reading, from the book of Wisdom, we are told that the souls of the just are in the hand of God and death is not the end. While the author admits that, to the world, death seems like utter destruction, he proclaims that through faith and hope in God, our immortality is achievable. He assures us that those who trust in God shall understand this truth, and the faithful shall abide with God in love.

In the second reading, from Paul's letter to the Romans, Paul reminds his audience, and us, that hope does not disappoint. The love of God has been poured into our souls through the gift of the Holy Spirit. The sacrifice of Jesus on the cross gives us ample reason to believe in our redemption. Paul reminds his audience that in baptism we are bonded to Christ and therefore are dead to a life trapped in our mortal bodies. If we grow into union with Christ through our baptism, we will be united with Him in resurrection. We are no longer bound by the state of original sin to which we were born and are given access to Heaven. Death is not the end for those who draw close to Jesus.

In today's passage from the Gospel of John, Jesus defines his mission on Earth. He points out that He is not here to accomplish his own plan, but to do the will of God, his Father. Jesus explains that the will of God for Him rescue us from death and raise us up on the last day. He proclaims that everyone who draws close and believes in Him will have eternal life. That is God's plan, that is the mission Jesus was sent to accomplish. Death is not the final fate of humanity if we cooperate with this plan.

This Sunday we commemorate the people who have left this life in the past year. We pray for their transition with faith that they will feel our prayers and our love for them. We ask them to pray for us with the hope that we will feel their love and support for us. Our scripture readings show us that death is not the end for those who love God. We must cling to that hope.

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All Souls' Day,

In Roman Catholicism, a day for commemoration of all the faithful departed, those baptized Christians who are believed to be in purgatory because they died with the guilt of lesser sins on their souls. It is observed on November 2. Roman Catholic doctrine holds that the prayers of the faithful on earth will help cleanse these souls in order to fit them for the vision of God in heaven, and the day is dedicated to prayer and remembrance. The Anglican church, which does not believe in purgatory, observes the day as the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, an optional extension of All Saints' Day meant to honor ordinary Christians who have passed. All Souls' Day is part of the three-day triduum dedicated to remembering the dead, beginning with Halloween (October 31) and followed by All Saints' Day (November 1) and All Souls' Day (November 2).

In many places that observe the Day of the Dead, the deceased are remembered with visits to the cemetery. Loved ones may use the holiday as a time to clean tombs and grave sites, often adding decorations and offerings, and burial structures are commonly repainted in bright colors. Memories of the departed, as well as prayers, are shared during these visits. Particularly in small towns and villages, families may lay flower petals, candles, and offerings along the paths leading from the cemetery to their home to help guide the souls to the *ofrenda* inside.

Given that All Saints' Day is generally a holy day of obligation for Roman Catholics, the Day of the Dead is often incorporated into the masses celebrated that day. Some churches encourage families to bring photos of their loved ones, and prayers are offered to and on behalf of the dead. Special requiem masses are sometimes held on November 1 and on November 2 (All Souls')

Day). Processional walks are common, and some people undertake a nightly novenario (novena)—a spiritual devotion of reciting a set form of prayer for nine consecutive days—concluding on the Day of the Dead.
