28th Sunday of Ordinary Time - Lectionary C (10-12-25)

While living the Gospel well can bring praise, admiration, and a source of great encouragement, it can also become a temptation to pride and arrogance. When we give into this enticement and take full credit for the success of our Christian lives, we can become corrupt. Today's scriptures remind us that all our achievements come from God. Those who seek to serve God in this life must constantly remind themselves of this fact.

In the first reading, taken from the Second Book of Kings, we are told the story of the healing of a leper by the prophet Elisha. Naaman is a rich man and a commander of the Aramean army. When he first arrives in Judea he is directed to the prophet Elisha. When the prophet tells him to wash seven times in the Jordan river, the commander cannot believe that such a simple act will be effective and refuses. Eventually he is persuaded to comply with Elisha's instruction and is miraculously cured. This is where our passage begins. Naaman is overjoyed at his healing and offers Elisha a great treasure. Elisha refuses the gift, but Naaman insists. The passage does not reveal the rest of the dialogue, but Naaman's final appeal gives us a hint. The commander asks for two mule loads of Judean dirt that he may always worship the God of Elisha on the prophet's native soil. Elisha refused the gift because the healing came from God who deserves the glory. Naaman understands and his request reveals this. In today's passage from the second letter to Timothy, Paul explains that even though he suffers and is incarcerated, his jailors cannot imprison the word of God. Paul is not being praised for his ministry to the Gospel but is severely persecuted. The apostle takes solace in the fact that the power of his work does not originate in him but has its source in Jesus Christ. Paul sees himself as only a vessel of this power. The Romans can kill him, but they cannot kill the Word of God. The apostle explains to Timothy that the only way the Romans can win is if he, Paul, denies Christ, and he refuses to give them that victory. This shows a courage borne in the knowledge that we serve a power greater that ourselves. When we give in to the temptation to take credit for the things we do in God's name, we degrade the gift we have been given by claiming ourselves as its source.

This Sunday we are presented with the story of Jesus healing the ten lepers in the Gospel of Luke. This account presents a lesson about gratitude, but a deeper look teaches us about ministry as well. When the lepers approach Jesus, the Lord does not pray over them, nor does He touch them. He simply sends them to the priests. This must have seemed strange to the lepers, yet in faith they obey, and, on the way, they are healed. Only one of them returns to show gratitude. Jesus does not take credit for the healing, nor does he ask for a reward. He simply tells the man that his faith saved him. Jesus could properly claim the glory, after all He is God. Yet here he is teaching his disciples that power is not a tool for self- glorification; it is a gift meant to help others and thus bring glory to God.

We are all baptized called to bear the light of Christ into the world. We do this by using our God-given talents and gifts to help our brothers and sisters. The more successful we are in this, the more acknowledgment we attract. Sometimes, as in the case of the apostle Paul, that recognition takes the form of persecution. In that case we can take solace in the fact that we may be hindered, stopped, or even killed, but the work goes on since it comes from God. At times our efforts can bring us praise and appreciation. When it does, we must constantly remind ourselves that the success we experience comes from God's power and not our own talents.
