Sunday Connection

John 18:33b-37

Jesus is questioned by Pilate about the charge brought against him that he is “King of the Jews.”

This Sunday is the last Sunday of the Church’s liturgical year. On this Sunday we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. Each year we set aside this Sunday to reflect upon this title that we have given to Jesus.

Pilate questions Jesus about the charges brought against him. Caiaphas and the high priests have charged Jesus with a political crime, one that would require a punishment of death. Jesus distinguishes his kingdom from the political powers of this world. King and kingdom may be appropriate terms for Jesus’ mission and promise, but only by analogy. Jesus is king, but not the kind of king we imagine or expect. He was certainly not the kind of king Pilate feared he In today’s reading, we see Jesus identify the final proof that his kingdom is not of this world: If his kingdom were of this world, then there would be people fighting to save him. Again we hear echoes of John’s theme—salvation is worked out through a comic battle. Jesus came into the world, but the world did not know him. In John’s language, the world prefers the darkness, and yet the light will not be overcome by the darkness.

To understand how Christ is our king, we extend and magnify what we know to be true of the best of human royalty. Christ’s kingship extends to all places, all people, and all times. Christ manifests his kingship through his death on the cross in which he offered salvation to everyone. Those who can see with eyes of faith recognize Jesus to be our heavenly king.

As modern disciples of Jesus, we struggle at times to recognize Jesus as king. Today’s Gospel invites us to see with eyes of faith that we might recognize that Jesus, through his crucifixion and death, is indeed king and Savior of all.

**MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS
FOR THE FIFTH WORLD DAY OF THE POOR**

14 November 2021, Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time

"The poor you will always have with you" (Mk 14:

It is my hope that the celebration of the *World Day of the Poor*, now in its fifth year, will
grow in our local Churches and inspire a movement of evangelization that meets the
poor personally wherever they may be. We cannot wait for the poor to knock on our
door; we need urgently to reach them in their homes, in hospitals and nursing homes,
on the streets and in the dark corners where they sometimes hide, in shelters and
reception centres. It is important to understand how they feel, what they are
experiencing and what their hearts desire. Let us make our own the heartfelt plea of
Father Primo Mazzolari: "I beg you not to ask me if there are poor people, who they are
and how many of them there are, because I fear that those questions represent a
distraction or a pretext for avoiding a clear appeal to our consciences and our hearts... I
have never counted the poor, because they cannot be counted: the poor are to be
embraced, not counted" ("Adesso" n. 7 – 15 April 1949). The poor are present in our
midst. How evangelical it would be if we could say with all truth: *we too are
poor*, because only in this way will we truly be able to recognize them, to make them
part of our lives and an instrument of our salvation.

There are ten Themes to be used as starting points and guidelines. Themes will continue for the next few weeks. This week is one question. Please give this question some thought. Have discussions in groups, in your home, in your workplace, the objective is to be inclusive as possible. Summarize responses and email to <https://bit.ly/SynodResponses>. Combined reports will be collated and sent to the Vatican in preparation for the October 2023 Synod of Bishops where representative bishops from throughout the world will convene and meet with our Holy Father.

5. SHARING RESPONSIBILITY FOR OUR COMMON MISSION *Synodality is at the service of the mission of the Church, in which all members are called to participate. Since we are all missionary disciples, how is every baptized person called to participate in the mission of the Church? What hinders the baptized from being active in mission? What areas of mission are we neglecting? How does the community support its members who serve society in various ways (social and political involvement, scientific research, education, promoting social justice, protecting human rights, caring for the environment, etc.?) How does the Church help these members to live out their service to society in a missionary way? How is discernment about missionary choices made and by whom?*
