#### LIVING THE WORD \*

A Reflection on Matthew 14:13-21

#### YOUR LIFE: A PLACE OF SCARCITY OR OF ABUNDANCE?

Today we encounter a sad and mournful Jesus who has just heard of the terrible fate of his cousin and prophet, John the Baptist. Beyond his grief, John's death was a dark warning to Jesus of what ultimately awaits him. Seeking quiet solitude Jesus goes to a deserted spot to mourn and pray. He fails in this attempt for a large multitude of thousands gathers and follows him. Does Jesus react to these people with impatience and annoyance that he cannot have a moment of alone time to weep over John or to pray for strength and comfort? No, rather he has true and heartfelt compassion. In his own time of sorrow and need Jesus forgets self and wholly gives himself to others by comforting and healing the sick.

Evening approaches yet the crowd makes no attempt to leave. The disciples become anxious and urge Jesus to send the people into neighboring villages so they can find themselves food. Jesus replies: "Feed them yourselves." But how can they when they show little concern for other people's needs? When they lack faith in themselves and in Jesus? Have they not really understood the parables Jesus has so patiently been explaining? Do they not grasp the meaning of seed being sown on good soil, of seeking and finding, of giving all to gain the hidden treasure, of how just a small amount of yeast multiples in a bit of dough which results in a large nourishing loaf of bread? After all this time, do they not know what the kingdom of God is truly like?

Because the disciples have so little, only two fish and five small loaves of bread, they cannot see any possible way to feed the crowd. They are thinking and reacting from a place of scarcity. We can also feel we are not up to the challenge, that we can't move forward, that we don't have enough of the right thing to offer, that we are lacking or deficient in talent, or courage, or worse yet - faith, to do what needs to be done. Jesus asks them to bring him what little they have. He takes the five loaves and two fish, looks to heaven, blesses them, breaks them, and gives them back to the disciples so they can go and feed the crowd, and rather than not having enough, there is a great amount leftover.

Jesus operates from a place of superabundance and teaches us to do the same. Jesus can take what little we think we have and transform it. Whatever you have, take it in your hands then place it in Jesus'. Ask him to bless it and to break it, then go out and share it. You'll have more than you need to fulfill God's plan for your life and to make the kingdom present in the world.



#### TERMS and CONDITIONS for RETURNING to CHURCH

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Sacred Heart Pahoa "*E Komo Mai*" task force team has carefully formulated the following **Terms and Conditions** for attending Mass based on the directives of the CDC, the State of Hawaii, Hawaii County, Bishop Larry Silva, and the dictates of common sense. We must inform you and your family that Sacred Heart Church cannot guarantee your safety from COVID-19 pandemic. We are all at risk by attending Mass. If you feel hesitant coming to Mass, *stay home.* 

Please be aware on June 13, 2020, Bishop Larry Silva extended the dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass through August 31, 2020. This will allow those who are not comfortable attending Mass at this time to stay away with a clear conscience. Masses will continue to be live-streamed on television and the internet. Before June 30, Bishop will evaluate whether or not to further extend the dispensation.

#### **BEFORE MAKING A MASS RESERVATION**

The limited number of seats at each Mass will be filled by advance reservation. Before making a reservation click on the following links to read and follow the information on "How to Protect Yourself and Others" from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the State of Hawaii.

Older adults and people with severe underlying medical conditions like heart or lung disease, diabetes, or compromised immune system can be at higher risk for developing serious complications from COVID-19 illnesses. If you have any of these or other various medical conditions, *stay home*.

#### MASS RESERVATIONS WILL BEGIN JULY 1, 2020

Due to the lack of attendees, note that the Mass times have changed, the new schedule is as follows:

Saturday: 8:30 am (Latin Mass) 4:00 pm and 6:00 pm Sunday: 7:30 am, 10:00 am, 4:00 pm (Latin Mass) Monday: 11:30 am and 5:30 pm Wednesday: 11:30am

#### Because the **maximum capacity** of our church is **40** persons <u>you can only select one</u> <u>particular day and time per week to attend Mass during the pandemic.</u> For example, if you select Wednesday at 11:30am you will have a reserved seat for Mass every Wednesday at 11:30 until August 31, 2020. <u>You cannot change the day or the time so</u> make certain of your selection.

If you are retired or are staying at home, *<u>please select a weekday Mass</u>* time as that will allow people who work during the week to attend a week-end Mass.

#### MAKING A MASS RESERVATION

To attend Mass, you need to make reservation. Please email Liz Morgan at <a href="https://www.shpahoasocialmedia@gmail.com">shpahoasocialmedia@gmail.com</a> or call 808.965.1694 and state the day and time you want to attend Mass.

#### WHAT HAPPENS WHEN I ARRIVE AT CHURCH?

- 1. Please plan to arrive at church at least 20 minutes prior to the beginning of Mass.
- 2. No one will be seated later than 10 minutes after Mass begins.
- 3. Please park in every other stall in the parking lot to maintain 6 ft. social distancing unless you are from the same household. No gathering of groups in the parking lot before or after Mass. If you arrive early, please stay in your vehicle. Due to the sanitization process we will only seat people 20 minutes before Mass time.
- 4. YOU MUST WEAR YOUR MASK UPON LEAVING YOUR VEHICLE. If you cannot wear a mask for the duration of the Mass you should <u>NOT ATTEND.</u> A mask must be worn and social distancing practices adhered to from the time you leave your car till the time you return to your car after Mass.
- Just like in places of business, please follow social distancing while waiting in line to enter the portico. Distances will be marked on the walkways, the portico and church floors with ushers there to help direct you.
- 6. An usher will be present on each side of the portico, the middle entry to the portico will be closed off. The usher will ask for your name. Your name MUST be on the reservation list for the Mass that you are attending. If you are NOT on the list, you will NOT be seated.

#### + AUGUST 2, 2020 \* EIGHTEENTH WEEK OF ORDINARY TIME +

- People will be seated starting at the front of the church working out onto the portico. Due to social distancing requirements we are unable to seat you in any specific pew.
- 8. Before entering the portico, your temperature will be taken. If your temperature is above 100.4 F you will not be able to attend Mass.

Please expect to be asked the following questions: Do you now have, or have you recently had a fever? Do you have or have recently had a cough, runny nose, sore throat, or other symptoms? Have you been in contact with an infected person? Have you traveled or flown over the ocean in the past fourteen days?

#### If you answer yes to any of the above, you will not be allowed to enter.

- 9. Upon entering the portico, an usher will spray your hands with hand sanitizer. If you feel uncomfortable having your hands sanitized, you will not be able to attend Mass.
- 10. Whether on the portico or inside of the church, an usher will escort you to your seat. Once seated, you are required to stay in your seat until Mass begins. If you need to leave your seat, please ask an usher to conduct you.
- 11. Restrooms will be locked at all times but an usher will be available to open them when necessary. Restrooms will be disinfected after every use.
- 12. Families with babies, and/or small children: We encourage you to stay home and attend a Mass through live-streaming. However, if you must attend, parents are required to ensure their children do not leave their seats. If you need to leave your seat, please gesture for an usher to escort you out. Children two years old and younger should not wear a mask. Children two years old and younger may put themselves at risk through not understanding the requirements of social distancing, and we ask you to consider having them taken care of at home.
- 13. Hymnals, missalettes and other worship material will not be available in the church for the duration of the COVID-19 pandemic. Parishioners are free to bring their own missals with them or to use one of the many daily Mass reading apps on their phones.
- 14. **The Collection:** We will not be passing the collection basket. Please use the drop box at the two entrances. Please consider using Online Giving or mailing a check. Do not send cash through the mail. Your continuous expression of generous Stewardship during these hard times is greatly appreciated.
- 15. **The Lord's Prayer and the Sign of Peace:** There is to be **NO** physical contact during the Lord's Prayer or the Sign of Peace. A bow, a smile, or a wave will serve as a true sign of peace to one's neighbor.

- 16. Holy Communion: Remain in your seat. Fr. John or an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion will come to give you Holy Communion.
- 17. End of Mass and the Dismissal: Everyone must leave the church and portico after the final blessing and dismissal to allow time for the church to be sanitized before the next Mass.

If you are seated on the portico, you must remain in your seat until directed by an usher. People on the portico will exit first and in an orderly fashion so as to maintain the required 6 foot social distance.

For those who are seated inside the church, remain in your seat until an usher directs you to the exit. The reason for this is that the portico must be cleared first. Please maintain the required 6 foot social distance while exiting.

#### Please note, everyone will be exiting on the side steps.

- 18. Bulletins will not be distributed after Mass but are available on the parish website https://pahoasacredheart.org/
- 19. There is to be no gathering on the portico or church grounds before and after Mass.
- 20. Please note that the Sacrament of Reconciliation is available by appointment only. Please call Fr. John at 808.965.8202.
